

Sundarbans Forest
Division to be divided into 2 zones

KHULNA, May 20: The process to divide Sundarbans Forest Division into two zones is nearing completion, said a reliable source.

Sundarbans Forest Division will be divided into South Zone and East Zone. The headquarters of the West Zone will be set up in Khulna, while the place for the office of the East Zone is yet to be decided, the source added.

The decision to divide the present division has been taken in order to inject more efficiency in surveillance to save the resources of the mangrove forest.

The Sundarbans Forest Division was created in 1884 comprising six Range Offices headquartered at Khulna, Sathkhira, Chandpur, Swarankhola, Bashirhat and Namkhana. After partition of India, Bashirhat and Namkhana Ranges fell under the jurisdiction of West Bengal, India and four others remained under the control of the erstwhile East Pakistan, now Bangladesh.

A source said, under the new arrangement, Khulna and Sathkhira ranges will fall under the West Zone covering Dakop, Kolra and Shyamnagar upazillas. On the other hand, Mongla, Moreganj and Swarankhola ranges will fall under the jurisdiction of the proposed East Zone.

5,000 more policemen to be recruited'

New variety of pepper may gain popularity



JHENIDAH, May 20: A new variety of pepper may gain popularity in the country, agriculture officials said.

The new variety has a bright prospect, they said while addressing a seminar styled 'Sustainable Technology Transfer' at village Bagutia in Shalakupa upazila in the district recently.

Presided over by Deputy Director of Agriculture Extension Department (AED) of Jhenidah Abdul Awal, the seminar was attended by Abdul Wahab MP as chief guest. Among others, plant protection specialist Rezaul Karim, agriculture officers MA Rashid and Sahidul Alam and a nursery owner Setabuddin Al Azad also spoke on the occasion.

The experts of AED said the hybrid variety, known as China variety, can bring good earning for the farmers.

Setabuddin Al-Azad, a nursery owner, said he cultivated China variety of pepper at a cost of Taka 4,000 on ten decimetre of land this year. I expect about Taka 25,000 from the crop, he added.

Erosion playing havoc in Sirajganj, Gaibandha

River erosion has taken a serious turn in Sirajganj and Gaibandha districts.

Our Sirajganj Correspondent says: Betil Enayeturp under Chowhali Upazila and Sonatam under Shahadpur Upazila have been seriously affected by erosion.

Many institutions including a vast track of land have been threatened. With rise in river water level, erosion has been intensified at Betil Bazar and in Enayeturp Medical College area.

Meanwhile, property worth about one crore taka had so far been devoured by the river during the last one year. Thousand of affected family members have taken shelter on embankments. The river has again hit their newly makeshift shelters.

The local Bangladesh Water Development Board (BWDB) submitted a 15 crore taka project proposal to the higher authorities to build spurs to save thousands of handloom facto-

ries, Enayeturp mazar, newly constructed Enayeturp Medical College Hospital, Sirajganj Cloth Project, schools and colleges. If the authorities concerned do not pay heed to the BWDB proposal, the educational institutions and commercial establishments might be devoured.

Most of Sonatam Bazar under Shahadpur Upazila has already been devoured. The proposal to construct 206 to 208 kilometres embankment has been sent and 660 M. Ton wheat has been demanded for this purpose.

If the embankments are not constructed, a large number of houses with vast property would be damaged by the mighty Jamuna.

Our Gaibandha Correspondent reports: At least 30 mouzas under Fulchhara upazila have been badly affected by erosion of the River Brahmaputra.

Major portion of the aforesaid mouzas have already been

engulfed by unabated erosion since last five years.

Meanwhile, a total of 60 educational institutes along with a numbers of mosques, temples and cultivable lands have been eroded by the surging water of the river.

The erosion have rendered nearly 32,000 families shelterless. Affected families have lost all their belongings including their dwelling houses and immovable property. Such erosion victims have turned into destitutes due to this natural calamity. They have been fighting a losing battle for survival on abandoned embankments and roadside spaces under makeshift shelters. They have turned into destitutes. They have no job to earn their living now. Many victims have been striving hard for survival as day labourers, rickshaw pullers and fishermen, but most of them have to remain jobless.

This is because the job market is very limited in this small district town. Just for livelihood, Even many of them have already died of starvation.

A total five mouzas out of 12 under Kanchipara union, nine out of 21 mouzas under Gajaria union, six mouzas under Arendabari union, four mouzas under Fazlupur union and two mouzas under Fulchhara union have already been devoured by the River Brahmaputra.

The present location of the River Brahmaputra was not so even 20 years ago. At that time the western bank of the river was located 10 to 15 kilometres eastward. Since then river erosion has been playing havoc along the western bank.

At present the western bank of the River Brahmaputra is only four kilometres off Gaibandha town which might engulf the town itself within the next few years if the rate of erosion continued at the present pace.

Meanwhile, all measures taken so far to stop erosion proved ineffective.

Phensidyl seized: Two arrested

HABIGANJ, May 20: Police arrested two people and seized 95 bottles of phensidyl from Kutuber Chawka area on Shayestaganj-Shahjibazar road on Wednesday, reports UNB.

The arrested were identified as Shukur Miah of village Morasham in Brahmanbaria district and Muhammad Ali of Kadamtoli village in Habiganj sadar upazila. Police said Shukur and Ali were arrested with 45 bottles of phensidyl. Later acting on information they recovered 50 more bottles from the house of Muhammad Ali.

Bumper output of IRRI-Boro likely

MANIKGANJ, May 20: A bumper production of IRRI-Boro is expected in seven upazilas in the current season, reports UNB.

Farmers here this year cultivated IRRI-Boro on 99,100 acres of land as against the target of 92,650 acres. They, however, alleged that high price of diesel, frequent power failure and load shedding are hampering irrigation in IRRI-Boro cultivation. Harvesting of paddy has already begun in many places.

Uplift works progressing

BAGERHAT, May 20: Implementation work of 13 development projects at a cost of Tk 24 lakh is progressing fast in nine upazilas here, reports UNB.

The District Council is financing the projects from its own resources under a Rural Development Programme undertaken for the current fiscal year. The projects include construction and repair of rural roads and low-cost bridges and renovation of some union parishad offices. About 60 per cent work on the projects has already been completed and the rest is expected to be finished by June next. The district council, earlier, implemented four development projects under current the ADP in Kachua Upazila at a cost of Tk 1.85 lakh.

Family sources said Rozina was a student of class three of Sundarkhola Primary school while Doli resided at a local orphanage. Brothers of the two girls filed a GD after they failed to trace them.


Workshop

He had been renamed as Jay Narayan Roy later on.


