

### Asian youth hockey Malaysia qualify for WC finals

KUALA LUMPUR, May 14: Malaysia, qualified Sunday for next year's youth World Cup finals when they beat Japan 2-1 in the third placing play-off match of the fourth Asian Cup youth hockey tournament, reports AP.

Malaysia led 1-0 at half-time. The other two teams to qualify were India and South Korea.

Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Malaysia, Taiwan, South Korea, Pakistan, Singapore, China, Iran, Japan and Uzbekistan were participating in the tournament, which began on May 3 and ended Sunday.

The tournament was due to be contested this autumn but Gulf football federations asked for the delay because it would have coincided with the Asian Cup finals taking place in Lebanon in October.

Prince Sultan bin Fahd bin Abdul Aziz, who heads the Organisation for the Protection of Youth, or youth sports ministry, said the new date was chosen after "coordination and consultation with chairmen of the competing federations".

### Zimbabwe 315 all out

## Nasser studies the tourists



LONDON, May 14 (AFP/Internet): Nasser Hussain took the opportunity to take a good look at England's Test match opponents when Zimbabwe's quick bowlers took on the Essex attack at Chelmsford on Saturday.

The England captain was sparing of stroke, but sure of concentration by spending 53 balls and 70 minutes over an undefeated 17 in Zimbabwe's last match before moving on to their maiden Test appearance at Lord's on Thursday.

The situation was ideal for Hussain as he appeared in the middle with the prospect 24 overs of the third day remaining, the whole of Day Four to come, and no positive outcome to the match apparent with so much time lost to rain.

The first international business of the summer could therefore occupy Hussain's mind, and Essex would welcome a big first-class score from their club captain before spending the majority of the summer on England duty.

Hussain's two first-class innings had yielded scores of only four and 24, though two Sunday fifties in successive weeks have signified that his best touch is not far away.

He needed 33 deliveries over two scoring strokes — taking 14 to get off the mark — before punishing Henry Olonga for a brace of boundaries in successive balls, and later Hussain was obliged to keep out a couple of sharp yorkers from the dreadlocked fast bowler.

Stuart Law (33) supplied the eye-catching shots while Hussain consolidated before being taken at backward point, then Ronnie Irani trashed Dirk

Viljoen for two sixes before had light ended play five overs early with Essex 117 for three in reply to Zimbabwe's 315.

Earlier, Olonga surprisingly detained Essex with a career-best 45 to help sustain a Zimbabwe recovery.

After the tourists had dipped to 217 for eight, the operating Olonga provide some late resistance to lift Zimbabwe to their solid total.

Olonga helped Guy Whittall add 72 for the ninth wicket and passed his previous highest score of 41 before falling lbw to David Thompson off his 129th ball.

Olonga played resolutely and provided a bonus for his side but Zimbabwe may well have felt that runs from the more regular batsmen

Carlisle and Viljoen would have been of greater benefit in the wider scheme of things, but they did not manage a single be-

tween them.

Whittall made 54 from 133 deliveries until being taken at slip by Law to allow seamer Ricky Anderson to return five for 69. Hussain missed Whittall at slip on 51, a comfortable chance to his left, but Law assured that the lapse was not expensive.

Neil Johnson reached an untrodden 83 from 122 balls when the England and Essex off-spinner Peter Such deceived him in the flight and won an lbw verdict — and Such flighted another ball to Viljoen, who likewise departed lbw in the following over to Johnson's departure.

Anderson's first intervention halted the Flower-Neil Johnson stand on 99 in its 25th over, the ball lifting enough to find the inside edge of Flower's bat and wicket-keeper Barry Hyam went a long way to his right to pick up a low catch.

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### Hick tunes up with a ton

LONDON (Reuters): England batsman Graeme Hick warmed up for the first Test against Zimbabwe at Lord's starting next Thursday with a match-winning century for Worcester-shire against Middlesex.

Zimbabwe-born Hick's 115 not out was the 109th century of his first-class career and, scored in a total of 161 for three, was a major factor in his side's seven-wicket victory in a low-scoring second division match at Worcester.

Lancashire also won inside three days when they beat Durham by 141 runs in a first division game at Chester-le-Street.

Career-best figures of seven for 50 from uncapped medium pacer Mike Snethurst skittled Durham for 92 in their second innings.

That meant Durham left-arm fast medium bowler Simon Brown's own career best of seven for 51, which plunged the visitors to 134 all out in their second innings, was to no avail.

Second division Warwickshire and Northamptonshire both look on course for wins over Sussex and Nottinghamshire, respectively, with one day remaining.

Dougie Brown, who piled up a career best 203, and Ashley Giles (127 not out) took their seventh wicket stand to 289 before Warwickshire declared at 548 for seven at Hove.

Sussex, with Australian Michael Bevan out for 36, have reached 220 for six in their second innings and need another 104 to avoid an innings defeat.

A defiant innings from John Morris (88) was not enough to prevent Nottinghamshire following on at Northampton.

Dismissed for 333, the visitors were 44 for two in their second innings at the close, still 208 runs adrift of the hosts' 585.

### Venus returns to Rome

ROME, May 14: A foot injury on Sunday forced Martina Hingis to withdraw only moments before the draw was made for the Italian Open women's tournament, which begins on Monday, reports AFP.

