# Call of an ailing planet

The fact that we face an ecological crisis without any precedent in historic times is no longer a matter of dispute. In that perspective, the role of leadership is critical in spreading awareness, in achieving solutions and in projecting a vision of the future we want to create as well as a vision of the nightmare we wish to avoid, writes Md. Asadullah Khan

N the backdrop of the observance of Earth Day on April 122 every year since 1989. response from world leaders except a few like American Vice-President Albert Gore, now seeking US presidency, and some European leaders, has been extremely subdued. As Al Gore also characterised as early as in 1989, the greenhouse effect, the depletion of the ozone layer and the global ecological crisis have been recognised as the most serious issue facing all of us. Unfortunately, world leaders were afraid of talking uncertainty about the greenhouse effect and dire nature of the ecological crisis we face, just as excuses for inaction. In a situation when strong responses are needed, the natural psychological tendency is to magnify the uncertainty and say, "well, may be we won't really have to face up to it". But the fact that we face an ecological crisis without any precedent in historic times is no longer a matter of dispute.

The barrier still is lack of political action and with it comes an unwillingness to believe that something so far outside the bounds of historical experience can, in fact, be occurring. In a sense people have started assuming that it can't be real. People have also started assuming that it will be easier and more sensible to adapt to whatever climate change occurs than it will be to prevent the crisis. But ironically, the changes are taking place so fast that adaptation will be all but impossible. Another barrier to concrete action is the lack of widespread awareness among the peoples of the world about the nature of the problem. Most political leaders, let alone the general masses, either in our country or elsewhere, are mostly unaware of what is happening and how severe it is. The biggest barrier to action is the knowledge that many of the ultimate solutions are almost unimaginably difficult. And since they are harder than anything people have either conceived or done before, efforts of any type or nature may all come to naught anyway.

These barriers must be overcome. In that perspective, the role of leadership is critical in spreading awareness, in achieving solutions and in projecting a vision of the future we want to create as well as a vision of the nightmare we wish to avoid. Since 1989 "Earth Day

Summit" environmentalists sounded a grim warning for this planet listing it as endangered and alerting people around the world to the wide range of environmental problems that were just beginning to grab the attention of people. Encouragingly, in 1992 Rio de Janeiro Earth Summit, world leaders pledged governmental funds and support for efforts to save the planet. But the progress achieved in governmental front in different countries is hardly anything worth the name. Rather in most countries private companies are taking the initiative in developing technological solutions to the planet's maladies. People are now going to have fuel-efficient, low-pollution car, etc. Great breakthroughs are being made on solar energy. Agricultural scientists are now convinced that with the advent of genetic modification of plants and seeds, they can now feed double the world's current populations. Most encouragingly, the recycling business is doing better than it was some years ago.

More so, since 1990 people in different global festival or rallies and workshops have raised their voices to publicise the plight of an ailing planet and heads of state pledged to take action to ward off problems such as global warming and destruction of wild life. Some more steps could help preserve the environment. Environmentalists have suggested that in the absence of higher gasoline taxes, which seems to be an anathema in the US although the US is the primary producer of CO2 (carbon dioxide), setting strict fuel efficiency requirements for new cars is an alternative route to conservation. The US produces 21 per cent of the world's carbon dioxide, while China with 4.5 times as many people generates 11 per cent. The technological advancement has reached so far as to boost the average mileage achieved by US cars from 26.5 mpg to 45 mpg by 2000.

The next step is to launch mammoth international tree planting programme now initiated by industrial giants like Union Carbide, which promised to plant half a million trees by 2000 as well as the leaders of the US and Australia who have promised a billion trees each.

Banning CFC production completely: While relatively little headway has been made to-

ward putting international treaties like Montreal Protocol 1987, which pledged a 50 per cent reduction in production of ozone destroying chlorofluorocarbons by 1999, into effect, encouragingly individual countries æ and states and cities within them æ and some manufacturing companies have been moving forward taking their own action and setting their own standards. Entrepreneurs and companies large and small around the world are busy developing clean technologies of the future. Assuringly, plastic foam manufacturers in the US stopped using CFCs in their products and Vermont has decreed that the chemicals must be eliminated from auto airconditioners in new cars to be

sold in the state henceforth. Major CFC suppliers like Du Pont have developed substitutes that are much less harmful to the ozone.

