"We considered a number of bowlers including Angus Fraser, Martin Bicknell and Alex Tudor," said Graveney. "What swung the decision was Stephen Harmison's extra pace and Ed Giddins' ability to swing

Harmison said he was "thrilled to bits" when told he had been selected.

"If I am in the final eleven it will be even more special to make my international debut at Lord's I've only played there once before for Durham in a championship game two years ago against Middlesex when we won by one wicket and I was lucky enough to pick up seven wickets.

Graveney said Mark Ramprakash would open the batting with Mike Atherton and Knight, who has failed to establish himself as an England regular in Tests, would bat at number six.

Earlier on Friday. England's selectors face a dilemma over whether to risk pitching young leg-spinner Chris Schofield into his maiden Test match after he has made just 16 first class appearances for Lancashire.

He is yet to be tested against players of the calibre of Alistair Campbell. Andy Flower and Murray Goodwin, however, as he will be at Lord's if England decide to gamble.

Former Lancashire secondteam coach Peter Sleep, who has guided Schofield's career since he joined the Old Trafford staff in 1997, believes Zimbabwe are the ideal opponents for his young protege to begin his Test career.




