## Mahathir for orderly power transfer

KUALA LUMPUR, Mar 30: Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad called today for an orderly transfer of power when he stepped down and said democracy in Malaysia's ruling party was secondary to national interests, reports AFP.

UMNO (United Malays National Organisation) strongly upholds democracy but attention should be (more) on the outcome of democracy than on the democratic approach itself, the state Bernama news agency quoted him as saying.

"Democratic practices are meant to bring out the best results and not lead to disintegration," Mahathir said in his Kubang Pasu constituency in the northern state of Kedah.

Mahathir, 74, who says this will be his last term in office, was apparently responding to implicit criticism from his old rival Tengku Razaleigh Hamzah.

Razaleigh has called for all posts in the ruling (UMNO), which holds leadership elections in May, to be contested.

Its supreme council headed by Mahathir in January "ad-

vised" local divisions that the premier and his preferred successor, Deputy Premier Abdullah Ahmad Badawi, should be nominated unopposed as party president and deputy president.

Holders of the two posts are automatically premier and deputy premier.

Out of the 165 divisions nationwide, 138 have so far met and 137 have nominated Mahathir.

Abdullah has 136 nominations while Razaleigh, who says he does not plan to contest the elections, has one for president and two for deputy president.

Under party rules, neither Mahathir nor Abdullah can now be challenged in May because no opponent could gather the required nominations.

Razaleigh has said UMNO should not ban contests "just so as to keep our own positions secure" and predicted the party would become a dinosaur unless it rejuvenated itself.

Mahathir said a change in the prime ministership was inevitable but should take place in an orderly manner. "No one lasts forever," he said.

## Sharif demands return of democracy

KARACHI, Mar 30: Ousted Pakistani Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif has pleaded for the return of democracy to the country as he awaits the verdict of his hijack trial, reports AFP.

Sharif — who could face the death penalty if he is found guilty of charges including hijacking, kidnapping, attempted murder and terrorism — made his call in notes from his jail cell following the end of his trial late Wednesday.

The ousted leader is on trial with his brother Shahbaz and five senior officials, on charges relating to the night of last year's military coup in Pakistan.

The court has set April 6 for the announcement of the verdict.

In the notes made available to AFP late Wednesday, Sharif lashed out at Pakistan's military regime, saying he "feared for my country" and democracy in Pakistan.

"Pakistan cannot afford adventures and experiments. Today Pakistan is isolated in the investment climate has been de-

stroyed, our borders are threatened by aggressor, the law and order situation has worsened," Sharif wrote.

Sharif added the "only answer to protect the institutions in Pakistan is an immediate return to democracy."

Sharif said he is being kept in solitary confinement in Landhi Jail on the outskirts of Karachi, and spends his time reading, writing and praying.

Although he mainly reads the Quran, he has also read Nelson Mandela's epic autobiography "Long Walk to Freedom."

In the notes he again said charges against him were concocted.

Sharif was ousted in a military coup on October 12, when General Pervez Musharraf seized power and detained him and several of his colleagues.

Sharif is allowed to meet only immediate family members and lawyers while in prison.

His wife Kulsom Nawaz told AFP it was "painful" to see her husband confined in prison. "It

is always painful to see my innocent husband inside the prison. My heart bleeds as I know that he has not committed any crime," she said.

"He has always served the people of Pakistan and has cared for them. And this is no crime. But I have faith in my God that happy moments will come again and truth will prevail," she said.

On Wednesday, Sharif protested his innocence as his trial ended.

During his trial the prosecution alleged Sharif tried to prevent a commercial airliner carrying Musharraf and 198 other passengers from Sri Lanka from landing in Pakistan on the night of the coup.

The plane landed after the army took over Karachi airport and Musharraf seized power.

The trial has been closely observed by diplomats and journalists. During his visit to Pakistan last week, US President Bill Clinton reportedly asked Musharraf to spare Sharif's life.

## 'Britain ready to back US missile defence project'

LONDON, Mar 30: Britain is willing to support the United States in the first stage of its \$50 billion national missile protective shield despite cabinet fears of anti-nuclear protests, the Guardian newspaper reported today, says Reuters.

British Prime Minister Tony Blair has spoken to President Bill Clinton about the missile system and giving assurances of his support, the Guardian said, citing unidentified cabinet sources.

Asked about the report, a Defence Ministry spokesman told Reuters: "No comment."

The Guardian said there were cabinet fears that the project could trigger a revival of mass anti-nuclear protests across Europe.

The first stage of the missile system is designed to give the United States early warning of a nuclear attack by North Korea, the newspaper said.

computer software at an existing US satellite base at Fylingdales in the eastern English county of Yorkshire.

"How can we turn down a request from our closest ally to change its computer software?" an unidentified British cabinet minister was quoted as saying.

The Guardian said the second stage, intended to head off a nuclear attack from Iran, Iraq and rogue Middle East states, would require the massive extension of a US base in Britain.

If the project goes ahead, the United States will then build 200 interceptor missiles to track and destroy incoming nuclear missiles, the paper said.

