JS may vote on reserved seats next session

Several new bills also on agenda

The upcoming session of the Jatiya Sangsad, planned to be a brief one though, is likely to have on its agenda some issues with significant bearings on the national politics.

Called basically to meet constitutional obligation, the session has primarily been designed for only seven working days. Beginning on September 6, the session will function until September 14, saving the weekends.

According to sources in the Jatiya Sangsad Secretariat, the ensuing session will decide the fate of the crucial bill on women's reserved seats, which is now lying with the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Law Ministry. The committee is still undecided on whether the scrutinised bill should be placed before the House or to seek time for further scrutiny.

If placed, the bill will then be on the agenda, and voting will take place on the passage of the bill and the amendments to it, if any. In such a case, the bill will fail to get the two-thirds supports required for its passage in the 330-strong parliament, unless the opposition lawmakers return to the House and vote for it, explained a high official at the Law Section in Parliament.

General Imam released from CMH

Major General Imamuzzaman, Bir Bikram, GOC, Bogra Division was released from the Dhaka Combined Military Hospital yesterday after being kept there for 16 days under unexplained circumstances.

He was admitted to the hospital on August 16 on orders of Army Headquarters on the alleged grounds of having high blood pressure.

CMH sources said he had to go through all sorts of tests which revealed there was nothing wrong with his physical or mental state. No treatment or medication was prescribed for the freedom fighter general during his confinement in a VVIP Cabin at the Hospital. General Imamuzzaman, famous for his heroics in the battle of Beliaria, still has seven more years of service.

Gen Musharraf won't meet Vajpayee at UN: Pakistan

ISLAMABAD, Aug 31: The country today ruled out a meeting between military ruler General Pervez Musharraf and Indian Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee on the sidelines of the United Nations millennium summit next week, reports AFP.

"There is no indication, possibility of Musharraf meeting Vajpayee. Foreign Office spokesman Riaz Mohammad Khan said at a briefing.

No such meeting is on the cards yet, he added.



## Transport strike shelved

Govt sees logic in fare hike but is against unilateral raise

Bangladesh Sarak Paribahan Samity will not go on an indefinite strike from today, as scheduled earlier, President of the Samity and ruling party MP Maqbul Hossain has said.

"We had a very successful discussion and we are not going on strike now," he said after a meeting between Communications Minister Anwar Hossain Monju and leaders of the Samity yesterday.

The minister told newsmen, "We requested transport owners not to increase fare indiscriminately and wait till September 10 when we will have another round of talks on the issue."

He also said, "there should

be some increase in fare as it remained the same over the last 10 years."

The Samity had earlier threatened to go on an indefinite strike from today demanding reduction of fuel prices.

Passengers protested the increase in fare and some untoward incidents were also reported from different areas of the country.

There were also allegations that transport owners engaged armed goons to enforce the increase of fare.

In reply to a question, leaders of Sarah Paribahan Samity said they have asked different units of their organisation not to increase fare before the government takes a decision on the issue.

Meanwhile, transport owners have increased fare by 20 to 30 per cent in different routes following increase in fuel prices recently.

Passengers protested the increase in fare and some untoward incidents were also reported from different areas of the country.

Leaders of Bangladesh Bus Truck Malik Samity were not invited to the meeting. They are not in favour of strike.

## Khulna Mayor in the dock

3 others also charged with misappropriation of Tk 3.56cr

KHULNA, Aug 31: The Anti-corruption Bureau, Khulna has filed a case with Khulna thana today against Mayor Sheikh Tayabur Rahman and three others on charge of misappropriating Tk 3,56,32,000 without any lawful authority and approval of the government.

Three others accused are APS Sheikh Shafiqul Hasan, PA Khan Eshrat Ali and PRO Sarder Abu Taher.

According to FIR, Mayor Tayab received Tk 4,56,32,526 from T&T Board, Khulna in 1995 and 1996 for renovation of roads that were damaged due to

installation of telephone lines in the city.

This money was given in four cheques as compensation to repair several roads. But he spent Tk 3,55,69,845 without any lawful authority and approval of the government, the FIR added.

Besides, the City Mayor paid Tk 38,140 to his APS Shafiqul Hasan as travelling allowance during his visit to India from October 25 to November 10 in 1995 also without any legal authority and prior permission of the Prime Minister.

He misappropriated Tk 1,06,296 in the name of payment of TA bills causing financial loss to the national exchequer, the FIR added.

## Sandwip goes under water

12,000 people take refuge in cyclone centres

CHITTAGONG, Aug 31: About 12,000 people have taken refuge at the cyclone shelters after tidal wave inundated more than 1,000 dwelling houses in the coastal island of Sandwip, police and other sources said today.

Sandwip town went under five-foot high tidal water today. Water entered into the ground floor of Sandwip Upazila Office and into many shops there. Normal life was disrupted in Sandwip island while traffic movement came to a halt, police

## Dissuade Delhi from building

N-plant in Sunderbans  
FOEB urges govt

The Friends of the Earth, Bangladesh (FOEB) has appealed to the government to take up with New Delhi the issue of India's plan to build a nuclear power station on its part of the Sunderbans.

