

NY mayor accuses Hillary of misusing

taxpayers' money WASHINGTON, Feb 6: Hours before US First Lady Hillary Clinton was to announce her candidacy for the US Senate from New York state, her presumptive Republican rival accused her today of using taxpayer money to cover campaign

expenses, reports AFP. "You are looking at maybe 200,000 -- 300,000 dollars in taxpayer money that went to pay for travel expenses all over the state and over the country, actually." New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani told the Fox television channel.

Although Giuliani stopped short of formally announcing his candidacy, he gave the First Lady a taste of what their race would look like after campaigning begins in earnest.

"The reality is I took 14 trips over the last six months. I paid 153,000 dollars for those," argued Giuliani. "Mrs Clinton took some-

thing like 50 or 60 trips. She paid only 34,000 dollars for it," he continued. "That's like a couple of hundred thousand dollars missing in terms of al-

According to Giuliani, it cost Vice President Al Gore, who is seeking the Democratic presidential nomination, about 330,000 dollars to make about the same number of trips during his campaign as the First Lady
