have the natural right to a homeland and to the right to be able to live in peace and tranquility with the other peoples of this area," the pope said with Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat at his side.

"No-one can ignore how much the Palestinian people have had to suffer in recent decades. Your torment is before the eyes of the world. And it has gone on too long," he said.
