

Jones can't name him

HOBART, Australia, June 5: Former Australian Test batsman Dean Jones says he fears for his life if he identifies the Indian player who introduced him to a bookmaker, reports AFP.

Jones said the only way he would name the player was if he was subpoenaed to do so. But if the player was named, it would come as no surprise, he said.

"I'm a bit worried about it," Jones said he was offered 50,000 US in Sri Lanka in 1992 after he was phoned by an Indian player.

Jones believes he was the first player to be offered money, the year before Shane Warne and Mark Waugh became embroiled in a match-fixing scandal.

He said the Indian player phoned him at the hotel where the team was staying and asked him to meet his friend.

Jones said he agreed, believing it would be for something like a clothing endorsement. He said the Indian player introduced him to an Indian man named John and said he was a bookmaker.

Jones said the man then offered him the money and a phone to give forecasting. "I listened to what he had to say, then I said no," Jones said.

He told the Australian Cricket Board management and players but nothing was done, he said.

"All the players thought that it was a bit funny," he said. "It's not funny now."

Jones said the matter was not treated as serious at the time. "I think I was the first player to be contacted by these people," Jones said he was worried about his safety, his family's safety and that of his business clients whom he sends to India.

Harper remains unruffled

LONDON, June 5 (Internet report): West Indies coach Roger Harper has played down the double failure of his star batsman Brian Lara in the team's tour opener against Worcestershire which ended in a draw at New Road on Sunday.

Lara faced a combined total of six balls in the three-day match for successive scores of one and, in both innings, was removed via leg-side catches behind.

But Harper insisted he was not that concerned about Lara's low-scoring form, while he said that an injury scare to the record-breaking batsman was "nothing we should be worried about."

Lara suffered a slight scrape to his heel when he was caught by a team-mate's boot spikes in the dressing room at tea on the second day.

"He's okay," Harper said, emphasising that Lara was in confident mood despite his two early failures on tour.

"We haven't had a chance to really assess his form, but Brian is a top-class player and we know that, as the tour progresses, he will come into his own. Brian is very confident within himself and he's in reasonable shape in the nets."

Magnificent Murray

NOTTINGHAM, England, June 5: Zimbabwe were 285 for four at the close of the fourth day of the second and final Test against England, 89 behind their hosts' first innings 374, reports AFP.

Zimbabwe sailed past the follow-on thanks mainly to a fine innings from 27-year-old Murray Goodwin. When bad light ended play for the day at 7pm local time (1800 GMT) Goodwin was 148 not out off 250 balls, having hit 20 fours — a record Test score by a Zimbabwean.

Notts openers make history

LONDON, June 5: Nottinghamshire openers Guy Welton and Darren Bicknell wrote themselves into the history books today with a first-wicket partnership of 406 in the England County Championship clash at Edgbaston here on Sunday, reports AFP.

Welton was unbeaten on 200 and Bicknell not out on 180 when Notts, replying to Warwickshire's first innings of 110, declared without even having lost a wicket.

The stand shaded the county's previous record partnership of 391, set in 1899, and was the 15th highest first-wicket stand of all time in first-class cricket.

It was also the fourth-highest opening partnership in the history of the championship. Warwickshire trail by 214 in the Division Two showdown after closing a thoroughly demoralising day for the county on 82 for two.

Hampshire pair Dimitri Mascarenhas (59) and Simon Francis (30 not out) chalked up a record last-wicket stand of 90 for the county — but the Division One strugglers still lost by two runs against Surrey at The Oval.

Hampshire's previous high was 73, recorded in 1937, but the record fell as the match went down to the wire with Alex Tudor completing a five-wicket haul to seal victory.

The visitors began the final day on 58 for two, chasing 280 runs to win after Shane Warne had taken five for 31 as Hampshire had skittled Surrey for 142 in their second innings.

Warne then scored an entertaining 50 from 60 balls — his highest of the season so far — before he was caught and bowled by Saqlain Mushtaq.

But Goodwin, had the measure of the attack and showed he can play off the front-foot too straight-driving Caddick for four.

It was one of his rare false strokes, an edged two to third man off Caddick that took Zimbabwe to the follow-on target of 175.