Banning export of waste: The next step is to be taken in line with the Basle convention governing international shipment of waste. The document does not propose to ban waste exports altogether, but it would impose tight restrictions. No waste could cross national lines unless adequate environmental precautions were taken and the government of the importing nation gave its approval.

Over population: Underlying almost every environmental ill is the relentless growth of the human population. By the year

2050, the globe will have to accommodate 10 billion people, 4 billion more than today. Failure to check birth rate could undermine efforts on every other front: If per capita carbon dioxide emissions are reduced by 10 per cent, for example, a 10 per cent population increase would virtually wipe out the improvement. The issue was tabled in UN convened population summit in Cairo.

Despite protests from different orthodox religious groups. which argued that the conference agenda was promoting abortion and artificial birth control, the delegates reached a surprisingly strong consensus that women should be given great control over reproduction and better access to family

planning services. The conference agenda called on governments to pledge USD 17 billion annually to the cause of slowing population growth.

Destruction of wildlife: The second convention in Rio signed a declaration to stem the loss of bio-diversity, the irreplaceable variety of animal and plant life around the globe. Every year 20,000 species become extinct, largely because human-ity is destroying their habitats. As many as 17 million hectares of tropical rain forest are destroyed every year. The agreement calls on countries to identify endangered species and preserve the places where they live. Plausibly it is true that developing nations would feel in-clined to protect forests and other wild areas if they have a financial incentive to do so. It was also stipulated in the Rio convention that when a company would go for manufacturing a medicine or other commercial product out of ingredients from a rare plant or animal, it should share the proceeds with the nation where the discovery was made. But shockingly, the convention does nothing to stop the inexorable advance of logging companies, settlers and land speculators who are chopping down or torching tropical forests before all their biological treasures are discovered. What is needed is to develop local organisations and educational programmes to impress upon people the value of nature's genetic diversity.

These programmes have been slow in getting started. Encouragingly, in at least one important region, there has been some progress. The island of Madagascar is home to a stunning array of animal, plant

was even 150 years ago. Overfishing and over-exploitation of plant and wild life are putting increasing amounts of stress on the viability of this delicate ecosystem. Reports have it that as many as six mammal species indigenous to the Sunderbans have become extinct and over 46 wildlife species have been listed as en-

dangered æ among them the Royal Bengal Tiger. Acknowledging the necessity to preserve this intricate ecosystem upon persuasion from the government of Bangladesh, UNESCO has recently declared the Sunderbans as a World Heritage Site æ undertaking the responsibility for its preservation. The USD 82 million worth extensive Sunderbans Bio-diversity Conservation Project to be financed by a loan from the Asian Development Bank (ADB) will go a long way in conserving this natural heritage so vitally needed to ward-off climatic disruptions and ecological disturbances that results from its present fragile system. Its unique flora and fauna and genetic diversity are an important gene pool for mankind like many of the tropical forests elsewhere in the world. Its role as a CO2 (carbon dioxide) sink and a reclimatic balance is well known. As it is seen now, starting from Bangladesh to elsewhere, the world's flora and fauna are paying the price of humanity's population growth. The levy may be acceptable to those who put immediate human concerns above all else. But it should be borne in mind that we are destroying part of the creation. thereby depriving all future generations of what we ourselves were bequeathed.

are substances originally extracted from plants, animals, fungi and micro-organisms Aspirin, for example, the most widely used medicine in the world was derived from salicylic acid, which in turn was discovered in a species of mead-

Only a minute fraction of the species or organisms æ probably less than one per cent æ have been examined for natural products that might serve as medicines. There is a critical need to press the search in case of antibiotics and anti-malarfal agents. In Bangladesh, no scientific study has been done on an array of vast plant and animal species in the Sunderbans. The substances most commonly used today are growing less effective, as the disease organisms acquire genetic resistance to the drugs. The bacterium staphylococcus, for example, has recently re-emerged as a potentially lethal pathogen and the micro-organism that causes pneumonia is growing steadily more dangerous. The age of antibiotics, it has now been speculated, is over. Predictably, medical researchers are now locked in a battle with the rapidly evolving pathogens that is certain to grow more serious. Now they have to turn to source bank for maintaining a broader array of wild species to discover new weapons of the 21st century medicine.

The conclusion of scientists and conservationists is: the only way to save wild species is to maintain them in their original habitats. Considering the way such habitats are shrinking, the solution will be a daunting task. Many ecosystems have already been lost, others seem doomed.
