

Refusal to okay China pact will fuel Sino-Taiwanese tension

US president warns Congress

WASHINGTON, May 9: President Bill Clinton predicted yesterday that tensions between China and Taiwan would escalate "exponentially" if Congress refused to grant permanent trading privileges to China in a key vote this month, says Reuters.

Former Presidents Gerald Ford, Jimmy Carter and George Bush pressed Congress on Monday to support legislation that would extend permanent normal trade relations to China and ensure that US companies benefit from Clinton's landmark trade agreement with Beijing.

Clinton used a Democratic fund-raiser on Monday evening to press for the bill's passage, warning of dire consequences if the House of Representatives failed to approve it.

"I think the chances that there will be trouble between China and Taiwan will go up exponentially if the United States says no," Clinton told a crowd at a fund-raising event for Indiana Representative Baron Hill.

"I've already had to send car-

rier groups to the Taiwan Straits once, and I don't want to do it again," Clinton told guests at a private residence in the upscale Maryland suburb of Bethesda.

In the latest Reuters poll of the 435-member House, 161 lawmakers said they would or were likely to support permanent normal status for Chinese trade. 57 short of the number needed for passage. One hundred sixty members said they would or were likely to oppose the bill when the House voted in the week of May 22. Another 98 lawmakers said they were undecided, and 16 members did not respond.

In contrast to the House, passage by the Senate is virtually assured in early June.

The trade agreement, which paves the way for China to join the Geneva-based World Trade Organisation, calls on Beijing to open a wide range of markets, from agriculture to telecommunications.

In exchange, the White House says, Congress must permanently grant China the normal trade status it now enjoys only

after an annual congressional review. The status would guarantee Chinese goods the same low-tariff access to US markets as products from nearly every other nation.

The trade bill faces stiff opposition in the House from Democrats, who have demanded that China show greater respect for human rights and improve its labour standards.

Another report says: legislation granting China permanent trading privileges in the United States will easily win Senate approval next month, Senate Democratic Leader Tom Daschle said yesterday.

"We have more than enough votes to pass it," Daschle of South Dakota told ABC's "This Week."

The Senate is expected to take up the trade legislation in early June, after a vote between May 22-26 in the deeply divided House of Representatives.

Its prospects for passage in the House remain uncertain because of stiff opposition from Democrats, who have demanded that China first im-

prove human rights and labour standards.

Nonetheless, Daschle said he was "increasingly encouraged" about the House vote. "We're not there yet, but we're a lot closer than we were just a few weeks ago," he told ABC.

The Clinton administration signed a landmark trade agreement with China in November 1999.

In exchange, the White House says Congress must grant China permanent normal trade relations (PNTR) — a status it now enjoys only after an annual congressional review. PNTR would guarantee Chinese goods the same low-tariff access to US markets as products from nearly every other nation.

To bolster House Democratic support for the pact, the administration said it would support parallel legislation which calls for Congress to set up a commission that would review Chinese human rights and labour policies and could recommend sanctions against Beijing as long as they were consistent with World Trade Organisation (WTO) rules.

Growing interest to surf Net Japan PC sales hit record last year

TOKYO, May 9: Sales of personal computers in Japan jumped more than 30 per cent to a record 9.94 million units last business year, reflecting Japan's growing appetite to surf the Net, industry data showed today, reports Reuters.

The Japan Electronic Industry Development Association (JEIDA), said domestic PC sales in the year ended in March marked a solid jump of 32 per cent, while predicting the number would grow further this year, extending a rise that started since 1997/98.

Amid an Internet boom among consumers and an information-technology revolution at firms, sales for 2000/01 would likely hit 11.5 million units, up 15.7 per cent from a year ago, it said.

PC shipments in the January-March quarter totalled 3.4 million units, up 30 per cent from the same quarter a year earlier. It was the first time the sales surpassed three million units in any single quarter, it said.

Behind the growth was a sharp rise in first-time PC buyers wishing to surf the Internet

and exchange e-mail, while steady demand for replacement models and falling PC prices also fuelled the appetite for new PCs.

"Demand for using the Internet and e-mails supported the uptrend," an official at the group, whose members include 18 computer makers operating in Japan, told a news conference.

He predicted PCs for individual use would grow by 20 per cent in 2000/01, while those for corporates will rise by 13 per cent.

It was hard to foresee the day when all Japanese people have their own PCs, given the current popularity to use mobile phones as a handy tool to go online. Consumers will also be able to access the Net through other tools like Sony Corp's mainstay PlayStation2 home video game console, he added.

Internet use in Japan, the world's second-biggest PC market, has been held back by the relatively low number of home computers and high interconnection charges.

Market commentary
On Tuesday, the interbank foreign exchange market was very active with the demand for US Dollar remaining extremely high. The earlier trading range of dollar prevailed. The demand for call money went up and it traded between 7.5 to 8.5 per cent. In the international markets, euro stayed on a shaky ground after the European finance minister expressed concern about its weakness, but failed to back it up with a threat of intervention. In a statement issued by Euro-zone after a meeting in Brussels, the region's 11 finance ministers and the European central banks shared a common concern about the present level of euro. The euro's fall stemmed by some wariness over possible action by European authorities.

India's largest bank union to strike work tomorrow

BOMBAY, May 9: Nearly 600,000 employees of Indian banks will strike work on May 11 in protest against the government's plans to privatise state-run banks, a top union official said on Tuesday, reports Reuters.

"The strike has been called to protest against the proposed privatisation and the likely job cuts in nationalised banks," Tarakeshwar Chakraborty, general secretary of the All Indian Bank Employees Association (AIBEA) told Reuters.

The strike is expected to affect the working of banks and financial markets.

AIBEA is the largest bank union in the country.