With the weather forecast still uncertain and a day left, a draw, which would leave England as one-kill series winners, remains the likeliest result.

But Zimbabwe have at least won back their cricketing self-respect.

Big C'paul ton

WORCESTER, England, June 5 (AFP/Reuters): A priceless century by Shivnarine Chanderepaul enabled the West Indies to escape with a draw against Worcestershire after another failure by Brian Lara in the opening first-class tour match here at New Road on Sunday, reports AFP.

Lara lasted for two balls in the second innings — and a total of six in the match — but Chanderepaul made an unbeaten 161 to take the heat out of the situation when they were only 25 in front at 93 for four.

The 25-year-old left-hander, who registered four centuries against county opposition in England in 1995, batted for almost six hours to lift the tourists to 301 for nine with his 18th career hundred.

Chanderepaul landed a 500 pounds (800 dollars) man-of-the-match award after blocking Worcestershire's attempt to land the 11,000 pound (17,600 dollars) prize for county victories over the West Indies.

The loss of four hours play in a three-day fixture ultimately conspired against the home side as much as Chanderepaul's diligence and selectivity in picking off 24 boundaries from 310 balls.

Long-serving spinner Richard Illingworth propped unceasingly in a spell of two for 35 in 23 overs with a first success when Christopher Gayle sliced to backward point after staying 91 minutes for 15.

This brought in Lara to take a single off Illingworth but he flapped at a ball from Stuart Lampitt and edged a leg-side catch to wicketkeeper Steve Rhodes — a repeat of his first innings dismissal by Kabir Ali.

Teenager Ramnaresh Sarwan then displayed maturity and good technique for the second time in the match while reaching 30 in a crucial partnership of 78 in 25 overs.

Sarwan's concentration only lapsed when a leading edge was held by Illingworth at 171 for five, but Worcestershire's last opportunity slipped away eight runs later when Mahendra Nagamootoo was dropped at fine leg.

Seles in Hingis' way

PARIS, June 5 (AFP): Three Roland Garros titles and nine Grand Slams in all and yet the appetite to win

burns stronger than ever within Monica Seles.

The Yugoslav-born American would have had to build an even bigger trophy cabinet had it not been for an enforced 28-month absence from the game after she was stabbed by a dejected spectator at an event in Hamburg, Germany, in April 1993.

And this year at the French Open she's been showing her determination to make up for lost time as she targets a first crown on the slow, red clay since she completed a memorable hat-trick in 1992.

The 26-year-old appears, on the evidence of the opening week, to be the main obstacle to Swiss miss Martina Hingis completing her collection of Grand Slam singles titles as Hingis has blown hot and cold on her way to the quarters.

Seles, the third seed, now has to take on another home favourite in sixth seed Mary Pierce, who has been in excellent form with the crowd enthralled by her performance on Sunday in knocking out Sweden's Asa Carlsson for the loss of just three games.

But Seles has also been playing some hot stuff -- the only problem for her being a bad head cold for which she has been on antibiotics.

That didn't stop her ousting Amelie Mauresmo in the fourth round on Sunday -- a repeat of her win over the big-hitting French hope at the Italian Open last month.

Since the stabbing the left-hander has won just one Slam -- the Australian Open in 1996 -- having won eight before she turned 20. That compares to five for Hingis, who turns 20 in September.

"I still have a sinus and bronchitis problem, so I'm still fighting it (the cold)," said Seles, whose triumph in Rome over Mauresmo gave the American

her second Italian Open title a full decade on from her first -- proof if any were needed that she is far from being past her shelf life.

"I just tried to hang in there as it was a tough clay court, it was very slippery. I just ran for every ball," said Seles, who is having to come to terms with the dismal rainy conditions which have persisted for much of the first half of the tournament.

"That's what happens when you live in Florida so long -- your immune system gets down," said Seles, who has racked up three tournament victories this year.

In her five appearances at Roland Garros since recovering from the physical and mental scars of Hamburg, she has made the quarterfinals three times.

the semifinals once and the final once in 1998.

She has always made at least the quarters in nine appearances here and is one of just four players -- the others being Maureen Connolly, Margaret Court and Steffi Graf -- to follow up an Australian Open title with a French Open win in the same year, a feat she performed in both 1991 and 1992.

