

Romario slams Luxemburgo

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug 26: Brazilian striker Romario has criticised national coach Wanderley Luxemburgo for leaving him out of him for the Olympic Games, reports AFP.

The Vasco di Gama star, interviewed in Saturday's O Globo newspaper, said: "I want to show Wanderley that he was wrong in not picking me for the Olympic Games. It was my dream, everyone knew that."

Luxemburgo has chosen not to include any player over 23-years-old, reckoning that the young internationals are well up to holding their own in Sydney.

That means joining Romario on the missing persons list are Rivaldo and Emerson.

German Cup Frankfurt crash

COLOGNE, Aug 27: Eintracht Frankfurt bombed for the second time in a week in spectacular fashion Saturday when VfB Stuttgart's amateur side knocked them out of the German Cup 6-1 in the first round, reports AFP.

There were no other upsets in round one German Cup games Saturday.

Bayern Munich defeated third division FC Schoenberg 4-0. Borussia Dortmund beat third division FC Ismaing 4-0. Werder Bremen beat third division TuS Eintracht 2-0. "I'm feeling pretty positive about the shoulder at the moment, but it's important to remember things can change very quickly," the two-time US Open champion said in a column for Sydney's Sunday Telegraph.

"For that reason I'm not going to get my hopes up too much at the moment. Ideally, I'll be able to get my serve going this week before trying to step it up a level at the US Open."

"I've done a lot of fitness work over here in Bermuda and I've got no worries about being fit and strong enough to play a lot of matches."

All-Swedish Hamlet Cup final

COMMACK, New York, Aug 27: Top-seeded defending champion Magnus Norman of Sweden withstood a stiff challenge from big serving Dutchman Richard Krajicek here Saturday to reach the final of the 415,200-dollar ATP Hamlet Cup, reports AFP.

World number two Norman outlasted Krajicek 4-6, 6-4, 7-6 (7/0) in two hours and 13 minutes on Sunday tries to match Australian Lleyton Hewitt, Spaniard Alex Corretja and Brazil's Gustavo Kuerten with an ATP-high four 2000 titles.

The 24-year-old will now meet countryman Thomas Enqvist, a 7-6 (7/2), 6-1 victor over Frenchman Arnaud Clement in the other semifinal, in the third-all Swedish ATP final of the year.

"It's always difficult to play a good friend," Norman said. "I've never beaten him. He's got a big advantage over me. I'll have to return big and get to make sure to play with depths on my shots."

Enqvist is 4-0 against Norman, taking their most recent meeting in January 4-0 in the head-to-heads.

Marc Wilmots almost scored off a dangerous low free kick on the hour but Lens keeper Guillaume Warmuz saved well with his legs.

Lens then squandered another chance when Jerome Bonissel cleared off the line as visiting players queued up to score.

With some 20 minutes remaining Lens coach Roland Courbis withdrew the excellent Fuentes and sent on Daniel Moreira.

As the minutes ticked away Warmuz just tipped away a towering Dugarry header.

Siblings' rivalry



NEW YORK, Aug 27 (AP) From the time they were little girls, Venus and Serena Williams believed they would play each other for the US Open title. Now, perhaps, that time has come.

Papa Richard Williams, who danced so delightedly on the broadcast booth roof when Venus won Wimbledon last month, just might kick up his heels again in two weeks if his daughters set up the all-in-the-family final he has anticipated since their birth.

Serena, the defending champion, and Venus certainly could make it happen.

"I'm ready for the traffic and I'm ready for a night match on Monday," Venus said.

For the first time in their professional careers, they are going into a Grand Slam tournament as the favourites and, thanks to a bit of luck, on opposite sides of the draw.

The seedings for the women don't really reflect the pecking order in the game or the expected outcome of this 15 million dollars US Open, which begins Monday. Venus is No 3 behind top-seeded Martina Hingis and No 2 Lindsay Davenport, and Serena is miscast as No 5.

Cup ties would not be an issue.

"I won't be thinking about anything other than playing my best, and I'd be surprised if he took anything less into the match," said Rafter.

"Davis Cup won't be a factor. There's enough to play for as it is."

This year's Wimbledon finalist said he was excited about the Sydney Olympics but was trying to put it out of his mind until the US Open was over.

"I'm desperate to be healthy for the Games but, even if I'm not, I'm going to play anyway," he said.

"I'll never get this chance to play at an Olympic Games again. Sydney is going to be huge and I can't wait to get there, check it out, carry the torch and try and win a medal."

By following the WTA Tour rankings as usual for the seedings, the US Open did not take into account how thoroughly the Williams sisters have dominated this summer and how they have blossomed since coming back in the spring from long absences due to injuries.

