

## Pak, SA tours of SL to go ahead

COLOMBO, May 5: Cricket tours by Pakistan and South Africa to Sri Lanka will go ahead as scheduled beginning June despite the country being put on war status to fight Tamil Tiger rebels, reports AP.

"The government will not object to the matches being played. These tours are a commercial venture," said Rennie Wijetilleke, chairman of the country's cricket board.

Wijetilleke was quoted as saying in the state-run Daily News that the only concern was that the two countries would have reservations about security situation in Sri Lanka. "But I think the tour will go ahead as planned," he told the newspaper.

The government has invoked the Public Securities Act empowering police and military to take any action to save the sovereignty of the country and imposed censorship after putting the country on a war status. The military is fighting Tamil Tigers, who have said they will try to retake Jaffna, their former capital.

The matches are to be played in Colombo the port city of Galle in southern Sri Lanka and in Kandy in central Sri Lanka.

The Pakistan team is due on June 8, while South Africa will arrive on July 3. Both countries are scheduled to play a series of three Tests against Sri Lanka and also participate in one-day triangular tournament.

## Malik ready for inquiry

KARACHI, May 5: Pakistan's former cricket captain Salim Malik said Friday he was ready to face any inquiry on match-fixing and rejected reports that he was planning to quit the country for good, reports AFP.

"I am in Pakistan and will remain in Pakistan until all the inquiries clear me," Malik told this news agency from Lahore.

Malik, the central character in Pakistan's match-fixing controversy, is one of two players who faces a life ban from the game.

Malik Mohammad Qayyum, a judge of the Lahore High Court who headed a judicial probe into bribery and match-fixing allegations in Pakistan cricket reportedly said his recommendations after a year long inquiry included a life ban on Malik and leg-spinner Mushtaq Ahmed.

Mushtaq is on the West Indies tour with the Pakistan team.

"I went to England for personal work but my detractors were again quick to drag my name into wrong things," Malik said.

Australian cricketers, Shane Warne, Mark Waugh and Tim May, claimed Malik offered them bribes to play poorly during Australia's tour of Pakistan in 1994.

## Latif criticises cricket bosses

KARACHI, May 5: Pakistan's former Test captain Rashid Latif said Friday the International Cricket Council (ICC) had done paper work instead of anything "concrete" against the menace of match-fixing, reports AFP.

"They have once again formed committees like they did last year, they have not done anything concrete," said Latif, a central figure in match-fixing controversy in Pakistan.

"They had formed a committee in January 1999 but it never held any meetings until now," he said.

Latif said in a statement he had set up an internet website on match-fixing.

"Anybody who wants to read evidence can surf my site -- rashedlatif.8k.com -- and in a short time there will be some startling news on match-fixing on the site," he said.

The site will provide evidence recorded by Judge Malik Mohammad Qayyum's inquiry commission in Pakistan during 1998-1999, he said.

"I will not spare those who have polluted the sacred game, nor will I leave cricket," Latif said.

Latif also criticised ICC president Jagmohan Dalmiya.

Evidence of former Pakistan captains Imran Khan, Javed Miandad, Aamir Sohail and Rameez Raja and of Ataur Rehman and Aaqib Javed will be available on the site, he added.

## Kafelnikov fails on clay again

PALMA, Spain, May 5: A super-motivated Juan Ignacio Chela of Argentina ended top seed Yevgeny Kafelnikov's interest in the second round of the 500,000 dollars Mallorca Open here on Thursday, reports AFP.

When rain interrupted their match Wednesday night Kafelnikov had struggled to take the first set 7-5, while Chela, who showed his form when he claimed the scalp of seventh-seed Tim Henman in the Monte Carlo Masters Series event a fortnight ago, had run away with the second 6-0.

The third stood all square at 3-3 but it took Chela just eight minutes to rattle off three quick games and win that and a place in the next round 6-3.

## German Cup final

# Bayern couldn't care less



COLOGNE, Germany, May 5: Stung 2-0 by Real Madrid in the opening leg of the Champions League semi-final Bayern Munich have dragged themselves back home for a game they are not keen to play: the German Cup Final against Werder Bremen, reports AFP.