Seles knows all about Pierce's capabilities, however, having lost 6-1, 6-1 against the Canadian-born Frenchwoman in April's semi-final at Hilton Head.

"It can be a very difficult match. I've not really had great success against Mary before," said Seles, who has lost their past two meetings though she leads their series 5-3.

Top seed Hingis takes on Chanda Rubin of the United States, who has shot back to form after a hand injury in 1995 almost ended her career.

Hingis recovered from a bizarre mid-match slump against Romanian Ruzanica Dragomir on Sunday and advanced to the last eight, winning 6-3, 0-6, 6-1, but she, like Seles, has been feeling the cold.

However, she knows at this stage the luxury of a third set cannot be guaranteed.

"At Roland Garros you have to fight through every round. You have to really want it," she observed.

The other match-ups see three-time champion Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario, seeded eighth, take on US fourth seed Venus Williams, back near her best after tendonitis problems in her wrists forced her out for six months, while fifth seed Conchita Martinez faces qualifier Marta Marrero in an all-Spanish encounter.

Williams ousted German 11th seed Anke Huber 7-6, 6-2 but is short of match practice having only played two tournaments this year coming into the Open because of her wrist problems.

Sanchez-Vicario, who will get married this summer, is at 28 perhaps not the force she once was -- though her last title here came just two years ago.

But she can still scurry around the court with the best of them and her experience will make her slight favourite.

Martinez has 20 clay court titles to her name and is looking forward to her 10th quarterfinal here, though she admitted that in the previous round against Ai Sugiyama of Japan she didn't feel she played her best tennis.

Marrero, a 17-year-old qualifier from the Canary Islands, showed tenacity in recovering from a set down to oust Rossana de los Rios of Paraguay, a fellow qualifier, but Martinez's experience should mean the end of the line for the blonde teen ranked just 108 in the world.

Marrero is only the second qualifier to make the last eight during the Open Era.

Norman almost there

PARIS, June 5: Sweden's Magnus Norman was on the verge of sealing a quarterfinal spot when rain

halted his fourth-round men's singles match against Andrei Medvedev at the French Open on Monday, reports AFP.

Third-seeded Norman, aiming for the first Grand Slam title of his career, led Medvedev, last year's beaten finalist, 6-0, 6-4, 4-1 on a bleak, wet and cloudy afternoon.

The players left the court when Medvedev complained it was impossible to slide safely. Medvedev, beaten by Andre Agassi in last year's final, had made good-natured fun of Norman in a press conference earlier in the week but the Swede looked likely to have the last laugh.

rain made it impossible for play to continue.

Norman is the highest seed left in the tournament after the early departures of Andre Agassi and Pete Sampras. He has so far not lost a set, or even played a tiebreaker.

The Swede took just 20min to win the first set after the start of play had been delayed by rain for over an hour.

Medvedev was able to win just six points.

The Ukrainian had points for a 4-2 lead in the second set but Norman held on, broke for 5-4 and then served it out.

When Norman broke in the opening game of the third set it appeared there was no way back for Medvedev.

The winner of the Norman-Medvedev match will play either sixth-seeded Frenchman Cedric Pioline or 12th-seeded Russian Marat Safin, who were locked in combat on Centre Court.

Safin led 6-4, 1-6, 3-2 when that match was halted by the rain.

Two more men's fourth-round matches were scheduled later Monday with ninth-seeded Australian Lleyton Hewitt playing Albert Costa of Spain and 15th-seeded Moroccan Younes El Aynaoui facing Franco Squillari of Argentina.

The other four men's fourth-round matches were played on Sunday.

Yevgeny Kafelnikov of Russia, the fourth seed and 1996 champion here, rallied to record his third five-set victory of the tournament -- winning 5-7, 6-3, 5-7, 7-6, 8-6 against Spaniard Fernando Vicente to earn a mouth-watering meeting with another former champion -- Gustavo Kuerten of Brazil.

Kuerten, the fifth seed who won here in 1997, stayed on track for a second crack at the title with a 6-3, 6-4, 7-6 win over 11th-seeded Ecuadorian Nicolas Pietrangeli, with whom he once won the junior boys doubles title here.