The Guardian said the French and German governments were opposed to the new generation of weaponry, believing it would breach international treaties and undermine the current balance of deterrence between Russia and the United States.

## Clinton invites Syria to offer new peace ideas

WASHINGTON, Mar 30: President Bill Clinton invited Syria on Wednesday to come up with new peace ideas that answer Israel's concerns about Syria's territorial demands, reports Reuters.

In his most detailed explanation yet of the state of play between Israel and Syria, Clinton told a White House news conference that Syrian President Hafez al-Assad should not just sit and wait for the Israelis to meet his territorial demands.

Clinton put Israel's proposals to Assad in Geneva on Sunday, but Syria said they did not meet its requirement that the Israelis withdraw to the border as it stood on the eve of the Middle East war of 1967, when Israel took the Golan Heights.

Israel said on Wednesday that it had done its utmost to make peace, Syria said that it was up to Israel to make the next move.

Clinton, referring to Assad's response to the detailed Israeli proposals that Clinton passed on the Geneva, said "I don't think it's enough to say: I don't like your position. Come back and see me when I like your position."

"If he disagrees with their territorial proposal, which is quite significant, then there should be some other proposal. I think, coming from the Syrians about how (the Israelis') concerns could be handled," he added.

"Once you know what the other side wants and you don't think you can do it, then you ought to come up with some alternative way of trying to respond to the underlying concerns that are behind the position," he said.

Throughout the contacts between Israel and Syria, Syria has been expected to offer security arrangements such as early

warning stations and demilitarized zones to compensate for the strategic advantage Israel losses by leaving the Golan Heights.

Diplomats say the main territorial obstacle at this stage is a dispute over who should control the eastern shore of the Sea of Galilee, Israel's main freshwater reservoir.

The Syrians say it should be theirs, while Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak does not believe that this meets Israel's security concerns or that his government could win a referendum on a peace deal that gives the shore to Syria, the diplomats add.

Syria refuses to return to direct talks until the Israelis give a commitment to full withdrawal. Israel says the extent of withdrawal depends on the security arrangements and on how far and how fast Syria will allow normal relations.

## 8 die, 72 missing in Pakistan boat capsizes

LAHORE, Pakistan, Mar 30: At least eight people drowned and 72 were missing when a boat capsized on the River Chanab in Pakistan's central province of Punjab on Wednesday, local government officials said, reports Reuters.

Officials in Punjab's Gujrat district, where the boat carrying people to a Muslim religious gathering in the nearby Sialkot district capsized, confirmed eight people had drowned and 72 were missing. But they said the death toll could rise.

There was confusion about the number of people travelling on the boat, AFP putting the total at 50 and officials in Gujrat at about 90.

## Volcano could erupt at any time in Japan

DATE, Japan, Mar 30: Nearly 10,000 people evacuated from their homes kept a nervous vigil today as a volcano in northern Japan rumbled back to life, setting off a series of powerful earthquakes and threatening to erupt at any time, reports AP.

Experts warned an eruption of Mount Usu on the northern Japan island of Hokkaido was imminent. Observers on a military helicopter found cracks had opened up on the volcano's western slope and near its base.

Officials said the crack on the western slope stretched 100 metres.

For the third day, quakes rocked this normally serene hot springs resort area at the base of the volcano. And with the frequency and intensity of the tremors increasing, nerves were beginning to fray.

## Poaching puts tigers in danger

LONDON, Mar 30: New demand across Southeast Asia for the skins, teeth and claws of tigers is endangering much of the species, particularly the Sumatran tiger, according to environmentalists, reports AP.

Traffic, the wildlife trade monitoring programme of the World Wide Fund for Nature and the World Conservation Union, said in a statement Thursday that "the illegal trade in tiger skins has reared its ugly head again."

A WWF field report in Indonesia said that at least 66 Sumatran tigers have been killed in the last two years, amounting to nearly 20 per cent of the tiger population. It said 24 were taken from the Bukit Barisan Selatan national park.

"The report revealed that major illegal supplying markets still operate openly in Southeast Asian countries such as Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Myanmar and Vietnam," said Traffic Executive Director Steven Broad.

## Russians suffer heavy losses in Chechnya

MOSCOW, Mar 30: Russian government forces suffered heavy casualties Wednesday when a column of 49 troops was surrounded by Chechen guerrillas in the southeastern mountains, Russian's news reports said, reports AFP.

SOBR interior ministry troops dispatched to rescue the under-fire column were beaten back by Chechen guerrillas, losing up to three armoured vehicles, state-run RTR television reported from Chechnya.

"I don't know how many victims there were in the column, but there were a great deal," said the channel's correspondent.

"When we were at chiefs of staff headquarters, the suggestion that nearly all the column had been killed was advanced," he added.

Earlier, the station had re-

ported that surviving infantrymen were unable to give their precise location to paratrooper units attempting to give them artillery cover, he said.

