## Tower collapse South western region cut off from Nat'l Grid

The south western region of the country was cut off from the National Power Grid shortly before yesterday noon when an electric tower of 132 kv Iswardi-Bheramara transmission line collapsed due to a storm, PDB sources said.

The tower which collapsed is at a place between Harding Bridge and Bheramara.

The sources said that the affected region was now getting power through bypass lines but supply was far less than the requirement, resulting in severe power disruption in the areas.

Locally generated power at Bheramara, Khulna and some other places were being used to meet the emergency needs in the region.

The worst affected districts are Khulna, Jhenidah, Jessore, Satkhira and Bagerhat.

When contacted at about 9:30 pm, a PDB control room source said.

## BNP leaders to watch it on TV and analyse

They will sit in front of a TV set at her official residence and hear the budget speech of Finance Minister SAMS Kibria in parliament and analyse the budget.

Sources said Khaleda Zia has asked top party leaders including Deputy Leader of the Opposition Prof AQM Badruddoza Chowdhury, party Secretary General Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan and former Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman to come at her official residence in the afternoon (3pm) to hear the budget speech.

BNP leaders M Morshed Khan, M Shamsul Islam, Dr Khandaker Mosharraf Hossain, MK Anwar and Dr Abdul Moyeen Khan are also likely to hear the budget speech there on TV, they added.

A senior BNP leader, who wanted not to be named, said they will hear the budget speech together to analyse it to give reaction to the press in the evening.

## Tk 16 lakh looted from Korean co at CEPZ

CHITTAGONG, June 7: A group of gunmen looted Tk 16 lakh from a Korean company at Chittagong Export Processing Zone (CEPZ) here this afternoon, police sources said.

The miscreants, numbering eight, stormed into the Lim's Ltd at 2:45 pm and looted the money drawn from bank for paying salary to the employees and workers, police and CEPZ sources said.

The terrorists came in a white microbus and each of them carried arms. They

When Finance Minister SAMS Kibria walks into the parliament this afternoon, he will as well carry along a host of questions, the answers to which the nation will seek in his budget speech.

In his first budget of the new millennium, the finance minister will have to define what strategies he plans for the country to survive in a post-reform world.

The national budget for 2000-2001 is scheduled to be placed in parliament at 3:00 pm.

People will also want to know what will he do to take the government out of the business of business and how he wants to jump on the fulcrum of growth to the manufacturing

industry.

He will have to show the nation a roadmap for the next five years and even beyond that. Because that will be the most crucial time for Bangladesh under a globalised world order and the

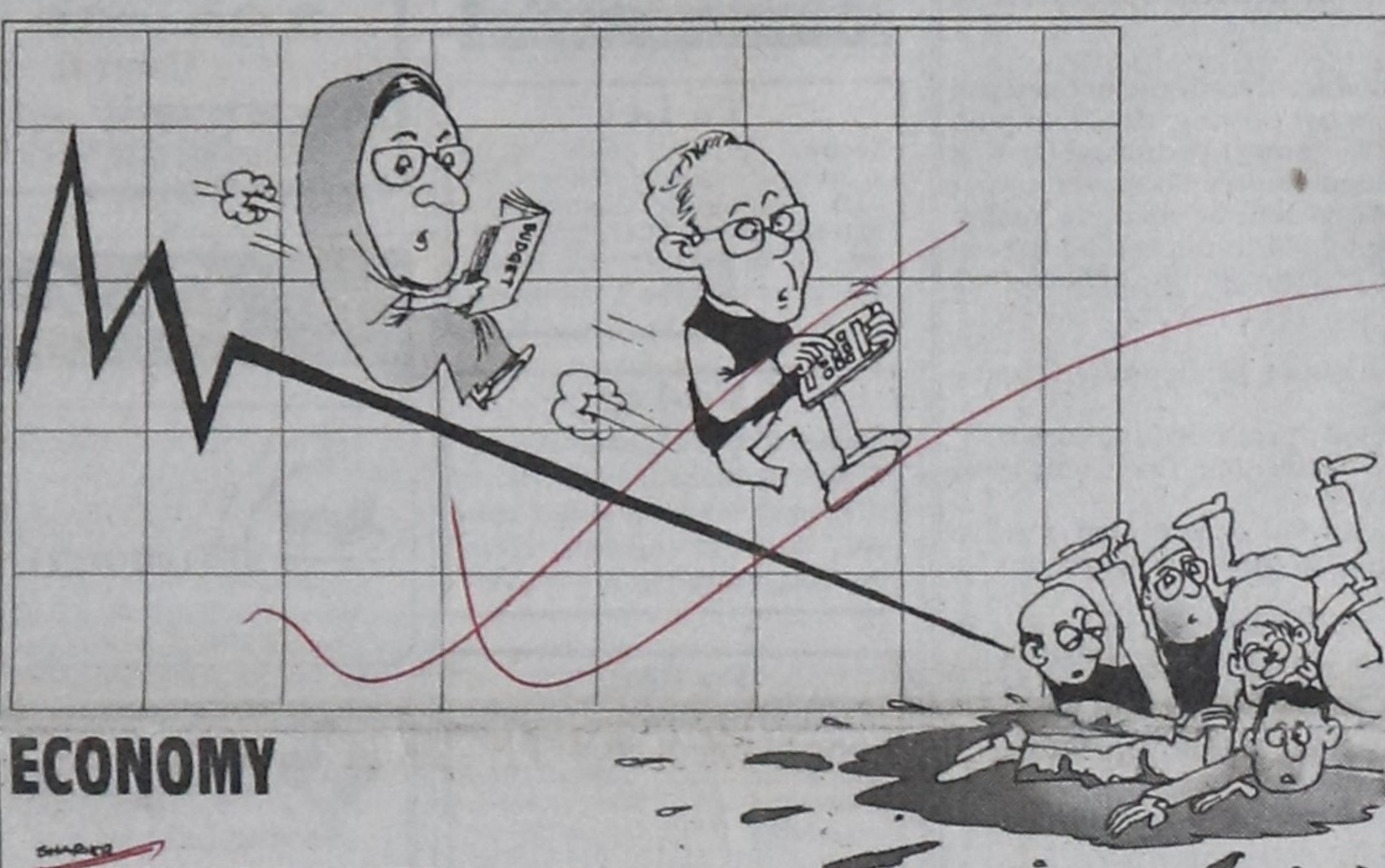

## Budget: A holistic approach will ensure stability, development

Senior corporate executives expect that the next budget would take a holistic approach, bringing stability in the political arena and ensuring rule of law.

