Galatasaray see off Rangers

ISTANBUL, Sept 28: UEFA Cup champions Galatasaray beat Glasgow Rangers 3-2 in European Champions League Group D here on Wednesday night to give them a good chance of making the second phase, reports AFP.
With the match at 0-0 at the break, Bulent Akin and Hakan Unsal put the home side firmly in the driving seat.
In the 70th minute Brazilian Mario Jardel put the game out of Rangers' reach with a gloriously struck first-time effort from outside the area as he hit Unai Davala's long ball on the volley.
To their credit Rangers replied within two minutes when Andrei Kanchelskis recorded a rare headed goal, converting Arthur Numan's cross.
Hasan Sas flashed a header over the bar as Rangers manager Dick Advocaat was left to ponder his tactics for the re-match in Glasgow which now becomes the group's most significant fixture.
In the fourth minute of injury time van Bronckhorst fired in a free-kick to make it 3-2 but that was virtually the last kick of the game.

Prague keep alive hopes

PRAGUE, Sept 28: Sparta Prague beat Shakhtar Donetsk 3-2 here on Wednesday night to keep up hopes of qualification to the second phase of the European Champions League from Group B, reports AFP.

Real rule on Roberto Carlos

LEVERKUSEN, Germany, Sept 28: Reigning champions Real Madrid twice came from behind to see off German runners-up Bayer Leverkusen in a see-saw battle in Group A of the European Champions League here Wednesday, reports AFP.
Star Brazilian wing-back Roberto Carlos was instrumental in cancelling out an opening goal from Bernd Schneider with a free-kick special after Jens Nowotny committed a foul, before grabbing the winner with 15 minutes to go after his side had again come back from 2-1 down.
It was a bitter blow for Leverkusen who took the lead

for the second time just before half-time with a goal from Michael Ballack and should have maintained their lead at home before Carlos intervened.
Jose Maria Gutierrez scored a crucial equaliser on 69 minutes for Madrid and then left matters in the hands of his Brazilian teammate.
"Unfortunately these things happen in football although normally they shouldn't," said a disappointed Nowotny after conceding the important free-kick.
"The fact that it resulted in a goal makes it worse but it's happened now and we have to look forward and really work on things," he concluded. Madrid now top the Group with seven points with Russian side Spar-

tak Moscow just behind on six.
"We had the chances to win, we led twice and then let loose our grip on the match with individual mistakes," said Ballack. "After we went behind you could see we had run out of steam. Normally we can come back from things like that, but tonight (Wednesday) we didn't. The last two weeks have taken their toll."
The two losers on another night of intriguing European action in Group A, Leverkusen and Sporting Lisbon remain on three and one points respectively with three games to play.
The same match-ups are set for the next round of matches with the venues reversed on October 17.

Simone silences Sturm

MONACO, Sept 28: Monaco's 31-year-old Italian striker Marco Simone raced to a first half hat-trick in their 5-0 Group D European Champions League victory over

Austrian side Sturm Graz here on Wednesday, reports AFP.
In a first half that Monaco dominated, stringing together long chains of passes together the Austrians looked a different side to the one that hammered UEFA Cup holders

Galatasaray a week ago.
Simone opened his account on 12 minutes after picking up the ball outside the box and firing in a precise shot past Josef Stiekligruber after leaving the defence for dead.
Chris Nonda would have scored two on a better night before the Italian struck again on 38 minutes.
Xavier Gravelaine had a shot parried and Simone leapt onto the rebound but the Austrian keeper got in front of the ball again before Simone made sure with a fierce right foot shot.
Three minutes later Simone had his hat-trick, running onto an upfield ball. Sturm's keeper came off his line but Simone guided the ball round him after cutting inside Yugoslav defender Ranko Popovic.
Confident Monaco replaced in-form midfielder Ludovic Giuly early in the second half with striker Nicolas Bonnal and on 56 minutes hat-trick hero Simone left the pitch to a standing ovation making way for Croatian striker Dado Prso.
Though both had busy nights it was a third sub 20-year-old Swede Pontus Farnrud who bagged the fourth on 77 minutes having replaced captain Martin Djedou only three minutes earlier.
Monaco's record signing Shabani Nonda got his second Champions League goal making it 5-0 after a mazy run into the box. The keeper parried his shot but the giant African was first to the rebound on 84 minutes.
Poor Sturm Graz have now lost both their away games 5-0 having also been hammered by Rangers.

Valencia's three in three

VALENCIA, Spain, Sept 28: Last season's Champions League runners-up Valencia maintained their 100 percent record in this season's opening Group phase with a hard fought 1-0 win over French side Lyon here Wednesday, reports AFP.
The 29-year-old midfielder latched onto the ball perfectly and fired home a left-foot shot that Lyon goalkeeper Gregory Coupet could only grasp at, as the ball crept into the bottom left-hand corner.
The result was a bitter blow for the French side's chances of reaching the second phase despite constant pressure to salvage an equalizer.

The opening half began with both teams playing with a degree of caution limiting scoring chances to a minimum.
It took 20 minutes for the first real chance and it was the French side to create it through their Brazilian striker Sonny Anderson.
Finding room on the edge of the box, last season's top scorer in France whipped in a left-foot shot but put it too close to the Valencia 'keeper and Jose Canizares made a comfortable save.
Two minutes later Anderson was at it again and should have done better after a mazy run opened space just outside the area but he repeated his earlier mistake and drove his shot straight at Canizares.
Valencia gradually pulled themselves into the match and showed why they were last season's runners-up creating a penalty after 36 minutes.
A tussle in the area between Lyon defender Jean-Marc Chanelet and striker Gonzalez looked to be a fair battle but as the Valencia striker went to the ground, the referee had no hesitation pointing to the spot.
Gaizka Menditea promptly stepped up and saw his poorly placed penalty parried away by Lyon 'keeper Coupet.
Sanchez was running in and hammered the rebound but Coupet was equal to the task

and blocked his goalbound effort to keep Lyon in the game and throw his side a brief lifeline.
Lyon now desperately need a result in their next match at home against the same opposition and must hope that the Greeks of Olympiakos slip up on their visit to Heerenveen.

