### Satellite TV trouble

Cable television operators declared a countrywide suspension of many popular satellite channels at the Officers' Club yesterday to protest their distributor's price hikes.

"When Nation-Wide Communications Ltd. decided to increase its fees, we had no choice but to stop transmitting those channels," said S. M. Anwar Parvez, convenor of the Cable Operators' Association of Bangladesh.

Channels affected by the decision include National Geographic, Star Movies, Star Plus, Star World, Star News, Zee Cinema, Sky News, V International, AXN, and TNT. Nation-Wide Communications Ltd. is the only service provider offering those channels in the country.

The channels have already disappeared from household in certain areas of Dhaka and Chittagong.

Almost 1,500 cable operators from thirty districts attended the conference. In addition to the cable cut, they demanded the government recognise their business as an industry, provide opportunities for bank loans and insurance and register the Cable Operators Association as a business organisation.

Commerce Minister Abdul Jalil said he would try to meet the demands after discussing the problem with the Ministry of Information.

### Alleged pickpocket beaten to death

An alleged pick-pocket was beaten to death and two others were injured by passengers of a bus at Sobhankhali in the city yesterday, police and hospital sources said.

The dead was identified as Pinto, 25, a resident of a slum near the Orthopaedic Hospital. The injured two are Zakir, 35 and Nayan, 25, both from a slum at Agargaon. They are being treated at the Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

Witnesses said a gang of eight alleged pick-pockets boarded a Ghati-bound bus at Gulistan at about 10 in the morning. When the bus reached Sobhankhali, some of the passengers found their money lost. On suspicion, they caught three of the gang. The rest ran away, the witnesses said.

The three were beaten severely and then handed over to Dhannondi police. Police took them to DMCH where Pinto was declared dead.

### JCD calls hartal on RU campus tomorrow

From RU Correspondent RAJSHAHI, Mar 9: Jatiya Chhatra Dal (JCD), the student wing of opposition BNP, has called hartal on the campus on March 11 to protest the scheduled visit of Education Minister AHSK Sadek on March 11.

The JCD leaders in a protest rally announced their 'agitation' programme today on the campus. They challenged to prevent the minister from laying the foundation stone of the proposed Sheikh Mujib Hall demolishing Mathbar Hall, the oldest building on the campus.

"If our hartal programme on March 11 is obstructed, we would call hartal on March 12 also," Taiful Islam Tipu, convenor of JCD varsity unit told this correspondent.

However, the Education Minister AHSK Sadek is to visit the campus on March 11 and is expected to lay the foundation stone of Sheikh Mujib Hall to be built on the western part of Mathbar Hall.

When contacted, the Vice Chancellor Prof Sayeedur Rahaman Khan said that hartal would not hamper the minister's visit or foundation laying ceremony. "Mathbar Hall is used for living for a long time. Only its western portion will be demolished, keeping the rest intact, where the proposed hall will be built," the VC added while denying the opposition's allegation of demolition of the hall.

## Mobile operators offer to finance BTTB network expansion

US\$ 5 million investment package for some 100,000 lines proposed

Thousands of mobile phone subscribers will get access to the Bangladesh Telegraph and Telephone Board's system under an infrastructure plan submitted by mobile phone operators.

About 100,000 mobile phone subscribers would be able to access the board's phones once the project was complete. The board would work with the operators as a supervisory authority.

The ministry is examining the private operators' proposal and will make its recommendations," said a ministry official.

There are about 70,000 mobile to subscribers in the country. However, the current system prevents them from calling

"We cannot provide new connections with BTTB's access due to interconnection constraints," said a PBTB source.

## Printers' pain

### Dishonest traders make most of taxation loopholes

Huge quantities of books including text books and those distributed under government's non-formal education programme are printed in India and brought to the country, taking advantage of loopholes in taxation rules.

There is only 5 per cent import duty on 'unfolded printed sheets' like brochure and leaflets.

Taking advantage of this, some unscrupulous business men do the printing work in India, declare the imports as printed materials and complete the binding work in the country to make extra profit, leaders of Bangladesh Mudran Shilpa

Samity (BMSS) said.

This is destroying the budding printing industry and depriving the government of huge revenue, they said. Local publishers are losing printing jobs worth crores of taka every year due to this although modern technology has been introduced in the printing industry, they said.

Sometimes those printed materials are brought into the country "almost duty-free" by showing that the publisher and sender is a foreign national.

All these are done in connivance with officials concerned and law enforcers, they alleged.

### Where's your mother's name?

Immigration and naturalisation services in Europe and North America demand parents' names on birth, medical and school certificates. Immigration authorities in Arab countries also demand both, although there are no hard and fast rules.

The government directed officials to deal with the problem in 1998. Officials with the passport office and educational boards said they were dealing with the matter and would implement the government's decision as soon as possible.

