

Pak SC puts off hearing on petition challenging military coup

ISLAMABAD, Jan 31: Pakistan's Supreme Court today put off for a month a hearing on a petition challenging the military coup that ousted elected prime minister Nawaz Sharif. Court officials said, reports AFP.

A seven-member panel of judges presided over by the newly appointed Chief Justice, Irfanul Hasan Khan, adjourned the case until March 1 on the request of the petitioners.

Lawyers for Sharif's Pakistan Muslim League party and other individual petitioners said they wanted time to prepare a rejoinder to a written document submitted to the Court by the military-led government last week.

The lengthy document traces the events leading to the October 12 military takeover, blaming Sharif for misrule, authoritarianism and plundering national resources.

Irfanul Hasan Khan was appointed Chief Justice last week after his predecessor, Saeed ul Zaman, and other senior judges refused to take an oath of allegiance to General Pervez Musharraf's regime.

The move has been slammed as a step towards dictatorship. The regime has responded by claiming that the independence of the judiciary remains intact.

Two days after seizing power in the October 12, coup, Musharraf suspended the constitution and passed an order. Provisional Constitution Order Number one, preventing the courts from challenging his rule.

Sharif is currently on trial at an anti-terrorist court in Karachi on charges of kidnapping, attempted murder, hijacking and terrorism arising from events on the night of the coup.

Briton, 5 Latvians convicted in Purulia arms drop case

CALCUTTA, Jan 31: A British arms dealer and five Latvians were convicted today in an arms smuggling case and face a possible death penalty, reports AP.

Judge PK Biswas said he would announce the sentences on February 2 after hearing arguments from both sides.

He convicted the six on charges of waging war against India through procuring and bringing arms into the country as part of an international conspiracy.

"We are going to appeal against the judgment," said Peter Bleach, the arms dealer, outside the court room.

His Latvian codefendant Igor Timmerman said: "We are dis-

appointed."

Biswas acquitted the seventh defendant, Vinay Singh, an Indian. He said the prosecution had failed to prove conspiracy charges against him.

The six already have spent four years in jail since they were arrested after allegedly parachuting crates of weapons from a cargo plane onto a field in eastern India.

The prosecution claimed the assault rifles, rocket launchers, grenades and missiles were intended for an anti-communist religious group in West Bengal, a state with a communist government.

Indian air force jets intercepted the cargo plane in De-

cember 1995, a week after the weapons were dropped, when the plane made its return trip to Europe. The man who allegedly organised the delivery escaped.

Bleach and the Latvian crewmen, Alexandre Klinchne, Oleg Gaidach, Igor Timmerman, Eugene Animanko and Igor Noskvtin, heard the judge pronounce them guilty after a trial lasting nearly three years.

Some reports have said that the group, known as Ananda Marg, may have been a conduit to rebels in neighbouring Myanmar. The Ananda Marg has denied it was the intended recipient. The Indian acquitted by the court belonged to the sect.

Top generals deny liability for atrocities in E Timor

JAKARTA, Jan 31: Indonesia's ex-military commander Gen Wiranto hunkered down today amid expectations that separate Indonesian and UN investigations would find him and other army top brass culpable for a wave of killings and destruction across East Timor last year, reports AP.

Hours before its release in Jakarta, armed forces lawyers rejected a report by Indonesia's Investigative Commission of Human Rights Abuses in East Timor, which is expected to implicate Wiranto.

They also rejected calls for the establishment of an International East Timor War Crimes Tribunal by a UN investigative team, which was scheduled to release its findings in New York later today.

"There is no evidence that Wiranto violated human rights in East Timor," said Maj. Gen.

Timor Manurung, who heads the military's legal department.

Wiranto, whose present position as a senior member of Indonesia's Cabinet looks shaky amid growing calls for his resignation, declined to comment directly.

"It is better to wait for the investigators to release their findings," he told reporters during a visit to Padang in West Sumatra.

Wiranto, who is retiring from the military, was its chief when pro-Jakarta militia gangs rampaged through East Timor in September last year after the people of the troubled half-island territory voted overwhelmingly to break away from Indonesia.

Indonesia's military reigned supreme in East Timor for 24 years after it invaded the former Portuguese colony. It was

long accused of widespread human rights abuses.

Both reports are expected to find that the armed forces actively sponsored the militia gangs.

