

Religious riots claim 400 in Nigeria

KADUNA, Nigeria, Feb 24: More than 400 people died in two days of religious riots in Nigeria, the head of a Kaduna based human rights group said today as estimates of the numbers killed mounted, report

Shehu Sani, head of the Civil Rights Congress (CRC), told AFP: "The Muslims have already buried many of their dead. More than 200. The Christians are burying theirs. Our people have gone round the town and from what we have seen, there are more than 400

More than 200 bodies are being kept in mortuaries in the northern city of Kaduna, local newspapers said today.

"Vanguard counted 210 charred bodies at the Ahmadu Bello University Teaching Hospital," said the independent Vanguard, one of several papers to carry the report.

Residents say they believe many hundreds of people were killed in the rioting which

started on Monday after a demonstration by Christians against demands by Muslims for the introduction of Islamic sharia law to Kaduna State.

Police sources say they cannot yet confirm more than 100 dead in the clashes that have left mosques, churches and shops destroyed.

Local authorities imposed a total ban on movement in Kaduna and nearby towns on Wednesday to stop the violence

Police and soldiers patrolled the smouldering streets of Kaduna as politicians debated the impact of deadly riots on the fragile religious and ethnic balance in Africa's most populous nation.

Bodies - many of them charred - littered the streets, where smoke wafted Wednesday from burned buildings and the remnants of bonfires built during the rioting.



HC stays central bank order against Rahman Group

By Staff Correspondent The High Court yesterday stayed a central bank order issued on January 13, and issued Rule Nisi following six writ petitions by six companies of the Rahman Group, says a press release of Moudud Ahmed and Associates.

The central bank directed the Sonali Bank to take legal action against Rahman Group, following which the bank issued a final notice on February 7, demanding additional dawnpayment, the press release said.

The HC Bench comprising Justice Md Mozammel Hag and Justice Md Abdur Rashid also directed the Ministry of Finance, Bangladesh Bank and Sonali Bank to show cause as to why the central bank order and the Sonali Bank notice should not be declared to have been made without any lawful authority and of no legal effect.

Declare Manju's JS seat vacant Ershad writes to Speaker

Jatiya Party Chairman H M Ershad urged Speaker Humayun Rashid Chowdhury yesterday to declare Communications Minister Anwar Hossain Manju's parliamentary seat vacant, reports UNB.

In a letter to the Speaker, Ershad said Manju violated the party's constitution and ignored parliamentary procedure when he joined the government and accepted the ministership. Manju's decision should be

from the party and his seat, argued Ershad. Ershad cited Article 70 (1) of the Constitution to back up his claim that Manju resigned from the party when he joined the government and Article 67 (1) to back up his claim that Manju's

seat was vacant. Ershad also referred to Case No. 22 of a 1999 civil appeal filed with the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court and Case No. 1, which was filed with the Election Commission dur-I ing the same year.

Ershad stated in the letter that Anwar Hossain Manju was nominated and elected to parliament by the Jatiya Party as Jhalakati-2 constituency's representative in the 1996 general election.

"However, Manju violated the party's constitution and ignored parliamentary procedure by joining the government on June 23, 1996, even though he knew his party did not support the consensus government of the honourable Prime Minis-

According to parliamentary procedure, a seat can be declared vacant by gazette notification if an MP violates or opposes a party decision.

PM tells rally at Kurigram

Opposition opposes PSA to keep people hostage to terrorists

KURIGRAM, Feb 24: Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has again blasted the opposition for opposing the Public Safety Act. saying they want to keep the people hostage to hoodlums, reports UNB.

They are conducting movement against the Act to support the terrorists and making the public hostage to them (terrorists)," she told a huge public meeting at Kurigram Government Degree College ground this afternoon.

Hasina wanted to know what the opposition would gain by doing so. She said her government would resign in due time. handing over power to a neutral, caretaker government before the election.

"If the people vote for us we will come to power again ... Otherwise, the opposition will come to power ... Until then the opposition will have to be pa-

The prime minister said the opposition will have to keep patience for the continuation of democracy. She alleged that the opposition do not want the continuation of democratic process, rather they want to capture power by force

Referring to the "unholy alliance" of the opposition parties, she said, "Biswa Behaya" (shameless) Ershad and "vote chor" (thief) Khaleda Zia were united to foil democracy and capture power by toppling

Awami League government. They have joined hands to oust the government only to capture power."

She said Khaleda Zia had branded Ershad as the killer of her husband but now she forged an alliance with him in a "shameless manner."

Ershad, who was confined to jail for six years during Khaleda's rule, has joined hands with the BNP leader only to capture power, she said.

Hasina said their other friend, Golam Azam, collaborated with the Pakistani occupation forces during the Liberation War and conducted genocide and repression on women.

She said the opposition parties have made the alliance at a time when the government is busy with development work.

The BNP-led opposition are conducting movement to plunder public money once they are in power, as they did during their rules, she added.

UGC lags way behind schedule

Annual Report for 1998 yet to come out

Commission (UGC), the regulatory organisation for the public and private universities, is running much behind time as it is yet to publish the annual report for the year 1998, although a long period of time has already elapsed.

The UGC officials explained that they were not able to publish the report till now because the concerned universities did not provide necessary information in due time.

"I think the report is in the printing press. It may reach the office within a week," said one of the top officials, on conditions of anonymity. This correspondent made

several attempts during the last nine months for collecting the report. But all the attempts went in vain as the concerned officials made almost similar statements during this period.

According to the UGC sources, there was a constitutional obligation to submit the report of the year 1998 in the parliament within March 31, 1999. But the report was yet to see the light of the day.

Talking to The Daily Star, UGC chairman Professor ATM Zahurul Haque said they were trying to publish, as soon as possible, the annual report for the year 1998. "There were delays for send-

ing the information from public as well as private universities.

The University Grants That is why, the report was not published in due time," he pointed out. When asked, whether there

was any constitutional obligation for publishing the report within March 31, the UGC chairman replied in the negative, but said that the UGC usually sent the annual report to the Parliament Standing Committee through the Ministry of Education for diaus-

He, however, said he was not in a position to throw more light on the delay of publishing the report as he had joined the UGC in April 1999. "I could not say why the delay was made previously. Those who were in the UGC earlier could possibly speak better about the matter.

he said. A former UGC member, who had completed his tenure several months ago, said that they tried to published the annual report regularly since joining the organisation.

He, however, pointed out that the reasons for the delay to publish the annual report for the year 1998 were unknown to him, although he went through the unpublished copy of the report and gave his necessary consent for its publication.

He also requested this correspondent to write on the contents of the annual report apart from the matters relating to the delay in its publication.
