### BB T-bill auction held

The 89th auction of the 28-day, 91-day, 182-day, 364-day, 2-year and 5-year treasury bills were held in the city Sunday, says UNB.

A total of Tk 577 crore, Tk 6 crore, Tk 129 crore, Tk 71.50 crore and Tk 16 crore were offered respectively for the 28-day, 91-day, 182-day, 364-day and 2-year bills.

Of these, Tk 527 crore, Tk 3 crore, Tk 54.50 crore, Tk 12 crore in total of Tk 596.50 crore of 28-day, 91-day, 182-day and 2-year bills were accepted respectively.

The range of the implicit yields were 5.94-6.10 per cent, 6.30-6.41 per cent, 7.53-7.73 per cent and 8.40-8.51 per cent per annum respectively.

The bids offered for the 182-day bill were not accepted and no bid was offered for the 5-year bill. Due to maturity of the bills, the total amount of Tk 593.50 crore will retire in the current week. So, the net amount of the issuing bills will stand at Tk 3 (596.50-593.50) crore this week.

Japan's big three automakers enjoy higher output

TOKYO, May 22: Nissan Motor Co Ltd posted its first domestic output rise in 17 months in April, with both Toyota Motor Corp and Honda Motor Co Ltd also benefiting from stronger markets, the firms said today, reports AFP.

Nissan, which is undergoing a restructuring drive under France's Renault SA, said vehicle production at home rose 23.2 per cent to 106,669 in April, the first increase in 17 months.

The increase was "supported by the production increase of the SUV (sports utility vehicle) models such as the Serena and the Wingroad for Japan and the Maxima and the I30 for the US market," Nissan said in a statement.

Nissan, which unveiled dismal annual earnings on Friday, said its worldwide production was up 21.5 per cent at 197,533 in April.

Honda, with global output up 4.6 per cent to 199,114, took second spot among the big three Japanese motor firms. Its domestic output grew 15.6 per cent to 102,303 vehicles.

Honda's domestic sales increased 13.1 per cent to 55,203 thanks to "the continued popularity of its mini-vehicles" and its exports shot up 28.9 per cent to 56,706 in April.

## ProshikaNet launches first online payment service

The move may be a small leap forward, but it certainly holds out an immense future for the country's e-commerce.

Internet Service Provider ProshikaNet has for the first time launched online payment service for its subscribers.

"Only our subscribers holding National Bank Limited (NBL) MasterCards can pay their monthly service bills through this online service," said Md Rezaul Hassan, Business Manager of Proshika Computer Systems (PCS).

But this is just the beginning of a long journey, as

ProshikaNet has plans to expand the service shortly to cover payment of school tuition fees, mobile phone bills, insurance premium payments and other things. And hopefully all these services will be out of the service provider's store by the end of this year.

Proshika is already busy contacting different service organisations with a view to roping them into its online payment system.

Haasan hoped that other banks will also okay the use of their cards in making online payments. Besides, there is a

possibility that debit cards would also be included in the system as these have wide acceptance in the country.

Under Proshika's payment system, an Internet user has to give his name, credit card number and its expire date for making online transactions.

Besides, ProshikaNet has taken some additional security measures to guard against fraudulence bids. As part of the stand against frauds, the service provider will give an e-commerce password to a credit card holder who's keen to pay online, Haasan added. More-

over, he said that the client will have to make a disclosure to NBL saying that he will make online payment to ProshikaNet.

Hassan felt that enactment of a cyber law is necessary to prevent online payment forgeries.

Besides, he identified the lack of social creditworthiness and too much prejudice and fear of the banks in issuing credit cards as the other stumbling blocks, which, he felt, were necessary for kickstarting the online payment system in the country.

### Prime Bank to open 5 more branches soon

Prime Bank Limited will introduce debit card and ATM (automatic teller machine) and open five more branches across the country soon, says a press statement.

Outgoing Chairman of the bank Md Nader Khan dwelt upon the future plan and past activities at a gathering of the newsmen. The Board of Directors organised the programme in connection with the commemoration of the 5th anniversary of the bank.

Khan said that the bank, which had corresponding contacts with 236 bank branches in 52 countries, was considering to set up a joint venture finance company.