In the past Wiranto and other generals have denied any part in the violence, in which at least 250 people were killed and almost all of East Timor's buildings were burned or ransacked before international peacekeepers restored order.

Critics now demand that Wiranto be prosecuted as well as be dismissed fired from Cabinet.

"He must be brought to trial. In this day and age you cannot kill hundreds of people, destroy a whole country and then just get fired," said Jose Ramos Horta, a top Timorese independence activists who won the 1996 Nobel Peace Prize.

9 killed as buses collide in S Africa:

Nine people were killed and 33 injured yesterday in an accident involving two passenger buses outside the town of Beaufort West in South Africa's Western Cape province, police said, AFP reports from Cape Town.

Around 25 adults and eight children were taken to hospital, police told public SABC radio. The injured were reported to be in a stable condition.

Rebels free 3 in Philippines:

Suspected Muslim rebels have freed a bus driver and two other employees who were taken hostage after their vehicle was robbed and burned last week, officials said Monday, AP reports from Zamboanga.

The driver, his assistant and ticket collector were released unharmed on Sunday in a remote village, military spokesman Maj. Salih Indanan said.

Barak leaves Cairo: Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak left Cairo for home yesterday after a four-hour visit to discuss progress in Middle East peace negotiations with Egypt's President Hosni Mubarak, airport sources said, Reuters reports from Cairo.

Barak said at a joint news conference earlier with Mubarak that there should be no preconditions to further Israeli-Syrian peace talks, which began in December after a four-year gap.

ROK official to visit China: A high-ranking South Korean diplomat will visit China this week for a review of relations between the two countries, Seoul's Foreign Ministry said Monday, AP reports from Seoul.

During a three-day visit starting on Wednesday, Assistant Foreign Minister Chang Jai-ryong will meet his Chinese counterpart, Wang Yi, it said.

The visit comes amid a diplomatic row between the two countries over China's recent deportation of seven North Koreans who UN officials said could face severe reprisals in their own country.

Basu flays centre for bid to amend constitution

CALCUTTA, Jan 31: West Bengal Chief Minister Jyoti Basu yesterday strongly criticised the BJP-led NDA government at centre for its effort to amend the constitution, saying it would result in a division in society along religious lines, reports BSS.

While stating that there were 'some laws' in the constitution, Basu said, "their aim is to change the basic ideals like secularism enshrined in the constitution. If they succeed, society would be divided along religious lines."

The veteran Marxist leader said the NDA government's policies had given rise to "minority communalism," and fundamentalist organisations were now trying to foment trouble in the country.

'Jerusalem could be shared with Palestinians'

JERUSALEM, Jan 31: A top Israeli government official suggested Sunday that Jerusalem could be shared with the Palestinians, the first time Israel has indicated willingness to compromise on one of the thorniest issues keeping the sides from concluding a permanent peace agreement, reports BSS.

Deputy Defence Minister Ephraim Sneh, who often speaks for Prime Minister Ehud Barak, said Jerusalem's municipal boundaries could be expanded to accommodate Palestinian aspirations for a presence in the city.

Asked if that meant a Palestinian presence in Jerusalem, Sneh told Israel television, "I don't want to commit." But he said the direction of an expansion of the borders should be eastward toward Palestinian-

dominated areas.

Israeli officials have recently suggested that the Palestinians could establish a capital in three Arab suburbs east of Jerusalem, but this was the first time a senior government official offered to include the suburbs in an expanded "shared" Jerusalem.

That could allow the Palestinians to administer parts of the city where Arabs still predominate. The Palestinian Authority has built a large building in one of the West Bank suburbs of the city, Abu Dis, which could function as a parliament in a Palestinian capital.

Palestinians and Israelis have committed to a final peace agreement before year's end, and launched marathon talks Sunday to meet a February 13 deadline for an outline of the agreement.

Albright in Moscow to size up Putin govt

MOSCOW, Jan 31: Secretary of State Madeleine Albright said that Russia's acting president is "riding a tiger" by pushing a military offensive against rebels in Chechnya, reports AP.

"There is no question the war is popular," Albright told reporters as she flew to Moscow on Sunday to size up Vladimir Putin and push arms control.

But Albright noted that casualties are mounting and said Russia faces more isolation in the international arena as the war drags on.

They have to hear over and over again that this is not working for them," Albright said.

She said she was "hoping to have a meaty session" with Putin when they get together this week.