It is one of the most prestigious events in the German Football Federation's calendar but the Cup has lost a lot of its shine in recent years.

An over full season of European commitments has left little time or interest for it among Germany's top clubs.

Bayern Munich have bigger fish to fry. Manager Uli Hoeness has firmly stated that the club's absolute top priority is the Champions League, a burning ambition for Bayern after last year's bitter last minute defeat by Manchester United, and all else will be sacrificed for it.

That, he insists, means the German Cup.

"We were far too nervous and held back too much," Bayern president Franz Beckenbauer added after the Real loss.

"There's no point in even coming here if you are only going to give 20 percent. Still next week's return leg game and the Champions League remain our top priority. You can forget about Saturday (the German Cup final). No one cares about that."

The problem is not the Cup itself but its timing. Traditionally the German football season comes to an end on a muddy Saturday in Berlin's Olympic stadium, a cathartic end to 10 draining months of football.

This year though, to accommodate UEFA's European championships in Holland and Belgium where out-of-form Germany will be the defending

champions, national coach Erich Ribbeck requested the Bundesliga game be reorganised to give him more time to prepare the squad.

That has meant the German Cup final being wrenched out of its usual place in the calendar and squeezed in two rounds before the end of the regular season.

That is bad news for Bayern Munich because the final now comes right in the middle of their two Champions League

return leg battle against Real. "That's all just tactics by Hoeness," Bremen star Marco Bode said, "I reject claims the German Cup is not worth anything any more. Hoeness is always annoyed when he loses - like last year. Bayern will give 100 percent and send out their best team."

Maybe, because revenge is the best motivation of all. Saturday's final will be a repeat of last year's.

Twelve months ago Bayern entered the final as hot favourites but they eventually lost in a penalty shoot out, clear evidence of broken spirit and psychological scarring caused by the Lazarus-like job Manchester United did on them days earlier in Barcelona.

Bayern manager Hoeness doesn't forget things like that quickly, especially against old foes like Werder Bremen.

"It is always especially sweet for Hoeness to beat Bremen. He enjoys them wins more than any other," Bayern defender Markus Babel said.

"Sometimes we get paid a bonus for defeating Bremen. They are his favourite club to beat."

"Last year there was criticism because the Cup final was played two weeks after the Bundesliga season ended."

"Now there are other people complaining. Personally I think this year's arrangement is better than last year's."

"My biggest worry is concentration. Normally you get butterflies before a final. This time though we are coming straight from the Champions League game in Madrid."

"That means we won't even have a chance to think about Bremen until Thursday and that takes away any butterflies. Our sense of anticipation and excitement for the final are completely gone."

tiebreak. "She didn't miss as much and I didn't move the ball as well as in the first set, and I missed a couple of easy shots when I tried to force her."

Sixth seed Anna Kournikova used the same tactics that she employed to dispose of her first round opponent as she swept aside Sarah Pitkowski of France 6-3, 6-0.

A heavy forehand combined with some exquisitely executed dropshots gave her the upper hand against an enthusiastic but less gifted opponent, and earned her a quarterfinal clash with top seed Martina Hingis.

Seventh seed Anke Huber joined fellow German Andrea Glass in the last eight with a 6-1, 6-3 win over Belgium's Sabine Appelmans.

Glass, a wild card entry, edged past Tatiana Panova of Russia 7-6, 6-3. Third seed Conchita Martinez of Spain struggled past Bulgarian qualifier Lubomira Bacheva 6-4, 5-7, 6-4, and eighth seeded South African Amanda Coetzer beat Anne-Gaëlle Sidot of France 6-1, 6-4.

## Chawla claims innocence

LONDON, May 5: A businessman wanted for questioning by Indian police over the Hansie Cronje match-fixing scandal declared his innocence on Friday, reports AP.

Sanjeev Chawla, a London-based clothing importer, is alleged to have been the man whose incriminating telephone call to the South African captain was secretly taped.

It was that call that eventually led to Cronje admitting he took money from a bookmaker in return for giving match information in the biggest scandal to hit the proud old game of cricket.

