Antigua on knife's edge

on Sunday here, reports AFP. was leading West Indies to the verge of a memorable and significant win at the Antigua Recreation Ground in a knock of 63 when he gave his wicket away playing the hook shot that had cost opening batsmen Sherwin Campbell and Adrian Griffith their hands.

His dismissal in the growing gloom and imminent showers that enveloped the ground on his retreat to the Sir Vivian Richards Pavilion left West Indies 144 for four, after Pakistan were bowled out for 219 in their second innings about ten minutes after lunch to set the host team a victory target of 216.

Hinds has been the most prolific batsman in the series on either side with 340 runs at an average of 68.00 including his maiden Test hundred in the previous Test in Bridgetown.

In only his fifth Test, his dismissal showed he still has much to learn about the psychology of the game.

Except for Akram, none of the other Pakistani bowlers seemed to trouble him in an innings that lasted 3 1/2 hours. 128 balls and contained seven fours and two sixes, both off legspin bowler Mushtaq Ahmed. who has been his nemesis in the earlier part of the series.

Hinds however, got into a wrangle with Saqlain Mushtaq and on one occasion barged into the off-spin bowler for no apparent reason. This confrontation seem to knock him off the tracks, since his timing and his concentration was askew after

When Moin Khan, the Pakistan captain and wicketkeeper. played his "ace" late in the day with the end beckoning, Hinds clearly had lost sight of his purpose.
