JOHANNESBURG, May 10 unternet report): Dr Ali Bacher, the managing director of the United Cricket Board of South Africa (UCB) believes that despite the crisis in which the sport finds itself, there is still a bright future in store for world

"An unparalleled determination prevails in all cricket playing countries to restore the confidence in the game. It is going to be a very stormy road that must first be travelled to get rid of the cancer of match-fixing. but everyone realises that the truth must come out, even though a few tall trees might have to perish in the process." said Dr Bacher.

Ngconde Balfour, the Minister of Sport said that there could be no doubt that the image of cricket had been dealt a severe blow with the revela tions of the recent past and that there was a dark cloud over sport in general.

The public was now sceptical about match results and the credibility of sport was being questioned. "Only by rooting out the evil

of match-fixing completely, will the public's trust in sport be restored," he said.