Tournament director Adriano Panatta made the announcement prior to the start of the draw.

He said the Hingis camp had just returned from Germany, where the Swiss lost a semifinal at the German Open.

Panatta said that he was told the player, who will drop to world number two in Monday's new world rankings behind Lindsay Davenport, underwent an X-ray and was advised by doctors to undergo physiotherapy.

Davenport was installed as top seed for the WTA Tour event ahead of Nathalie Tauziat of France.

## Hingis runs out of luck



BERLIN, May 14: Conchita Martinez defeated top seed and defending champion Martina Hingis 7-6, 6-4 to reach the final of the German Open on Saturday, and is now just one match away from regaining the title she won in 1998, reports AFP.

To do so she must first overcome 10th seeded Amanda Coetzer, who beat fellow South African Joannette Kruger 6-2, 6-4.

Coetzer and Martinez have played 15 times, with Martinez winning 12. But Coetzer has won their last two meetings, both on hard court at the 1998 US Open and this year's Ericsson Open in Miami. Coetzer also beat her on clay at the 1997 French Open.

"I've had very tough matches with Conchita, but I'm very excited to be in the final. I think it's my first Tier 1 final. It's probably her favourite surface so I'm just going to look at it as a match completely on its own," said the South African.

Earlier the Spaniard's victory was her third in three matches against Hingis on red European clay, but the first against her since the 1996 Italian Open.

She played smartly, frequently changing the pace and catching Hingis by surprise with a heavily struck forehand. Such enterprise gave Martinez -- a former Wimbledon champion -- the upper hand throughout the first set, although she had difficulty maintaining her advantage.

She broke serve to lead 2-0, allowed Hingis to break back in the seventh game, regained the lead and served for the set at 5-3, but again let Hingis break back and then hold for 5-5. Rather than be discouraged, however, third seeded Martinez broke Hingis yet again to take the set.

In the second, Martinez failed to win a single point in her first two service games as Hingis came to the net far more often and turned the momentum in her favour.

Playing more aggressively than in the first set, Hingis seemed after holding to love to lead 4-2 that she had enough momentum to turn the match decisively her way.

Instead, she won just six more points in the match as Martinez staged a remarkable recovery.

"I played some great tennis today," said Martinez. "It's my best match in a long time. I was pushing her a lot and went for my shots, and I was very aggressive and moving her so she was running a lot."

In the second set she felt she had to do something different and went to the net. She was more aggressive and returning well and trying to come in, and maybe I relaxed a little bit. But then I just tried to play it like before."

Hingis, who now surrenders her number one ranking to Lindsay Davenport again after just one week, admitted that she was anxious not to be drawn into a long battle as she had in her previous two matches, and that led to her playing a more positive roll in the second set.

"In the first set I was too tired and not aggressive enough," said Hingis. "I wanted to keep the points shorter because the first set was so tiring and I was not in condition after Friday's match to continue playing like that."

"I was really aggressive in the second set and came in a lot and made a lot of points, but it was only one break and she was still hanging in there."

Coetzer took control of the match against Kruger right from the start, and was the steadier player in the baseline rallies. But Kruger offered more resistance in the second set and Coetzer had difficulty in closing out the match.

Although there was no suggestion that Kruger would be able to repeat the fightback she staged in the quarterfinals, when she held off four match points and recovered from 0-5 in the final set to beat Elena Dementieva, she saved three match points and, from trailing 2-5, held two break points to level at 5-5 before conceding.

Coetzer admitted it had been hard work, saying: "I didn't see any of her match yesterday and tried not to think of it, but I'm sure she was. I've been in that position before, and if you can make a comeback like that once you become fearless every time you get in that situation."

"Obviously she was a little bit drained from that match yesterday. She played late. In the beginning I took a lot of time away from her and played quite well and she wasn't quite getting to it. In the end I think I gave her a little bit too much time and she could get to most of the balls."

Coetzer had a lot of things right. It's a great pay-back for him. He deserves this."

Corretja felt that he coped well with Kuerten until 4-4.

"Then I lost a little bit of my concentration," he said. "After, I had a couple of break points and I couldn't make them. And he served pretty well on that game."

"Afterwards, I double faulted twice and I completely lost my concentration and my focus. For five games, I was out of the court."

Norman, the third seed who hasn't lost a set all week, was simply in unstoppable form -- serving to deadly effect, crunching out a series of powerful groundstrokes and making few mistakes.

Ninth-seeded Hewitt had paid the price of a gruelling week -- the 19-year-old's first tournament since taking a month out to beat a virus -- and showed only glimpses of the sparkle and accuracy of his earlier matches.

Kuerten, who had been plagued for months by a back injury before coming to Rome, owned up: "I didn't expect to get this far."

"But since my first match, I've been playing well and I've been a completely different player this week to what I was one or two months ago. I'm feeling much better on court."

Turning to his future opponent, the Brazilian said: "He's been building his game for two or three years. I've seen him

eased into a 2-0 lead, serving out for 4-2.

The Brazilian broke effortlessly for 5-2, allowing the Spaniard only one point after a spanking forehand drive and a baseline shot from Corretja which finished a shade too long.

He missed his first match point when a backhand disappeared between the tramlines. But a superb backhand volley brought up his second chance and Kuerten clinched his place in the final with a booming service winner.

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
