U-16 booters held by Pakistan

Bangladesh football team suffered a severe blow in their hunt for promotion to the next round of the Asian Youth (U-16) Football Championship when they were held to a 2-2 draw by Pakistan in their second Group 4 match at Jamshedpur, India yesterday.

According to a faxed message, Bangladesh forfeited the lead twice after Sohail and Masud scored in each half.

The outcome now left Bangladesh with a tough task of defeating the hosts in their last match tomorrow for a place in the next round. India with victories against Sri Lanka (3-1) and Pakistan (6-0) topped the four-team meet with full six points.

Bangladesh, who won against Sri Lanka by a lone goal in the previous match, have four points from two games. Only the top finisher from the group will qualify for the final round.

AMs vote for Bangladesh

Bangladesh's bid for the elusive Test status got an official momentum yesterday when the Associate Members of the ICC (International Cricket Council) gave thumbs-up to the aspirants in their meeting in London.

Like the last year when Bangladesh applied for Test status all the non-Test playing nations threw their support behind the ICC trophy champions and put forward a unanimous resolution to the Executive Board yesterday. Syed Ashraf

Huq, the general secretary of BCB (Bangladesh Cricket Board), represented the country at the meeting.

To become the tenth Test-playing country, Bangladesh needs at least seven out of nine votes from the Full Members and a unanimous approval from the Associate Members.

The game's governing body would give its final verdict on upgrading of Bangladesh's status during the last day of its weeklong annual meeting on July 26 at Lord's. That all-important meeting will be attended by all the Full and Asso-

ciate members.

Talking to the BSS from London over phone BCB president Saber Hossain Chowdhury revealed, the Associate Members also elected Jimmy Rayani of Holland and Tinku Imran of Malaysia as the three associate directors in the Executive Board of ICC.

BSS report further adds, Saber, who was elected twice the associate director, also met Dr Ali Bacher, the Managing Director of the United Cricket Board of South Africa yesterday.

MSC going to Britain

Mohammedan Sporting Club is going set foot on English soil with a duel mission to introduce Bangladesh football to mainstream Europe and to entertain its expatriate community.

The journey of the traditional force in the domestic arena to England in the first week of August, will offer an opportunity to get a feel of modern football as well as forge closer ties with the strong Bangladesh community in London.

Although the national team will also travel to Britain to play a couple of exhibition matches with India at Leicester ahead of the Mohammedan tour, the latter's visit is aimed at purely promoting the Bangladesh game.

All the black and white matches will be played at East London, considered by many as the heartland of a strong Bangladesh community.

On the other hand the national team will be involved at Filbert Street, the home of Premier League side Leicester City.

The nine-day goodwill trip of Mohammedan, which will commence on August 8, will be a joint venture of Bangladesh Football Association (BFA) of London and Canary Wharf Limited, a leading property developer in Europe.

"We are making a serious effort to take the Asian community to the heart of British football. Mohammedan is a familiar name there. So, the trip will give a big boost to young Bangladeshis living in the UK," said Peter Waith, who heads Canary's public administration department, at a press briefing held at the club's Motilal premises yesterday.

The middle-aged Briton added that this tour would be the first of many in the years to come.

"There is a serious lack of Asian representation in British football," observed Peter.

Zakir Hossain Khan, the chairman of the BAF who also attended the press briefing, said that Mohammedan would play three matches including a game against a Third Division side.

Although the official fixture is yet to be announced, all the matches would be played in East London.

According to Zakir, Mohammedan will play against Bengal Sporting, a semi-professional Bangladesh team, on their brief but significant tour.

"We will provide the air fare, accommodation and food for a 22-member Mohammedan team," said Zakir.

Launched in 1996, the BAF has about 48 affiliated clubs and 26 teams are playing in the football league.

The briefing was also attended by the general secretary of Mohammedan Sporting Club Lokman Hossain Bhuiyan and publicity secretary Fazlur Rahman Babul, who is credited for putting the tour together.

France v Spain: Who will uncork the champagne?

BRUGES, Belgium, June 24: Tournament favourites France meet Spain here on Sunday for the glamour quarter-final of Euro 2000, a match where both the crowd and a global TV audience should be in for a footballing feast, reports AFP.

France proved they have the best national team by winning the World Cup two years ago, while Spain have the best club sides in Europe after filling three of the four slots in last season's Champions League semi-finals.

Real Madrid lifted the trophy in Paris last month at the Stade de France - whose inaugural match witnessed national hero Zinedine Zidane scoring.

Spain's two-goal rally in injury-time to beat Yugoslavia 4-3 and reach the last eight was the stuff of footballing legend. But there will be no such deliverance against France if Spain's rickety defence fail to cope with the sheer speed and firepower of Thierry Henry and Nicolas Anelka.

Mahmud, Enamul miss pay-roll?

National all-rounder Khaled Mahmud and veteran left-arm spinner Enamul Haque are almost destined to miss out from the elite list of fourteen cricketers, who are coming under the pay-roll of the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) from August 1.

According to a reliable source injured national opener Mehrab Hossain, who is now in India for treatment on his bad right knee, will not be included in the first of his kind contract since he needed at least a few months to recover.

Although the BCB president Saber Hossain Chowdhury opted for taking a maximum 14 players for a one-year contract, the selection committee headed by Tanvir Haider is reported to have selected 15 players in order to strike a balance.

Mahmud had a miserable last match for the national team against Pakistan in the seventh Asian Cup. The right-arm seamer was smashed for 80 runs in 10 overs, apparently considered past his prime to have a place in an otherwise youthful selection. Enamul whose days as a specialist bowler may be over too.

