KARACHI, May 25: Former Pakistan captain Wasim Akram, censured in an inquiry into match-fixing allegations, will play in the forthcoming Asia Cup, a Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) official said today reports Reuters.

Akram, who is on tour with Pakistan in West Indies, had initially said he would not be available for the Asia Cup. which begins in Dhaka on Sunday, because of a television commitment in England.

"Wasim has confirmed his participation," PCB director Yawar Saeed said. The Asia Cup will be contested by Bangladesh, Pakistan, India and Sri Lanka.



Manoj goes on record

Controversial Kapil coming to Dhaka



NEW DELHI, May 25 (AFP/AP): Indian cricket faced a major crisis today after Manoj Prabhakar finally went public with a claim

that national icon Kapil Dev offered him a bribe to throw a match in 1994. Prabhakar, a former Test all-rounder, broke his silence

had asked him to play badly in a one-dayer against arch-rivals Pakistan in Sri Lanka. "He knows it, I know it and God knows it. He is Kapil Dev,' Prabhakar told the website <www.tehelka.com> soon after testifying before the Central

Bureau of Investigation (CBI). which is probing the match-fixing scandal. Asked why it took him six vears to reveal the name, Prabhakar said none of the authorities had asked him to come out with it. "And I was waiting for him (Kapil Dev) to come for-

ward. The match in question against Pakistan in the Singer Cup failed to take off because of rains. "Had the match been played, proof would have been

there for everybody to see ... The admission is in line with Indian cricket chief Inderjit Bindra's revelation to CNN earlier this month that Prabhakar had told him that it was Kapil who had attempted to bribe him.

Dev's rejection, Shastri admits NEW DELHI, May 25: Kapil

Dev has yesterday vehemently denied the charges made against him by former all rounder Manoj Prabhakar, reports AFP.

"I wish I could ignore these baseless and malicious allegations with the contempt they deserve, but I owe it to the nation to personally state that there is no truth whatsoever in these allegations," Kapil said in a statement here.

"All I can say is that I am ei ther being made the target of a deep-rooted conspiracy or personal jealousy or animosity.

"The CBI is inquiring into the matter and I request every one, especially the media, to hold their hands until CB completes its investigations since publicity of reckless allegations can cause irrepairable harm," Kapil said.

Meanwhile, Ravi Shastri confirmed that Prabhakar had spoken to him about Kapil's offer in 1994.

"Manoj did speak to me about exactly this during the tour in Colombo in 1994. My advice to him was to inform the team management," Shastri said on Thursday.