If that happens, economic development would follow automatically, they observed.

On the fiscal issues they want rationalisation of income and corporate taxation, lowering of the bank interest rate for industrial lending, increase in export incentives, urgent measures to minimise fiscal deficit and efforts to improve the law and order.

They said the existing rates

of income and corporate tax are already high and these should not increase while the tax network should be widened. They also expressed concern over widening of the fiscal deficit and suggested drastic measures to close the gap.

They suggested an extension of tax holiday for another five years and withdrawal of taxes and duties on some items.

The Daily Star approached a number of chief executives and senior officials at corporate houses of the country to know what they expect of the budget for the year 2000-2001.

A K M Shamsuddin, manag-

ing director of Rhone-Poulenc Rorer Bangladesh, said he expects the budget 2000-2001 will rationalise and simplify income and corporate taxation.

The present maximum rate of 25 per cent income tax for individuals is acceptable but the basic exemption limit should at least be Tk one lakh, he said.

About foreign investment and industrial growth, he said political instability, law and order situation, bureaucratic bottlenecks and lack of policy guidelines discourage investment.

He suggested opening up the

# Asia Cup eludes Pakistan no more

Pakistan captured the elusive Asia Cup last night by defeating defending champions Sri Lanka by 39 runs in the final of the seventh edition at the Bangabandhu National Stadium last night.

It was a dream come true for the former world champions when skipper Moin Khan, leading his side from the front, held aloft the Pepsi Asia Cup amidst deafening applause from the capacity crowd at the big bowl.

Having mysteriously failed to win the premium regional event, touted as the most prestigious tournament after the World Cup, since its introduction way back in 1984, Pakistan finally proved that they are the best combative force in this part of the world, at least this time around.

It was also a night Moin

would remember for a long time, not because of making it a habit of winning tournaments since he took over from Akram, but for his hurricane 31-ball 56

that eventually took the Pakistan score to a mammoth 277 for four in 50 overs.

A never-say-die Sri Lanka fought gamely with Marvan At-

apattu hammering a superb 100, but the winners of the previous edition ran out of steam, managing 238 for nine in 45.2 overs. The Pakistan celebration started when last Sri Lankan batsman Kaushalya Weeraratne did not turn up to bat after Abdur Razzaq had Muttiah Muralitharan caught at long on.

Although Sri Lanka played their hearts out chasing an imposing 278, it was their pathetic fielding earlier on the day that proved to have the final say on the outcome of the game. Believe it or not, the otherwise athletic islanders known for their exploits of turning half chances into catches dropped as many as six sitters.

But of all the blunders, the fifth and the sixth against Moin Khan proved to be the costliest.

## Suicide bomber kills Lankan minister, 20 others

COLOMBO, June 7: A suicide bomber detonated an explosion in the Ratmalana suburb of Colombo, a police officers gathered pieces of flesh and debris from the roadway.

Police imposed a curfew on the neighbourhood where the bomb exploded as reports spread of mobs attacking the homes of the Tamil minority in revenge because the bomber was suspected of being a Tamil Tiger rebel.

A government source confirmed to The Associated Press that the attacks had taken place but could not say what form they took. Officially, the government said the curfew was a precautionary measure.

Because of it, journalists could not go to the area.

The remains of the bomber — a severed head and limbs — were

scattered around a traffic island in the Ratmalana suburb of Colombo, a police officers gathered pieces of flesh and debris from the roadway.

Twenty-one people were killed, including Minister for Industrial Development C V Gooneratne, said the director of Kalubowila Hospital, Dr W G Gunawardena.

Gooneratne is the first minister of the current government to be assassinated.

Dr Gunawardena said the minister's wife was one of seven people in serious condition and a total of 60 injured had been brought to the hospital for treatment.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility.

However, the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam, who have fought for 17 years to cre-

ate a separate homeland for the minority Tamils in the north and east, have a unit of suicide bombers known as the Black Tigers, who are known for targeting government officials.

One of the politician's supporters told The Associated Press that the bomber had gotten out of a three-wheeler taxi and approached the minister as the explosion was set off.

The method has been used in the past to assassinate high-ranking politicians, including President Ranasinghe Premadasa in 1993 and former Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi in 1991.

The Tamil Tigers denied they killed Gandhi and never commented on Premadasa's death.

About half of the group's

## NBR chief challenges Banglabazar Patrika

Abdul Mueed Choudhury, Chairman of National Board of Revenue (NBR), has challenged the Editor of the Banglabazar Patrika to produce documentary evidence about the story it published first on Sunday and again yesterday (Wednesday) claiming that he had written a secret letter to the Prime Minister stating that shortfall in revenue were due to toll collection, tax evasion, corruption and influence exerted by ministers and MPs.

"I have never written such a letter", Mueed Choudhury told The Daily Star when asked about the claims made by the newspaper. "I have therefore openly challenged the newspaper to produce the said letter to the public. I hope the newspa-
