Privatisation Bill passed

Parliament yesterday passed three bills, including the much expected Privatisation Bill-2000, to eliminate legal obstacles to sell out the losing state-owned

enterprises, reports UNB. Under the new law, a Privatisation Commission will be formed with the authority to take independent decision while selling and handing over a government-owned mill or factory to the private entrepreneurs.

Provisions have also been incorporated in the new law to deal with the private owners. who after purchasing a mill or factory, will not comply with the terms and conditions of privati-

Education Minister A S H K Sadique, who is in-charge of parliamentary affairs of the Cabinet Division, moved the Bill in the House. It was later passed by voice vote.

The House also considered whe Bangladesh Water Develpment Board Bill, 2000 and the National Housing Authority Bill. 2000.

Bangladesh is seeking foreign assistance for land reclamation in the Bay of Bengal in the wake of fast depletion of agriculture land in the country. official sources said.

As farmlands are shrinking by an astounding rate of one million hectares per decade, the government finds land reclamation the only effective way to face the emerging problem of food insecurity.

As a stopgap 'land austerity' measure, the government also adopted a policy to acquire less land for construction of administrative buildings at district

and thana levels. Agriculture Minister Motia Chowdhury told the Daily Star yesterday that the government was seeking foreign aid and investment for land reclamation in the Bay because "days are ahead when our food production would decrease due to land scarcity despite increased pro-

in Rome. But never before had Bangladesh been so desperate for land reclamation. The desperation can be put down to colossal loss of prime agricultural lands due to industrialisa-

tion and urbanisation. The just drafted Land Use Policy of the government prohibits use of prime agricultural land for purposes other than farming. The draft policy that is awaiting cabinet approval follows concern over decrease of per capita arable land, which has come down to 0.18 acre from 0.30 acre in 1974.

The policy also suggests for vertical expansion instead of horizontal advancement in construction of houses, hospitals, educational institutions and other structures to ensure best possible use of scarce land. According to official statis-

Bimol Kumer Roy, a black smith, was murdered by some unidentified assailants. His body was left on the street in front of WAPDA Guest House in Demra Tuesday night. Police recovered the body in the early hours Wednesday.

Wife of the victim filed a case but none was arrested.

Muggers stab 2 traders, take away Tk 40000

Muggers stabbed two traders and took away Tk 40,000 from them near the Sayedabad footover bridge at about 3:30 p.m. yesterday.

Ashraf and Abdur Rahman, 30 and 42 respectively, brought jackfruits from Tangail and sold those in the city. The incident took place when the traders were returning home after collecting their money from the merchants, hospital sources quoted the victims as saying.

Ashraf was stabbed in both hands while Abdur Rahman got stabbed in the right. Both the victims were admitted to the DMCH yesterday afternoon.

Police said no case was registered and none was arrested. In another incident, miscreants cut off the tendons of an auto-rickshaw driver and left him near the under construction Buriganga bridge at Babubazar, said police and hos-

Police rescued the victim identified as Mizanur Rahman from near the bridge at about 11:30 p.m. on Tuesday and took him to the DMCH.

The Economic Forum would be the launching pad for greater economic and commercial cooperation among the fivemember countries of BIMSTEC, launched in Bangkok on June 6, 1997. The members are Bangladesh, India. Myanmar.

"The third ministerial meeting of BIMSTEC will launch the Economic Forum and address the issues of mobilising greater private sector investment in the region. It will discuss several aspects of trade, investment and tourism," Abul Hasan Chowdury told The Daily Star. Chowdhury is the outgoing