Addressing the function, Managing Director Kazi Abdul Mazid said that the bank's deposits stood at Tk 857.7 crore till April this year, which is 49 per cent higher than the previous year.

He said that bank disbursed Tk 455.56 crore till April this year, which is seven per cent higher than the previous year.

The MD added that the percentage of the classified loan is less than two.

He said that the bank made a profit of Tk 36.5 crore in 1999, which is 63 per cent higher than 1998. Till April of this year, the Prime Bank made a profit of Tk 14.59 crore, he added.

Meanwhile, the bank has given dividend for the year 1999. The dividend was declared just two months after the final accounts at an annual general meeting.

### ROK, Bangladesh cos plan disposable syringe plant

COA International, Korea, and Deshdosh Services Ltd of Dhaka will set up a disposable syringe plant in joint venture in the city.

To this effect, an agreement between the two companies was signed at the corporate head office of the local firm on Saturday, says a press release.

Deshdosh Service Ltd has also been appointed Exclusive Sales Agent of COA International for marketing their disposable syringe and other medical equipment for Bangladesh, India and Nepal.

Harun Ur Rashid, Chairman of Deshdosh Group, and Gi Tae Kim, President of COA International signed the agreement on behalf of their respective companies.

Gazi Md Delwar Hossain, managing Director of Chittagong Ltd., M A Jalil, Director of Deshdosh Group, Q F Ahmad, Director of Deshdosh Group, and Chung Hoon Ha (John), representative of COA International, were also present at the signing ceremony.

The proposed disposable syringe industry will create employment opportunities for about 100 people and marketing of the imported syringes and other equipment will create a good number of jobs for the educated people of the country.

### Swedish Embassy to sign aid deal with ACD

The Swedish Embassy in Bangladesh will sign an agreement with Association for Community Development (ACD), an NGO of the Rajshahi region, for a three-year period (2000-02) at the embassy in the city on Friday, says UNB.

Ambassador of Sweden in Bangladesh Anders Johnson and Salima Sarwar, Director of ACD, will sign the agreement on behalf of the respective organisations.

The visiting Swedish Minister for Development Cooperation, Migration and Asylum Policy, Maj-Inger Klingvall, will be present at the ceremony.

Under the agreement, an amount of 1.5 million Swedish Kroner equivalent to Tk 82.50 crore will be made available for ACD to implement a project titled "Promotion of Human Rights and Women's Participation in the Democratic Process" within the project period.

## Pak govt, traders seem on tax collision course

ISLAMABAD, May 22: Pakistan's military government and the nation's traders seemed on collision course today over a new tax regime on which a lifeblood IMF loan depends.

"Pakistan will not get a penny from the donors if it does not carry out necessary reforms," said an editorial in the English-language newspaper The News on Monday.

That being the state of things, it is only prudent that the traders reconcile with a black economy.

"This is the issue which, I think, will go to a showdown," said Mansoor Ali, chief economist at stockbrokers Jeanghi Siddiqi and Co.

"It is far too important for the government to back down on."

At issue is the imposition of a general sales tax (GST) at retail level, a modest incision into a black economy estimated to equal the official \$60 billion economy.

The government's financial managers believe the GST and a tax survey it plans would for the first time bring the free-spirited traders into the tax net and meet a central demand of donors, which successive governments have balked at for years.

The issue is crucial if General Pervaiz Musharraf's government is to secure a \$2.2 billion IMF loan which it will have to start re-

payments on its \$38 billion debt after a grace period from a rescheduling exercise ends in December.

Pakistan will not get a penny from the donors if it does not carry out necessary reforms," said an editorial in the English-language newspaper The News on Monday.

"It could come to arrests," said Mansoor. "People are especially fond of antagonising a military government."

The strike was the biggest organised challenge to Musharraf's government since it came to power in a bloodless October 12 coup.

Musharraf, who does not mince words, said there was "no justification" for the stoppage, which passed off peacefully but left most major cities looking ghost towns.

The traders threatened further protests if the government goes ahead with a tax survey which is expected to swell the number of people paying tax — less than one per cent of Pakistan's 135 million people pay any tax at all.

"We do not want a confrontation with the army... but when a survey team comes to a market, we will close the shops and refuse to accept the forms," said

Umer Sailya, chairman of the All Pakistan Organisation of Small Traders and Cottage Industries.