The two Sunderbans are indivisible. A nuclear station is bound to adversely affect the bio-diversity of the Sunderbans as a whole, Professor Kazi Zaker Hossain, a well-known zoologist said yesterday.

Professor Hossain who carried out the first census in the Sunderbans in the eighties to determine the number of Royal Bengal Tigers, told a workshop in the city that there is no guarantee that another tragedy similar to Bhopal or Chernobyl

## BCL leaders on special mission

PM wants report on AL's prospects in general elections

Student leaders, who attended the meeting with the PM at her official residence, told The Daily Star that she sought for an early assessment on AL's prospects in the 2001 general elections.

Sheikh Hasina also warned that she would not take the responsibility if the young leadership of her party indulged in

acts of terrorism and extortion.

"If you (students and youth leaders) don't earn any bad name for me, I've full confidence that people of my country would elect Awami League into power again," the AL leader was quoted as having said by one student leader who had attended the meeting.

The Prime Minister's meeting with the student leaders came a day after she had met her cabinet colleagues Tuesday night. Members of AL Advisory Council also attended the meeting. However, the two ministers belonging to Jatiya Party and JSD - Anwar Hossain Manju and ASM Rob - were not invited.

Eighteen teams comprising current and former leaders of the Bangladesh Chhatra League were formed and these set off for 64 districts today. Each team will have to visit at least three districts before returning

to the capital city by September 6.

"We're asked to assess organisational strength and weakness of the party at the district level, party position before the next year's parliamentary elections and intra-party feuds in every district," disclosed one former student leader preferring anonymity.

When asked about reports of intra-party bickering and resultant incidents of violence in recent weeks, the meeting sources said that the AL chief was well aware of the developments and would issue appropriate directives to AL leaders in the upper echelon.

Leaders attending the meeting were also advised to highlight AL government's performance over the last four years with special emphasis on poverty-eradication, literacy movement and child health issues.

## Respite for Ershad

SC extends deadline for surrender

The Appellate Division of the Supreme Court yesterday extended time for former President HM Ershad's surrender before the trial court.

It further ordered that the special leave petition should be filed before the full court within one week after the court reopens on October 15.

Justice AM Mahmudur Rahman, a Vacation Bench judge of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court heard Ershad's petition seeking time for his surrender before the trial court and issued the order.

Barrister Rafiqul Huq, counsel for Ershad, submitted before the court that his client had not yet received the certified copies of the HC order and as such leave petition could not be filed. The hearing that began at 10:30 a.m. continued for 15 minutes.

Ershad intended to file leave petition against the HC order after receiving the certified copies of the order, the counsel said praying for time to enable him to file the leave petition.

The additional attorney general and the deputy attorney general opposed the prayer for stay.

In another development, the Second Additional District and Sessions Judge's Court, Dhaka fixed September 4 for submitting certified copies of the orders of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court and the High Court Division regarding Ershad's surrender before the trial court in the Janata Tower.

Earlier, Ershad's counsel

Shakil Mohammad Serajul Islam moved the petition in the Court of District and Sessions Judge, Dhaka.

On August 24, a Division Bench of High Court comprising Justice Golam Rabiani and Justice Latifur Rahman in their judgement in the 'Janata Tower Case' sentenced Ershad to five years imprisonment and fined Tk 5.5 crore, in default two more years. The court also fined 18 others including his wife Roushna Ershad.

A lower court had earlier sentenced the former President to seven years imprisonment in the same case.

## Encroachers flout BIWTA ultimatum

By Staff Correspondent BIWTA's well-publicised 30-day ultimatum to remove all encroachments from the river Buriganga expired Monday without any one of the 200 encroachers paying any heed.

Moreover, the BIWTA officials do not have any plan in hand whatsoever about what action they would take now. They would do now to recover the Buriganga from the clasp of the encroachers after their ultimatum is over.

One source said that the concerned officials were too busy with other things to look into the problems of Buriganga encroachments. The ultimatum was served following public pressure on BIWTA to protect the lifeline of the river of which BIWTA is the custodian.

Sources also said that the BIWTA has no plan in hand to evict the encroachers. The concerned file is now lying with the Director Port of BIWTA.

If the BIWTA wants to fulfil its pledge to clear the river Buriganga, it would have to write to the Deputy Commissioner of Dhaka and also seek police assistance. Besides, they might have to procure bulldozers for demolition inside the river. A source informed that

British Secretary of State for Home Affairs Jack Straw MP will visit Bangladesh from 9-10 September, according to a British High Commission press release issued yesterday.

Straw, who is one of the top cabinet ministers in Tony Blair's government will hold talks with Bangladesh counterpart Home Minister Mohammed Nasim. Straw will also call on Chief Justice Latifur Rahman and meet the acting minister for foreign affairs.

Straw would also call on the Leader of the Opposition Khaleda Zia. He will exchange views with representatives of the civil society and other prominent figures.

Straw will be accompanied by officials from the Home Office and Foreign and Commonwealth Office in the United Kingdom.