Cronje was stripped of the captaincy and lost his place on the South African team while independent investigations began into match-fixing in South Africa, England and India.

# ACB's means to stay free from corruption



MELBOURNE, May 5: Australian cricketers will be asked to sign a public undertaking stating they

are clean of corruption before every Test and one-day series, reports AFP.

While the documents have no legal binding, moral and ethical standards placed on players were lauded as the world's toughest by the Australian Cricket Board (ACB) today.

Players and officials will sign the undertakings to remind them of obligations and provide the public a guarantee matches would be played on merit. ACB chief executive Malcolm Speed said.

Speed revealed five initiatives to ensure corruption failed to take a hold in Australian cricket.

In addition to the public undertaking, the ACB resolved to:

• Appoint a special investigator charged with probing corruption in Australia who Speed hoped would have "very little to do."

• Call a meeting of other Australian sporting bodies to discuss corruption in sport.

• Immediately adopt penalties decided by the International Cricket Council at a meeting earlier this week and.

• Expand the ACB education program to include every State cricketer, academy inductees and under-19 players, administrators, umpires and even groundsman.

"We're ahead of the rest of the

world in respect of the processes that we have in place and that we will put in place," Speed said.

The public undertakings were intended for "moral" and "ethical" reasons but not to create a legal responsibility, he said.

"It's an undertaking to the public that the game is going to be played on its merits," Speed said.

Australian Cricketers' Association president Tim May said the undertakings would also be a constant reminder to players against corruption.

Reuters adds from Sydney that ACB ruled out a review into the case of Shane Warne and Mark Waugh who were fined five years ago for providing weather and pitch information to bookmakers.

The pair were sanctioned after supplying the information during Australia's 1994 tour of Sri Lanka but the matter was not made public until December, 1998.

ACB chief executive Malcolm Speed said there would be no review as Warne and Waugh had already been tried.

The ACB formally adopted the International Cricket Council's (ICC) mandatory life bans on players found guilty of match-fixing, announced on Wednesday after an emergency ICC meeting at Lord's.

In a statement the ACB also said it would convene a conference with the leaders of Australia's other major sports to identify common strategies to tackle corruption in sport.

## Vaughan uncertain England delay training

LONDON, May 5: England have cancelled a planned training camp ahead of the first Test against Zimbabwe in order to give players more match practice with their own county teams, reports Reuters.

England coach Duncan Fletcher said on Thursday excessive rain during April had meant little cricket being played and it was decided players would gain more effective preparation for the first Test by playing county matches.

"We want to give the England players another chance to get valuable middle practice, for batsmen to get runs in competitive situations and for bowlers to bowl long spells," Fletcher said.

The training camp had been scheduled for May 11-13 but the squad will now meet at Lord's on May 15 to prepare for the first Test which starts three days later.

Meanwhile, middle-order batsman Michael Vaughan is in doubt for the first Test against Zimbabwe after retiring hurt with a suspected broken finger on Thursday.

Vaughan, one of the contracted England players after a promising debut in the losing series against South Africa, scored 155 for Yorkshire against Derbyshire. He left the field after he was struck by Matthew Cassar on his left hand.

Zimbabwe's stand-in bowling coach Jeff Thomson told The Sun the tourists had a good chance of beating England in the two-Test series.

"If I was Zimbabwe, I wouldn't lose any sleep over England. Said the former Australia fast bowler. "Apart from Australia the overall standard is rubbish."

## Holyfield- Ruiz bout June 10

LAS VEGAS, May 5: Evander Holyfield and John Ruiz did their best Thursday to sell their June 10 bout as a legitimate heavyweight title fight, reports AP.

Just to be sure the point was made promoter Don King did his best to help.

"I guarantee you this fight will be a better world championship fight than Lewis and grant," King said. "That fight was a farce."

Holyfield and Ruiz got together for the formal announcement of their fight for the WBA portion of the heavyweight title, only five days after Lennox Lewis demolished Michael Grant in less than two rounds to retain the other two major portions of the title.

AUS federal court order stripping Lewis for defending his title against Grant instead of Ruiz, the WBA's top contender, means the heavyweight title is fractured once again.

