Hasina tells press
Kashmir issue
can be resolved
thru' Indo-Pak
dialogue

LYNCHBURG, Virginia, Apr 8: Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina told American newsmen Friday the long-running conflict between India and Pakistan over Kashmir could be settled through peaceful dialogue between the two rival neighbours, reports UNB.

"If they could resolve their long-standing conflict," she told a press conference immediately after receiving the Key of Lynchburg City at the Smith Memorial Hall of the Randolph-Macon Women's College.

The Prime Minister said after the nuclear tests by India and Pakistan in May 1998, she undertook a peace mission to urge both New Delhi and Islamabad to halt the nuclear arms race in the interests of peace in South Asia.

When asked about the empowerment of women in Bangladesh, Hasina said they were still neglected and her government was doing its best to empower, educate and involve them in the decision-making and development process.

If women were properly educated, they could stand on their own feet and attain economic self-reliance, said Hasina.

Power failure
hits many
city areas

Dhaka and surrounding area experienced a 150-megawatt power shortage yesterday.

The Dhaka Electricity Supply Authority received 870 megawatts from the Power Development Board compared to its 1,020-megawatt demand.

Gulistan, Nawabpur Road, Old Dhaka, Mohammadpur, Dhanmondi, Maghbazar, Malibagh, Elephan Road, Farmgate, Kawran Bazar, Tejgaon, Mohakhali and Gushan were hardest hit by power disruptions.

Residents along Elephant Road complained the power shortages prevented them from watching the cricket match on television.

Power Development Board control room sources said the total deficit in power generation was only 111 megawatts. The country produced 2,525 megawatts compared to its 2,650-megawatt demand. Eleven power plants are still out of order.



guided Asia Eleven to a mammoth 320 for nine in 50 overs.

Wasim Akram's side rode on a 114-run second wicket partnership between the two Indians after Akram decided to bat first at the packed stadium.

Tendulkar made a blazing 80 runs off 77 balls, belting eleven boundaries while Ganguly, who came in the squad in place of Saeed Anwar, scored 67 runs off 66 balls with six fours and three big sixes.

Both the batsmen returned

to the pavilion offering catches to Franklin Rose at long-on off English left-arm spinner Phil Tufnell, who was the most expensive bowler in the innings. His nine overs cost 68 runs.

Sanath Jayasuriya and

Sachin Tendulkar opened the Asian Eleven innings but their association did not last long.

South African speedster Nantie Hayward gave his side the breakthrough when he had dashing Jayasuriya caught at square leg by Michael Bevan.

Jayasuriya made only 12. Former Indian captain Tendulkar opened his account by whacking Andrew Caddick to the cover boundary in the second ball of the innings.

The right-handed opener, arguably the best in business, reached his 50 off 48 deliveries, cracking the ball across the rope nine times.

However, Tendulkar was dropped at 70 when Tufnell failed to get hold of a return catch and in the very next ball the English off-spinner also dropped Saurav Ganguly when he was on 41.

Ganguly had another close call when Australian wicket-keeper Adam Gilchrist failed to hold the ball in his gloves off a Rose delivery when the Indian was on 11.

Half of foodgrains allocated for projects unutilised

More than half of the foodgrains sanctioned for distribution under the Public Food Distribution System in the current financial year remained stockpiled in government silos even after eight months of the year due to slow progress in food-supported development projects.

The allocation under PFDS in the current fiscal is 20 lakh tonnes. But till February, 9,83,000 tonnes were distributed, according to food ministry records. If the government wants to exhaust the full budgetary allocation, it has to utilise over 10 lakh tonnes by June.

Lesser food distribution for development projects has put the performance of PFDS to question, sources said. The PFDS is not performing well, they observed.

Speedy implementation of projects and taking up of fresh ones could create more work for the unemployed rural workforce during the lean period, they observed.

But officials claim that all food-supported projects were on time and allocation under the Food for Work (FFW) Programme was raised to 7, 5,000 tonnes from 5, 25,000 tonnes to face the situation.

In addition to the budgetary allocation, the government released one lakh tonnes for projects under the Local Government Engineering Department and another 50,000 tonnes under the Water Development Board, the officials said.

In January, the Directorate of Food had spent out a government plan for delivery of 12 lakh tonnes under the PFDS during the current dry season for infrastructure development, vulnerable group feeding (VGF), vulnerable group development (VGD) and relief projects.

The officials said, due to stable rice price, there has been no pressing need for operation of OMS (open market sale of rice) by the government. This also contributed to lesser release of food grains from silos, they said.

The supply and stock position of food grains are very good because of the good harvests. As a result, commercial import of four lakh tonnes, planned earlier, may not be necessary. Food grains stock with the government was 15, 7,000 tonnes in March, the food ministry report said.

No funds for new power transmission lines

The power sector in the country is heading for a major crisis due to lack of required power transmission infrastructure and funds for building it.

It has become urgent for the government to set up new inter-regional power transmission systems while pursuing new power projects, but the donors are unwilling to fund any project in the public sector, a well-placed source in the Power Development Board (PDB) said.

The donors further said that though the PDB handed over some assets and transmission lines to PGCB, the company could not be properly launched. The whole power transmission system in the country should go to PGCB from PDB, they say.

On the other hand, PDB is unwilling to hand over more power lines to PGCB right now as it believes that PGCB is not "matured enough to handle and pursue new transmission lines," he said.

The PDB has made some proposals to set up new transmission lines but the donors and lending organisations are unwilling to finance installation of any such project, spe-

cially those pursued by the PDB, he said.

The donors, led by the World Bank, are clearly saying that they will consider financing power distribution projects pursued only by the newly formed Power Grid Company of Bangladesh (PGCB) and not by the PDB," he said.

The donors further said that though the PDB handed over some assets and transmission lines to PGCB, the company could not be properly launched. The whole power transmission system in the country should go to PGCB from PDB, they say.

Besides these, PDB has proposed a number of small projects. These include setting up of transmission lines in Meherpu, Thakurgaon, Chuadanga, Magura, Patharghat, from Chandpur to Comilla and from Sylhet to Ashuganj.

"Without these transmission lines, power supply from new plants in Barapukuria, Sylhet, Chandpur, Baghabari and other places will not be possible at all. As a result, there will be

**Biman's F-28
averts mishap
after bird
hits engine**

A Bangladeshi Biman F-28 narrowly averted a mishap while landing at Zia International Airport yesterday after a bird hit one of its two engines.

The flight from Sylhet landed safely, said aviation sources. However, airport security denied that any such incident occurred.

Birds, especially Pariah Kites, live around ZIA, drawn to nearby ponds that are leased to fishers.

The men who cull the birds are often helpless, since their guns are often unserviceable. Sometimes they only have one gun per shift, said sources.

Despite news items published in different newspapers about the menace posed by the birds, the situation has not improved.

Meanwhile, officials discovered another Biman F-28 was missing one of its flaps after it arrived from Jessore yesterday.

Both aircraft were purchased recently from Indonesia.

Another F-28, the third in Biman's fleet, had trouble with its radar yesterday.

Biman had trouble fulfilling its domestic flight schedule due to the technical problems.