"The highest office in the country is taking a keen interest in the issue," said an official in the home ministry.

## Albright expected on Clinton's entourage

### Secretaries of Commerce, Energy may also come

US Secretary of State Madeleine Albright, Commerce Secretary William Daley and Energy Secretary Bill Richardson are expected to be in Dhaka during President Bill Clinton's visit, it was learnt yesterday.

All the three would be having separate itineraries although their 'main Dhaka schedule' will be integrated with the Clinton's visit. Other details are still being worked out.

President Clinton will see operation of rural micro-credit programmes in two NGO pro-

jects during his March 20 visit, official sources said.

The projects, styled Asrayan, are located at Joypara under Dhamrai thana, some 50 kilometres from Dhaka. These are run by BRAC and Graemeen Bank.

An advance team from the US, now in the city, will visit Dhamrai and take a look at the projects as part of a site inspection survey.

The four-member team led by Terry Bush had an hour-long meeting yesterday with foreign ministry officials led by Foreign Secretary Shafi Sami and

discussed the itinerary of the US President. US Ambassador John C Holzman was also present.

Despite a "basket of proposals", the itinerary will be confirmed with consent from the White House, the sources said.

All the details being proposed and studied are immediately conveyed to the White House, which is controlling the tour programme as a "matter of procedure."

Meanwhile a 51-member security team led by Marine Captain Eric Shambora arrived in

150 megawatt loadshedding in city

By Staff Correspondent Power failed across the country yesterday due to acute shortage in generation.

According to Dhaka Electric Supply Authority (DESA), there was 150 megawatt power shortage in the city yesterday. As a result, many areas remained in the dark for several hours.

The Power Development Board (PDB) allocated 850 MW power for the city and its suburbs yesterday against a demand of more than 1000 MW. The worst affected areas in the city were Bongshah, Armanitola, Babubazar, Nawabpura, Ganda, Azimpur, Dhanmondi, Karwanbazar, Farm gate and Tejgaon.

Power supply in Karwanbazar was disrupted several times during the day. Power supply to the Daily Star office in Karwanbazar went off several times in the evening.

PDB control room sources said the total power demand in the country was estimated to be 2650 MW, but the power plants could produce only 2465 MW.

The generation target was not fulfilled as 12 units did not function yesterday for maintenance purposes, said a PDB source. The units are Ashugan Gas Turbine-2, Shiddhaganj-4, Sylhet Gas Turbine, Fenchuganj Gas Turbine-1, 2, Shahaji Bazar-3, Syedpur Gas Turbine, Khulna Barge-mounted Power Plant, Baghabari Gas Turbine, Khulna 110 MW and Ghurashal-4.

### Attack on opposition's procession in city: 15 hurt

At least 15 people were injured when an opposition alliance procession was attacked, allegedly by Haji Selim, MP yesterday afternoon.

Haji Selim denied any involvement in the attack on the procession of Lalbagh unit members. He said he was shot in the thigh yesterday afternoon near the Central Shaheed Minar at around 5:30 p.m.

"A bullet from my revolver pierced my right thigh when I was returning home from the office," said Selim.

The city unit secretary general of the opposition BNP Abdus Salam contradicted Selim's version of event.

The MP's goons attacked a peaceful opposition party procession near Azimpur Crossing," said Salam.

Golam Morshed, commissioner of Ward No. 63, was leading the procession. He said at least 15 people were injured during the attack, which was led by MP Selim.

"The goons, led by Haji Selim and accompanied by some Ansars, came in a jeep," said Morshed. "They fired blanks and dispersed the procession."

Lalbagh police said they weren't aware that any incident had occurred in the area.

## Rajuk must draw lines

### Demarcation of parks, lakes, open spaces, low-lying areas urged

Rajuk should demarcate all city parks, low-lying areas, lakes and open spaces and notify the public through the press, say professionals.

The call comes as Rajuk begins demarcating Gulshan Lake for the first time.

The professionals said demarcation and notification would help save open spaces, a vital component of any urban environment. Several organised groups, with the connivance of government officials, are grabbing public land. Parks, open spaces, lakes, and canals are their prime targets.

"In the last ten years dozens of playgrounds and parks have been replaced by strange looking markets, community centres and other commercial structures," said a town planner. "Rajuk must take responsibility and demarcate those

areas and publish caution notice." A government architect said all of the city's open spaces would disappear unless immediate action was taken to protect them. This would cause an environmental disaster.

"A healthy city needs to be about 25 per cent open space," said the architect. "Dhaka is roughly 8 per cent."

Another architect said Rajuk should immediately complete the Detailed Area Planning under the Dhaka Master Plan. Unfortunately, work on the DAP is years behind schedule.

"As soon as the DAP is published every nook and corner of the city will be easily identified," said the architect. "There won't be any way for anyone to temper with the restricted areas."

### Row over installation of container terminal