Both fighters used the Lewis Grant fight to justify their reasoning that Lewis should have to vacate the title for not fighting the top contender.

"Lewis thought Grant should have been No. 1. He must have been out of his mind," Ruiz said.

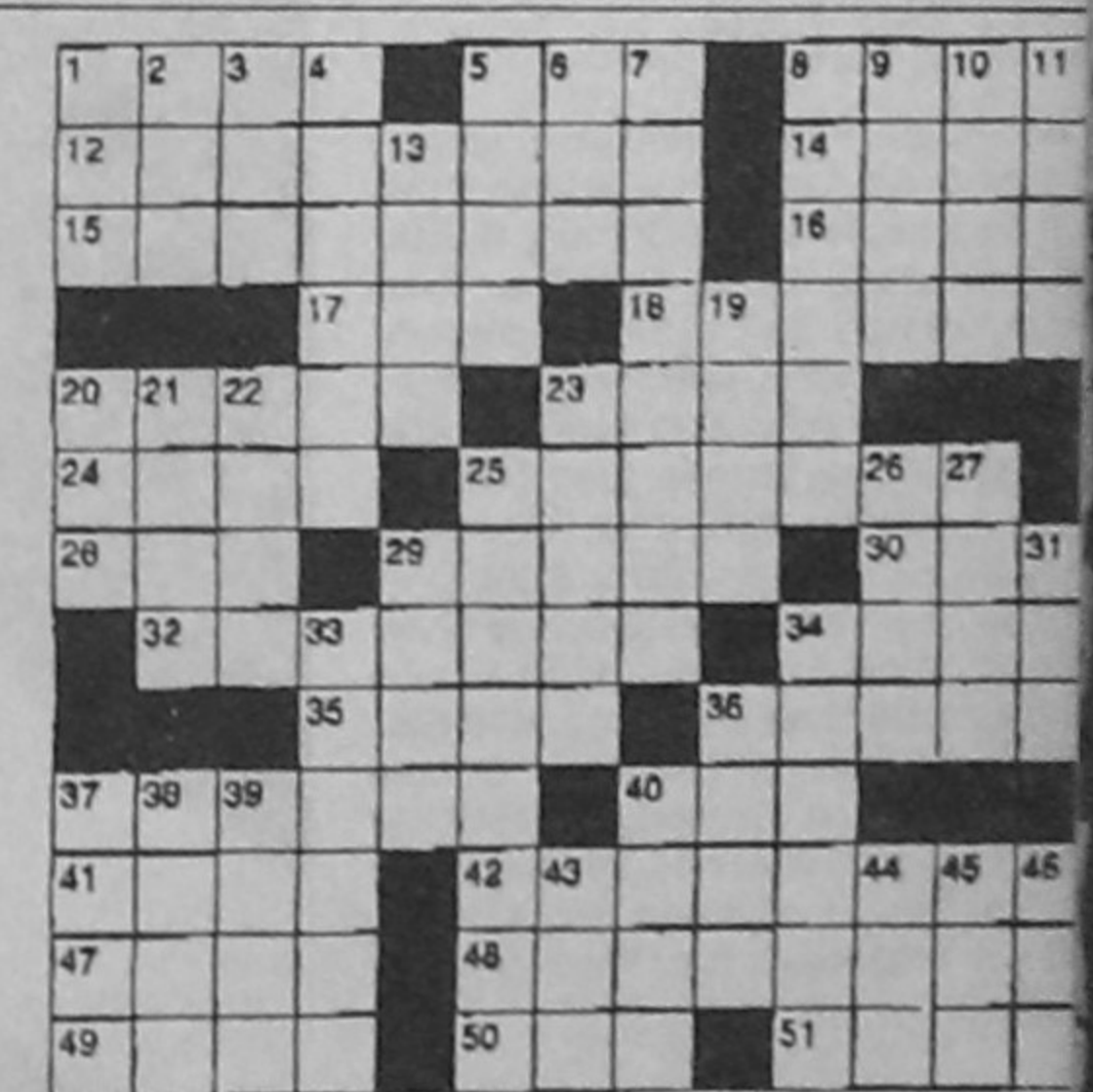
