





A recent study suggested about 29 per cent of professional blood donors suffer from hepatitis B, while 15.8 per cent have syphilis.

"Identification of professional donors and their rehabilitation is essential if we have to stop the dreadful menace of disease." said a senior doctor. The \$3.6 million US pro-

gramme was started as part of the government's plans to improve the safety of the blood supply by promoting voluntary donation. "It is useless to say its safe blood unless we can assure re-

cipients the donated blood contain no infectious diseases or chemical substances that may cause harm, danger or disease. said a health ministry official The donor should not be put at risk by donating blood, either.'

The Rotary Club of Dhaka and the Christian Mission for Development in Bangladesh have taken the lead in raising awareness about the need for safe blood donation. The Red Crescent Society of Bangladesh

is providing technical support. "As part of our service to the civil society we are trying to raise awareness about the voluntary blood donation programme." said the governor of

The annual demand for blood in the country is estimated to be between 200,000 and 250,000 bags. Bangladesh Red Crescent's blood centre in the city supplies about one fourth of the annual demand. The centre's blood is screened for HIV and certain other common diseases.

This means that more than one-lakh patients, mostly women, are still at risk of contracting HIV. hepatitis B and syphilis through blood transfusions annually.