The ambush took place near the village of Zhani-Vedeno where the column was surrounded for several hours by mountain-based Chechen fighters who again displayed their ability to hit government forces hard.

In the battle, which raged for about five hours until mid-afternoon Wednesday, three Russian armoured vehicles were destroyed, reports said.

A Russian rescue column was forced to retreat with 14 wounded after coming under guerrilla fire, while Russian artillery was unable to pinpoint rebel positions until the last hour of the gun battle, according to the same source.

## 2 Saturn-sized planets discovered

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar 30: Astronomers searching the skies for distant planets have detected two Saturn-sized worlds orbiting distant stars, the smallest planets found thus far outside our solar system, reports Reuters.

The discovery boosted the likelihood that even smaller planets — perhaps the size of Earth — exist elsewhere in the universe, said professor Steve Vogt of the University of California-Santa Cruz.

"It indicates that there are probably a lot of smaller planets out there," Vogt said in an interview. "It will go all the way

down to planets the size of the Earth or the moon. That's what this is telling us."

The newly detected planets are the latest in a growing number found by a team of astronomers collecting and analysing data provided by Hawaii's Keck I telescope, the sharpest optical telescope in the world.

Begun five years ago, the research is part of a project to scan some 1,100 stars within 300 light-years of Earth identified as likely candidates to support planetary systems and possibly life.

**Russian commander held:** The Russian commander of a tank regiment has been arrested for sexually assaulting and murdering a woman in Chechnya, the Russian president's office announced on Wednesday, AFP reports from Moscow.

A judicial inquiry was opened into the case, it said. Armed forces chief of staff Anatoly Kvashnin told RTR television: "Such elements must be uprooted from our military entity."

**Indonesian plane crashes:** A Hawk-100 trainer and ground attack fighter plane, one of 16 ordered from Britain in 1996, crashed during a training exercise at an airbase in Pekanbaru Sumatra, the airforce said yesterday, AFP reports from Jakarta.

The aircraft crashed at the Simpang Tiga airbase on Wednesday but the pilot ejected safely and came out with only minor injuries. Master Sergeant Subandi (eds: one name) of the airbase told AFP.

## Nobel laureates urge UN to adopt arms code of conduct

UNITED NATIONS, Mar 30: A group of 19 Nobel peace laureates, led by former Costa Rican President Oscar Arias, wants the United Nations to adopt an international code of conduct to regulate the global arms trade, reports IPS.

In a letter to secretary-general Kofi Annan, the group says: "Together, we have written an international code of conduct on arms transfers, which, once adopted by all arms-selling nations, will benefit all humanity, nationalities, ethnicities and religions."

The 11-page code stipulates that any country wishing to purchase arms must meet certain criteria, including the promotion of democracy, the protection of human rights and transparency in military spending.

The code prohibits arms sales to nations that support terrorism and to states that are engaged in aggression against other nations and people. "The international community can no longer ignore the repercussions of irresponsible arms transfers," the letter said.

Besides Arias, the Nobel peace laureates who are signatories to the letter include Archbishop Desmond Tutu of South Africa, Jose Ramos Horta of East Timor and the human rights organisation amnesty international.

The former Costa Rican president, one of the strongest advocates of demilitarisation, has already launched a global

campaign against the international arms trade.

Last month amnesty international urged the United Nations to formulate a mandatory code of conduct to curb the flow of small arms into the world's war zones.

"Governments have talked about the need to stem the proliferation of small arms," Joost Hiltermann, executive director of the arms division of human rights Watch said. But so far, it has been all talk and no action, he added.

Human rights Watch is not only calling for binding codes on arms transfers but also the es-

tablishment of transparency measures, including annual reporting of arms sales, and the creation of a UN Register for Small Arms.

Michaël Rocard, a former French prime minister and head of an eminent persons group, told reporters last month that an international code of conduct could set clear standards for arms transfer eligibility.

The proposed code must also set stringent measures to curtail the black market, and trafficking must be punishable, even if occurs abroad. Additionally, he said, small arms trafficking should be made a treaty crime before the International Criminal Court.

Addressing the security council Friday, ambassador Bernd Niehaus of Costa Rica said his government would strongly support the proposed code.

If it picks up support, the draft code is expected to go before the UN Committee on Disarmament and International Security later this year, and if approved, it will be submitted to the 188-member general assembly for approval. Currently the only major code of conduct governing arms sales is being implemented by the 15-member European Union.

Niehaus said the temptation to use weapons remained latent even in post-conflict situations unless there was disarmament, demobilisation and reintegration.

## Absconding judge held in Mumbai

MUMBAI, Mar 30: Absconding suspended judge J W Singh, accused in a case of extortion and nexus with underworld don Chota Shakeel, was yesterday arrested by police outside a city court amidst drama and arguments between the prosecution and defence, reports PTI.

Singh, who was declared proclaimed offender in February in a case of extortion filed against him under a tough Maharashtra law, surrendered before designated judge A P Bhargale in keeping with a high court directive after a protracted legal battle on technicalities failed to help him.
