"I'm surprised, disappointed and still coming to terms with the decision.





Ali sues to recover boxing robe

LOUISVILLE, Kentucky, Apr 22: Muhammad Ali is suing to recover a boxing robe he wore early in his career, reports AP. Ali contends the robe was taken by Walter E Cuff, who once worked for the former heavyweight champion's mother in Louisville.

In a lawsuit filed this week, Ali says he didn't know where the robe was, and assumed it had been lost or stolen. He says Cuff called his office in Michigan, where the boxer now lives, in February to discuss selling the robe back to him.

A trial has not been scheduled, though Jefferson Circuit Judge Judith McDonald-Burkman issued an injunction barring Cuff from selling the robe until the case is resolved.

Michael Runner, Cuff's lawyer, says the robe was a gift to his client, who occasionally helped out around the house for Ali's mother, Odessa Clay, doing tasks such as cutting grass or cleaning the garage. Odessa Clay died in 1994.

Runner said his client was planning to sell the robe but wanted to give Ali a chance to buy it. "He hasn't done anything

not trying to cause any trouble".


