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Resist hartal, PM urges people

In a sharp reaction to the opposition's nonstop hartal plan. Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina urged the people to boldly resist such shutdowns for uninterrupted development,

"If the people come forward to resisting hartal, then it will totally lose its efficacy," she said, addressing the National Export Trophy distributing function at Osmani Memorial Hall vesterday afternoon.

Referring to Leader of the Opposition Khaleda Zia's defiant announcement on Monday at the Businessmen's Conference that the opposition will continue calling hartals one after another, the Prime Minister asked the business community to decide whom to support.

Seeking help and cooperation from the businesspeople, she said: "If we get assistance from you, we'll be able to overcome all odds."

She made it clear that with out democracy, economic development is not possible. And consolidating the democratic process needs tolerance, understanding and discussion.

"We have always kept the door open for discussion with the opposition; we have taken all possible, and most cordial, steps to reach an understanding through talks," she said regretting that even the move of business community for a solution to the standoff also floundered. See Page 12 Col 5

Leaded fuel disappearing from marketplace

Old stock almost exhausted

Leaded fuel is disappearing from the marketplace as stockpiles of petroleum products containing the toxic additive are exhausted, says an energy ministry official.

However, the official refused to take the next step and declare Bangladesh a lead-free fuel country.

There could be some old stocks in the private sector which haven't been exhausted yet," said the official. "Before we officially announce the country's fuel is lead free, we must conduct some tests on the petrol and octane samples collected from the market.

Early last year, environmentalists and doctors raised the issue of air pollution and the consequences of lead poisoning. The government decided to phase out leaded fuel and stop the import of two-stroke engines, which pollute more than other types. However. Bangladesh imports petroleum products roughly every six months. which means leaded fuel was used across the country until the stocks were exhausted.

Eastern Refinery renovated its processing plant after the government's decision. Its products no longer contain

"We have tested the petrol and octane reserves at Padma-Meghna-Jamuna (the distributors) and found no lead," said a source with Eastern Refinery. "We can assure the public that all petroleum products are supplied by the Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation through the Eastern Refinery. Eastern Refinery no longer uses lead to improve the quality of its petroleum products, so there is

no leaded petrol in the country. "We now have a Tk 100 crore proposal to expand and modernise the plant to meet the country's future needs. This will help us refine petroleum products with higher octane numbers (the higher octane number means higher burning capacity - the present petrol range between 78 to 95).

Lead is used to refine imported crude oil or improve the burning quality of petroleum products. However, it is also a lethal substance that can cause paralysis or death when inhaled. It's impossible for someone to mix lead with petrol or octane outside the refinery.

"Besides, nobody would make any money mixing lead with fuel," said the source. Although unleaded fuel is

Equal share of Teesta to be demanded

Bangladesh will demand from India equal share of Teesta waters after leaving aside 20 per cent of its flow for continuation of the river-line.

Sharing of Teesta waters will be on top of the agenda at the four-day secretary-level Joint Committee of Experts (JCE) meeting, beginning here on Friday, sources in the Ministry of Water Resources said. The meeting will discuss sharing of waters of all common rivers, they said

Water Resources Secretary Dr. A T M Shamsul Huda and his Indian counterpart Z Hasan will lead their respective sides at the meeting, the third since formation of the JCE. The first meeting was held in Dhaka in 1997 and the second one in

It will be followed by a ministerial level meeting within

three months. The sources said India has built a 921.53 metre barrage on

the Teesta at Gajaldoba under Jalpaiguri district in West Bengal for diverting about 1,500 cusec water every day to Mahananda river.

Bangladesh also constructed a 615 metre barrage on the river for flood control and irrigation in 5,40,000 hectares of land in 35 thanas in Rangpur, Dinajpur and Bogra districts. But the barrage on the

Bangladesh side could not fully utilised due to inadequate water flow. Withdrawal of water by India has also seriously affected the ecology in the entire northern region of the country, they said. Talking to The Daily Star,
