

'Dhaka needs more access to US market'

Bangladesh needs expanded and continued access to US market for developing the country's industrial base and raising the GNP, reports UNB.

"We must push for more market access and it is more vital than anything for Bangladesh's future," said Abdul Awal Minto, President of the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry expressing his views as to how Bangladesh can benefit from Clinton's ensuing visit.

Bangladesh will be benefited much if any agreement for free trade is signed with USA during the visit of the President, he added.

"We should offer bilateral free trade arrangements with USA," he said, echoing the idea floated by leading economist Prof Wahiduddin Mahmud.

He referred to some Asian giants like Japan, Korea, Singapore and Taiwan and said their market access to USA brought them today's prosperity.

To develop its industrial base, Bangladesh must have an uninterrupted access to US market beyond the year 2004. Minto said. Bangladesh needs enough time to prepare for the quota-free regime.

Minto said FBCCI has already approached to the US State Department in Washington and US Embassy in Dhaka for an appointment with Bill Clinton during his stay in Dhaka. Business community is now setting its agenda with special focus on increased cooperation between the two private sectors to place to the US President.

"If we can convince the US president, he may put the mechanism in order before he leaves the office next year," Minto said.

Bangladesh is required to develop its gas resource and develop market for it. USA has

the technology. "We must take an opportunity to convince him (Clinton) for more US technology and capital."

But first of all, US companies must develop their interest about Bangladesh. Clinton's visit, the FBCCI chief said, would infuse interest among US companies and encourage them to invest here.

He said massive US investment is needed in heavy energy consuming industries like cement, fertilizer, paper and chemical and the visit may create more scopes for US investment.

About the government move to sign a long-term agreement with the USA for developing a nuclear power plant, he said it would be a "big gain" for Bangladesh if the US agrees to the proposal.

The visit may also pave the way for complete waiving of the debt under PL-480 and conversion of it into free development assistance, he added.

Above all, the trip of the US president will definitely elevate Bangladesh's prestige in the SAARC as well as in the whole world.

"It will make us more important in world politics," he said.

Int'l conference on manufacturing

Some 100 experts from developed and developing countries began a three-day international conference in the city Thursday to discuss manufacturing for the new millennium, reports UNB.

Vice Chancellor of Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (BUET) Prof Nooruddin Ahmed inaugurated the International Conference on Manufacturing (ICM) 2000 organised by Department of Industrial and Production Engineering of the University.

Experts and practitioners from the USA, UK, Japan, Singapore, Malaysia, Saudi Arabia, India, Finland, Nigeria, Ireland, Papua New Guinea and Bangladesh are attending the conference. Ninety research papers on 14 topics related to manufacturing will be presented in 16 sessions, which

will conclude on Saturday.

Inaugurating the conference, Prof Nooruddin Ahmed said the forum will create opportunities in this field and enable the researchers from both developing and developed world to discuss manufacturing for the new millennium.

Prof M Golam Mohiuddin, head of IPE department, said the people in the 21st century are heading towards a 'Cyber Society' where the evolution of global manufacturing will be a great challenge for the Manufacturing Engineers.

Developments in computer and communication technology, new materials, new manufacturing methods and evolution of global manufacturing for the global market have transformed rapidly during the last couple of decades at a double rate, he added.

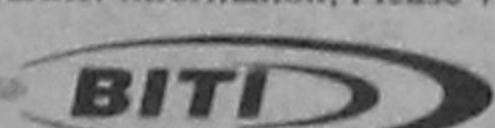