Between them, they won four tournaments in a row - three by Venus - before Serena took a cautious exit with a foot injury in the final of the du Maurier Open in Montreal last Sunday.

Venus then won her fourth consecutive tournament and 19 straight match, beating Monica Seles in New Haven on Saturday to take the Pilot Pen title.

The doctor's diagnosis was sesamoiditis - an inflammation of a small bone on the base of her left foot. If that injury doesn't flare up again, Serena should be as dangerous as she was the previous week when she beat Hingis and Davenport to take a tour title in Manhattan Beach, California.

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Somerset bash for Windies

TAUNTON, Aug 27: West Indies suffered a shattering 269-run defeat against Somerset here on Saturday in their last game before next Thursday's final Test at The Oval, their batting again disintegrating on a good wicket, reports AFP.

They lost their last seven wickets for 45 runs in nine overs in 70 minutes after lunch as Somerset recorded their first victory over the West Indies for 61 years.

Jason Kerr wrapped up victory for Somerset with a first career hat-trick, dismissing Brian Lara, Nixon McLean and Cory Collimore as the West Indies, needing 439 to win, were bowled out for 169. But it was Jamie Grove that started the slide with three for five in 12 deliveries.

He removed Adrian Griffith - who top scored with 77 - Wavell Hinds and first innings centurion Mahendra Nagamootoo as the tourists showed little passion for the fight.

They had started the day on five for one and Griffith and nightwatchman Wayne Phillips lasted 50 minutes before Phillip Blackwell for Mike Burns to take a simple catch.

Acting captain Sherwin Campbell and Griffith then added 79 for the third wicket in comfortable fashion, both punishing anything loose. But Campbell then mistimed a drive off Burns to be caught at mid-off.

Lara celebrated his arrival at the crease with three magnificent boundaries in an over off Burns. But he could only watch from the other end as Grove began the eclipse of the tourists.

Griffith's 150-ball resistance came to an end as wicketkeeper Rod Turner dived to his left to take a magnificent low catch, but his 77 has probably guaranteed him a place for next Thursday.

The West Indies must win at The Oval if they are to avoid their first Test series defeat by England since 1969.

Homesick Windies

LONDON, Aug 27 (Internet report): West Indies coach Roger Harper has admitted that some of his players are tired and can't wait for the Test series against England to end.

The final Test begins at The Oval on Thursday and Harper claims some of his players are in desperate need of a break.

Some have been playing almost continuous cricket for months and Harper feels this is beginning to take its toll mentally.

"The guys had played a lot of cricket coming into this tour," he said.

"Some of the guys have been going since New Zealand and had a couple of series back-to-back against Zimbabwe and Pakistan in the Caribbean and then flew straight in to England."

"This has been a long and tiring tour and we have picked up a few injuries and I think the guys are just waiting for it to end just to get a bit of a break. It's more mental than physical really."

Despite this fatigue, Harper claimed that the West Indies were still determined to win the final Test and square the series 2-2.

"I think they know how important this last Test match is and everyone is ready to throw everything into those five days," he said.

By contrast the mood in the England camp could hardly be more buoyant following their sensational victory at Headingley in the last Test.

Darren Gough, one of the heroes of that incredible win, hopes England's success will attract more kids to the game.

"If we keep winning and the buzz keeps going in youngsters especially, then that can only do the game good," he said on BBC Radio 5 Live.

MU hit by Suker punch



LONDON, Aug 27: Croatian international Davor Suker scored a late equaliser to earn West Ham a point in a thrilling 2-2 draw against reigning Premier League champions Manchester United at Upton Park on Saturday, reports AFP.

United stroled into a 2-0 lead thanks to a David Beckham 25-yard free-kick in the sixth minute before striker Andy Cole added a second four minutes after half time.

Italian Paolo Di Canio scored a late penalty and with United on the back foot Suker struck the killer blow with a minute to go.

Finally the decision that Hammers had been waiting for came when Berg was penalised for fouling Joe Cole just inside the area and Di Canio stepped up to drive his spot-kick straight down the middle.

That came with just four minutes left and West Ham duly launched an all-out assault on the United goal, which eventually bore fruit in the final minute.

Di Canio was again the inspiration as he crossed deep for Suker to plant a powerful header at the far post which Barthez could only parry against the post.

The ball rebounded across the face of goal and even if it had not already crossed the line, there was Lomas to smash the ball into the roof of the net.

There was plenty of drama at Highbury where Premiership newcomers Charlton, who have not beaten Arsenal in their last 14 meetings dating back to 1956, went down fighting in a 5-
