ECB chief

LONDON, May 20: England cricket chief Lord MacLaurin said on Friday he feared that mafia-style organisations were infiltrating the game to fix matches, reports AP.

Speaking on BBC Radio, the chairman of the English Cricket Board (ECB) said he suspected that the criminal underworld could be the driving force behind cricket's corruption.

"It could be the case that as well as the players, it's also the administrators who need investigating," MacLaurin said.

"There's a lot of money sloshing around the game, not just in betting but also in television deals.

"My fear is there could be mafia-type organisations who are involved behind the scenes and that the international players are becoming pawns in a power game.

"I know it's an extraordi-

nary idea but it could be the case that criminal mafia are infiltrating areas of cricket. MacLaurin said. "We just don't know how bad the situation is. Since South African captain Hansie Cronje admitted receiving 15,000 dollars from a bookmaker in a betting scam,

MacLaurin has been a leading figure in the fight against corruption in the game. He persuaded the world's governing body, the International Cricket Council, to hold an emergency meeting at Lord's earlier this month to investi-

tions that it was rife in Pakistan, India and England. The ICC agreed several reforms, including a list of penalties ranging from five-year to life bans for anyone found

gate match-fixing amid allega-

guilty of being involved. MacLaurin also convinced every member of the ICC executive committee to sign a declaration opening up their private and business accounts to scrutiny.

"It's possible that our own game in England has problems we don't know about. I've been in business long enough not to be naive about the world, MacLaurin said.

"Police inquiries are ongoing in this country into the match-fixing issue. I'd like to think the game is clean, but we have to be vigilant."