It was gathered that the selectors have picked stroke-maker Al-Shahriar, Kalabagan young middle-order batsman Rajin Saleh, gangling off-spinner Sabbir Ahmed and young left-arm seamer Bikash Ranjan Das.

His religion was not taken into consideration. So when, he made that comment on 'minority' I talked to him."

"He admitted his mistake and apologised to me. He also stated that he would not repeat the mistake again. So, as far as I am concerned the matter is closed. I would not like to make any comment on it."

Tryst with tomorrow

Come tomorrow evening London time, after the sun descends six thousand miles away, a cricket-fanatic country will erupt in sheer ecstasy.

The next time the sun rises over the shimmering paddy fields along Padma, Meghna and Jamuna, and countless other rivers and rivulets, the rays of sunlight shall usher in a new age - the Test era of Bangladesh.

Tomorrow one single decision by nine full members of the International Cricket Council to allow a tenth to take its seat in the hallowed chamber will fulfil the dream of a nation that eats cricket, sleeps cricket but, maybe just as well, does not drink that much.

Come tomorrow Bangladesh shall be officially acknowledged as the tenth best cricket-playing country in the world. Tenth in the world - that's not a mean feat, particularly when the country is granted at regular intervals with ignominious front rankings by the West in matters as disturbing as corruption, lead pollution, arsenicosis, human right violation, etc.

Come tomorrow Bangladesh shall stand head high as one of the best in an elite club that, despite ICC's retrained efforts to globalise the game, remains as exclusive as in 1909 when England, Australia and South Africa set up the Imperial

Cricket Conference, named International Cricket Conference in 1965.

Contrary to mistaken belief, one of Bangladesh's greatest sporting achievement is not being handed on a silver platter. The road to Test status was not strewn with rose petals. In fact, some thorns remain in the form of a section of the press in England and India, who have recently mounted a hate campaign on the Net to woo eight of the nine Test nations who have already made public their unequivocal support for Bangladesh.

Let this be an opportune occasion to remind the befuddled scribes in those two countries that England have won only about 33% of their Test matches in a pedestrian drudgery that stretches about a century; and India's success-rate is less than 20% in a mediocre grind that is seventy years old.

Come tomorrow the learned section of the press by the historic Thames and the holy Ganges shall be proven wrong. Also to be proven horribly off beam will be Bangladesh's former bamboozled cricket coach West Indian celebrity Gordon Greenidge, who said in 1998-99 that Bangladesh should not get the Test status before another ten years.

Some home-grown analysts

have of late aired on television that ICC should wait another two years before granting Bangladesh the coveted right to play Test matches. How unfortunate!

If it is Bangladesh's playing standard the section of the English and Indian press, Gordon Greenidge and this Bangladeshi 'pundit' is worried about, let them recall the standard of any of the other six at the time they became full members of ICC.

As far as cricket's infrastructure, popularity, government patronisation, club support, scope and future is concerned, even among the nine can presently compare with Bangladesh.

Come tomorrow cricket fans in Bangladesh shall express their gratitude to the BCB president Saber Hossain Chowdhury and its general secretary Syed Ashraf Huq, as well as the state minister for sports Obaidul Quader, a trio which worked in perfect tandem to elevate a nation to its long-felt aspiration.

Come tomorrow the Test status may not be enough to appease this nation's hunger for the game. Bangladesh shall always want a 'little' more. In this regard, this scribe wants to be on record that Bangladesh shall not have to wait GG's ten years before winning its first Test.

Pakistan secure series

GALLE, Sri Lanka, June 24 (AFP/Internet): Pakistan came up with a superb all-round effort to beat Sri Lanka by an innings and 163 runs and take an unbeatable 2-0 lead in the three-Test series at the Galle International Stadium on Saturday, reports AFP.

Sri Lanka, requiring a mammoth 419 runs to avoid an innings defeat, were dismissed for 256 in the final session of the fourth day, with more than a day's play left.

Sri Lanka made 181 in their first innings and Pakistan 600 for eight declared in reply.

It was another poor batting performance by the Sri Lankan batsmen on an excellent batting

pitch that saw them crumble to a crushing defeat.

Only Marvan Atapattu, who scored 59 in 249 minutes with nine fours, and former captain Arjuna Ranatunga, who slammed a quick 65 off 80 balls with 13 fours, held up the Pakistani advance.

Sri Lanka resumed at 45 for one and moved promisingly until lunch before things started to fall apart for them. The hosts had gone to lunch at 123 for two after Waqar Younis had claimed the only wicket to fall in the morning, that of Russell Arnold lbw for 26.

Off-spinner Arshad Khan snapped up the wickets of Atapattu and Aravinda de Silva (11) within 13 balls in the afternoon session as Sri Lanka slid to 189 for 6 at tea.

Atapattu gave Pakistan captain and wicketkeeper Moin Khan a simple catch and De Silva was caught at forward short leg by Mohammad Wasim.

Ranatunga, with the support of Chaminda Vaas (20), put together a stand of 43 for the seventh wicket before Wasim Akram broke through by having the former captain leg before wicket with a swinging yorker.

Azhar Mahmood then accounted for Vaas and Rangana Herath in one over to speed up the victory.

Muttiah Muralitharan hit out boldly for 22 off 10 balls which included five fours before Waqar ended the innings and the match by shattering his stumps.

Waqar finished with figures of four for 40 and a match bag of seven wickets, but Akram who scored 100 and took three wickets was picked the man-of-the-match.

Pakistan won the first Test by five wickets on 17 June.
