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Confidence Cement-truckers row threatens Ctg port operations 'Another impasse likely as shipment's due around Mar 18'

The continuing row between the Confidence Cement Ltd and truck owners once again threatens the normal operations at

Chittagong Port. The dispute had already cost 26 hours when the truckers went on a wildcat strike in February as the Confidence Cement authorities took initiatives to carry clinkers using its own dumping trucks. The truckers demand that the factory should carry the clinkers through the 'rotation' system rather than carrying the entire load by its own trucks.

The port users now fear that as another clinker shipment is about to arrive at the port around March 18 and both the factory owners and the truckers are adamant on their points, this may lead to yet another

The crisis cropped up when Confidence imported 21 purpose-built dumping trucks in 1998 as per conditions of the port authorities and the De-

partment of Environment to carry its clinkers. Before this, the company used the trucks supplied by the Truck Owners' year. Association. But none of these trucks duly complied with the port authorities' and Environment Department's conditions.

Because of the rotation system, each truck had to fall into a line and it needed hundreds of trucks to carry 19,000 tonnes of clinkers. This heavily crowded the Chittagong highway and to face a police case for causing traffic jam. On the other hand, the trucks, mostly in bad shape, sprayed clinker particles causing air pollution in the locality and resulting in complaints by the local people to the authori-

The company then calculated that if it carried clinkers using its own trucks, it could save as much as Tk 150 per tonne in transportation costs. its own trucks cost it only Tk Confidence again faced resis-

70. This meant that the company could save Tk nine per bag of cement i.e. Tk three crore a "On top of this, we had to pay

Tk 50 as 'scaling charge' for weighing the loads. This was taken away from us illegally because the weighing machine is owned by us and placed at our factory," said Confidence Director SM Hasan.

So, the company bought its own dumping trucks and used subsequently the company had them for the first time on December 12, 1998. After five days of smooth operation, the truckers blocked the use of the company's own vehicles. Confidence was forced to withdraw its fleet of trucks and it filed a writ petition with the High

After winning the case, the company again tried to use its trucks a year later in December, 1999. A day after, the truckers called a strike and stopped While, the factory had to pay Tk handling other cargoes. How-220 per tonne to the truckers, ever, this did not drag too long.

tance when its third batch of clinkers arrived on February 19 this year. This time, the truckers were more agitating and kept the port shut for 26 hours. After all negotiations failed. Confidence rolled back its trucks under army guard.

"We are now under extreme stress," said the director, adding "large multinational cement factories are coming and we need to cut our costs to remain in the competition. Unfortunately, we have already become hostage to the whims of the truckers.

Port users also find the dispute between Confidence and the truckers quite disturbing.

"Nobody should be obstructed from using his own vehicles to carry his own goods," said Tarek Anis Ahmed, Chairman of the Bangladesh Steamer Agents' Association. "If someone carries his goods quicker, it increases the efficiency of the port and at the same time, helps clear conges-

AHM Manzoor Alam, Chairman of the Bangladesh Master Stevedores Association, is also of the same view. "We can cut costs by quickly unloading our goods by using our own transports," he said, adding that "overstay of ships means demurrage for us."

However, the Truck Owners' Association is not ready to listen to these arguments. "We have been carrying their goods for the last eight years. We even lent them credits when the financial health of their companies was not good. So, should they discard us now just because they are well off?" asks ZahurAhmed, President of the association. "If we allow Confidence to carry their own goods, then others will do the same and we will go out of business."

However, the association's view is more of emotional in nature than logical. But as long as the row continues, the port keeps facing operational uncertainties.

LONDON, Mar 12: British fered the chief executive's job to US Airways chairman Stephen Wolf, The Sunday Times reported, reports AP.

BA called Wolf "almost immediately" after BA's former top executive Bob Ayling an nounced his surprise resignation after four troubled years as head of Britain's largest airline, the newspaper said.

If appointed, Wolf would become the first US boss in the airline's history. BA refused to comment on

Inflation surges to 2.14 pc in India

NEW DELHI, Mar 12: India's inflation rate recorded a marginal increase of 0.6 per cent to 2.14 per cent for the week that ended on February 26, 2000, despite a perceptible decline in the overall price index, report's Xinhua.

According to the Reserve Bank of India, the 0.6 percent age point increase in the annual rate of inflation to 2.14 per cent from 2.08 per cent in the previous week was in contrast with the falling trends witnessed in all the major categories of Wholesale Price Index.

The inflation rate stood at 5.59 per cent in the corresponding week of last year.

IMF policies seen wrecking havoc on eco-system

WASHINGTON, Mar 12: The International Monetary Fund (IMF) needs to take immediate action to reverse the ecological harm its policies and programmes have wreaked in developing countries, according to a new report from a leading environmental group, says IPS.

"The current model of economic development that is being pursued by the IMF (and other international financial institutions) is fundamentally unsustainable, as it seeks growth at all costs without regard to ecological limits," says the report by Friends of the Earth.

The document, titled the IMF: Selling the Environment Short" and written by an international team of veteran environmentalists and economists, examines the IMF's impact in eight borrowing countries and concludes with recommendations to 'green' the agency's operations while restricting its mandate.