Spartak down Sporting

MOSCOW, Sept 28: Russian champions Spartak Moscow earned their second home victory in Group A European Champions League action, defeating Portuguese giants Sporting Lisbon 3-1 here on Wednesday, reports AFP.
Brazilian strikers Louis Robson and Marcao combined for all three goals for Spartak, wiping out an opening goal from Portuguese forward Sa Pinto who found the mark after 24 minutes.

Spartak began the game at their Luzhnik stadium without their skipper Andrei Tikhonov, but got off to a lively start while the visitors piled numbers in defence, limiting their chances to the odd counter-attack.
Spartak's Russian international keeper Alexander Filimonov gifted Lisbon an opening goal after Andre Cruz's decisive corner allowed Sa Pinto to give the Portuguese side the lead.
The goal sparked the Russian side into action as they pushed forward looking for an equalizer.
On the stroke of half-time Robson fired home the equalizer, picking up a rebound after Danish keeper Peter Schmeichel failed to hold the initial shot.
After the break, Sporting seized the initiative and began to control the ball better, creating scoring opportunities, and it was substitute striker Marcao who potted Spartak's second with a remarkable header from 11 metres in the 68th minute after Vasily Baranov's cross from the right.

Ljunberg hero at Highbury

LONDON, Sept 28: Arsenal convincingly beat Lazio 2-0 in their Champions League Group B match here at a rain-swept Highbury on Wednesday with Swedish midfielder Fredrik Ljungberg scoring either side of half-time, reports
It was a surprise reverse for Lazio, the Italian champions and one of the pre-tournament favourites who never lived up to their billing against a sharp Arsenal side.
The London club continued its trend of providing unlikely goal heroes after defender Martin Keown's double strike in the 3-2 win over Ukrainian Shakhtar Donetsk in last week's outing.
Lazio coach Sven Goran Eriksson had no complaints about the result. "They deserved to win, especially in the second half. Arsenal have a good combination of technique and physical strength."
"This was our first defeat in six games. Nobody likes to lose but sometimes you have to accept it. I hope when we play Arsenal in two weeks we are much better."

Both teams came into this game having won their two previous Champions League matches this season.
Arsenal had the added boost of seeing England captain Tony Adams return to the centre of their defence.
The Highbury veteran had missed the Donetsk game, a match that saw his team go 2-0 down before fighting back for a famous victory.
Arsenal were clearly not prepared to make the same mistake twice and with Adams restored looked far more solid at the back.
Equally Lazio with some 130 million pounds (182 million dollars) worth of talent on the pitch and the star defender of Euro 2000, team captain Alessandro Nesta marshalling their rearguard, were secure initially.
Lazio's Argentine midfielder Juan Sebastian Veron showed a couple of neat touches but his side's only two opening period chances of note fell to Yugoslav defender Sinisa Mihajlovic.
Playing in a face-mask to protect a broken cheekbone, Mihajlovic saw two 25-yard free-kicks sail close to David Seaman's goal within the space of two minutes.
Neither though was a true test for the England goalkeeper and in the opening 45 minutes Lazio failed to produce a single shot on target.
Arsenal should have taken the lead in the 36th minute

when Thierry Henry found himself one-on-one against Luca Marchegiani but the onrushing goalkeeper saved well with his legs.
However, Arsenal, who did most of the first-half attacking, got the goal they wanted two minutes from half-time.
Kanu's long pass was knocked down by Bergkamp into the path of midfielder Ljungberg and from the edge of the six-yard box his shot gave Marchegiani no chance.
In the 56th minute the Bergkamp-Ljungberg partnership combined again for Arsenal's second goal.
The Dutchman's precise pass split open the Lazio defence and the Swede calmly lifted the ball past Marchegiani.
The goalkeeper was in action soon afterwards, saving well from Kanu after he was left one-on-one with the tall forward as the visitors defence waited for a non-existent flag.
At half-time Lazio had replaced midfielder Dejan Stankovic with Attilio Lombardo and now they chose to change strikers too.
Simone Inzaghi had scored 12 goals in 13 previous Champions League games but was hardly given a kick by the Arsenal defence.
His place was taken by Chile international Marcelo Salas and Eriksson quickly decided 'El Matador' needed more support up front.
In the 72nd minute he took off Lombardo and brought on former Middlesbrough striker Fabrizio Ravanelli.
Not that Arsenal seemed to mind. In the 75th minute Ljungberg was clean through on goal but with the chance of a rare hat-trick beckoning saw Marchegiani again keep Lazio in the game with another fine save.
With four minutes remaining Mihajlovic got a 20-yard free-kick on target but Seaman, in his only serious save of the match, pushed it away.
Afterwards a contented Wenger said: "Last year we were not good enough nor the year before so psychologically it was important for the players to beat a team as good as Lazio."
He added that Bergkamp's positional switch meant the striker was 'facing the game and so he can play a finer ball'.
"If David Beckham can do it, why not Dennis Bergkamp?", the Frenchman said somewhat provocatively.
Ljungberg, Bergkamp's partner in goalscoring crime, also won Wenger's praise.
"I'm pleased for Ljungberg. He was really sharp tonight. The real Freddie Ljungberg is the second goal he scored, getting behind the defender at the right moment."