Persistent US appeals to Russian leaders to end the conflict and negotiate with the Chechnya separatists have failed, Albright did not predict success this time, either, and she ruled out US economic sanctions if persuasion does not work.

In what could turn out to be a tradeoff, Albright was ready to discuss sharp cuts in US and Russian long-range nuclear arsenals while urging Putin to approve "modest adjustments" in

a ban on missile defences.

Just before landing in Moscow, she said talk of such a tradeoff is "hypothetical."

A deal would make it easier for the Clinton administration to go forward with a 6.6 billion dollar plan for a defence against missiles fired from Iran, North Korea or other countries the United States considers rogue states.

Before taking off, Albright warned in a speech to the World Economic Forum that "economic anxieties" in countries with democratically elected governments were prompting the people to turn to authoritarianism and other failed remedies.

She said life in parts of the former Soviet Union often is tougher for ordinary people than when Communists ruled.

"A majority of citizens in these countries have come to equate democracy with inequality, insecurity and the unraveling of the social fabric," she said. "We are concerned that in many countries, the arrival of electoral democracy has been accompanied by economic expectations that are, as yet, unfulfilled."

Her scheduled meeting with Putin will be the first by a top-ranked US official since Boris Yeltsin quit as president New

Year's Eve and named the former KGB domestic intelligence chief as his successor. Elections are due in three months.

Albright "wants to get a firsthand assessment of how he intends to operate now that he's the acting president, which brings additional responsibilities," the State Department spokesman James P. Rubin said.

Albright has described him as a leading reformer, but also said the administration was not "starry-eyed" about Russia's future.

Russia has registered its opposition to missile defense systems as potentially fueling a race to develop more powerful nuclear weapons to overcome them.

A 1972 US Russia treaty bans missile defenses, but the Clinton administration wants to make changes in it to go ahead with its programme.

At the same time, Russia wants to go further than the United States has proposed in cutting nuclear missile stockpiles.

Albright intends to renew a US pitch that the Russian parliament ratify the 1993 START II treaty, which calls for reducing the US and Russian arsenals of long-range nuclear warheads to 3,000 to 3,500 apiece.

Circumcision may protect men from AIDS virus

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan 31: Circumcision may somehow protect men from sexual transmission of the AIDS virus, researchers said on Sunday, but they admitted they do not have a clue why, reports Reuters.

A study in Uganda aimed at examining how couples infect one another found two things seemed to protect people — being older and being circumcised.

"Acquisition of HIV did not occur in any of the circumcised men," Dr Thomas Quinn of Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, who led the study, told the 7th Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic Infections, a meeting of AIDS researchers.

"Age, independent of viral load, appeared to have a protective effect," Quinn added. The

highest transmission rate was in people 15 to 29 years old.

Quinn's team, working with 15,000 people in the Rakai district of Uganda, also found that people did not pass on the virus to their partners if they had a naturally low level of HIV in the blood. In this case, 1,500 copies according to standard measures.

He found that the more virus people had in their blood, the more likely they were to pass it on. There were no differences in women infecting men or men infecting women.

Quinn said his team was one of the first to actually go out and test the idea where HIV is raging the worst. More than 23 million people in Sub-Saharan Africa are infected with HIV.

Shooting on Deepa Mehta's film halted following violent protests

NEW DELHI, Jan 31: Shooting on the latest film from controversial India-born filmmaker Deepa Mehta has been halted following violent protests by Hindu fundamentalists, reports said today, reports AFP.

Hundreds of activists from rightwing Hindu groups attacked and destroyed the sets of the film "Water" at the weekend before shooting could begin in the city of Varanasi on the banks of the Ganges River.

The violence led the city authorities to slap a temporary ban on the film's production, while assessments were made over the consequences for the law and order situation.

Although the script of "water" is a closely guarded secret,

the protestors claimed the film "tarnished" Hindu traditions and depicted a torrid inter-caste love affair, the Times of India said.

"Water" is the final part of Mehta's film trilogy about India, which has been dogged by controversy from the start.

The first film in the series, "Fire," attracted attacks on movie theatres by rightwing Hindus outraged by the film's portrayal of a lesbian relationship.

Describing the latest protests as "heart breaking" and angry Mehta slammed the Information and Broadcasting Ministry, saying it was changing tack after initially clearing her script without any deletions.
