Vaipayee warns Pakistan

NEW DELHI, Feb 6: Indian Prime Minister Atal Behari Vaipavee today threatened a retaliatory strike against Pakistan if Islamabad unleashed nuclear weapons on New Delhi, reports

We have always said we are for no-first use of nuclear weapons," the Press Trust of India quoted him as saying in the northern city of Jalandhar.

"But if somebody uses it against us, we will not refrain from doing so," he said. "We cannot just keep quiet while such weapons are used against

The official said EC's earlier aid commitments have been fulfilled. "We are preparing for fresh exchange of letters". During 1998 and 1999, the EC provided 2.40.000 tonnes of food as assistance to Bangladesh.

Asked whether future EC assistance to Bangladesh was discussed during Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's recent visit to Brussels, another official at the EC office replied in the negative.

A high official of the finance ministry said, "We have accepted the proposal in principle and will observe the result at least for one year. If we face any problem in getting cash instead of food, we will discuss the matter with the EC."

The issue of food assistance was also discussed at the last working group meeting between the government and EC officials, held in Dhaka in Novem-

ber last year. The EC delegation led by Erich W Muller explained the new food aid policy of the commission. They told the meeting that in 1996, the EC Council adopted a new food aid policy to ensure food security in the recipient countries.

The new policy emphasises people's access to food and also supports long-term national nutrition programmes.

Dhaka's plea to extend Clinton's stay

Dhaka has requested Washington to extend President Bill Clinton's stay in Bangladesh by another day so that he could attend the Independence Day celebrations on March 26, sources concerned said.

"A flurry of communications has been initiated between the two capitals over the US President's scheduled visit to Bangladesh and making it a two-day stay", one source said.

The initial itinerary of Clinton as announced in the two capitals mentioned a day-long visit on March 25. Officials at the Prime Minis-

ter's Office are now convinced that Dhaka has erred in agreeing to the one-day visit of the US President on March 25.Incidentally, it is the blackest day in the country's history because the occupation Pakistani Army unleashed barbarle massacre of innecent people that right in 1971. Although officials concerned noted that at this stage it would be very difficult for Clinton to extend the visit, a senior official said, "We are optimistic that the US President would feel encouraged to attend our Independence Day celebrations or at least visit the Jatiya Smriti Saudha at Savar on the morning of March 26, prior to his departure from Dangle esh.
