Another deflection by Veen secured the Dutch their third goal six minutes before the final whistle. But South Korea's dual strike in the final moments threw open the game.

South Korea's silver medal in only their third Olympics followed their fifth place finish at Atlanta four years ago.

Both the Netherlands and South Korea had reached the title round with unexpected help from their rivals.

The Dutch, almost out of contention when they crashed to a 2-0 defeat against Pakistan in the preliminary league last Tuesday, were lifted into the semifinals when Great Britain stunned Germany three hours later.

Then in the semifinals, a missed stroke by Australia's Brent Livermore in the tie-breaker saw the Dutch through after an uninspiring goalless draw.

The Koreans too were revived by a last-gasp equaliser by Poland that knocked India out of the semifinal race.

Earlier in the bronze medal game, Troy Elder scored three goals as hosts the blasted Pakistan 6-3 to retain the medal they won at Atlanta four years ago.

Veteran Stephen Davies, James Elmer and Michael Brennan also found the mark as the Kookaburras pumped in three goals in each session to complete a comprehensive win.

It helped the hosts tide over the disappointment of being knocked out in a penalty shoot-out by the Netherlands in Thursday's semifinal.

Australia will have to wait till 2004 to bid for their first gold medal, despite a top-four finish for a sixth straight time.

Pakistan, who won the last of their three golds at the Los Angeles Games in 1984, leave Sydney two places higher than their sixth place at Atlanta.

The play-off between the losing semifinalists began on a rousing note with three goals in the first eight minutes, two of them by Australia.

Elder, the 22-year-old Queenslander playing in his first Olympics, put the hosts ahead in the third minute by converting their first penalty corner.

Atif Bashir drew level in the sixth by deflecting in a pass from the right, but Elder scored his second goal two minutes later to make it 2-1.

At the other end, Mohammad Sarwar's reverse lift from the top of the circle flew over the Australian goal.

The Kookaburras, however, increased the margin five minutes before half-time when Darren scored from a rebound off goalkeeper Ahmed Alam's pads.

Pakistan's penalty corner specialist, Sohail Abbas netted his fourth goal of the competition after the break to make it 6-1.

# Voeller sticks to the pattern

OBERHAUSEN, Germany. Sept 29: German caretaker coach Rudi Voller, in announcing his squad to face England at Wembley on October 7 in a crucial World Cup Group Nine qualifier, kept faith with the squad which beat Greece 2-0 on September 2, reports AFP.

The only change is that the squad has been trimmed from 22 players to 20 with defensive midfielder Jorg Heinrich of Borussia Dortmund and Bayern Munich forward Alexander Zickler missing through injury.

"It's not just a match with three points at stake. It's a classic encounter - and played at a classic venue - so there will be no problems motivating ourselves," said Voller, who since taking over from Euro 2000 flop Erich Ribbeck has won both his matches as caretaker.

However, Voller insisted he will definitely hand over the reins next June to Bayer Leverkusen coach Christoph Daum as arranged.

The Germans started his reign by thrashing Spain 4-1 in a friendly and then were solid if unspectacular in beating Greece in Hamburg.

"Christoph Daum is the ideal solution. It has always been

clear to me that I would stop this summer," said Voller, who is to return to his post as Leverkusen's sporting director.

Daum, 46, was in July named as the man to take the Germans through to the World Cup and also Euro 2004.

However, as Voller's stock has risen with two wins under his belt ahead of the double-header against England, Daum's has fallen with Leverkusen out of the top five in the



Bundesliga and struggling badly in the Champions League.

But on Wednesday Daum insisted that "everything will go ahead as planned."

# Tasty round two fixtures

NYON, Switzerland. Sept 30: Red Star Belgrade take on Spanish side Celta Vigo in what looks the match of the UEFA Cup second round, after Friday's draw, reports AFP.

Red Star are no longer the force they were when they won the European Cup in 1991, but after overcoming English side Leicester 3-1 in a fiery tie in Vienna on Thursday, Yugoslavia's sleeping giants appear to have the means to get past Celta.

The Spaniards know the territory well, having reached the quarter-finals in the last two campaigns, but made heavy work of scraping past Rijeka of Croatia 1-0 on aggregate, needing extra time Thursday.

In-form Scottish side Celtic can thank a late goal from striker Chris Sutton for putting them into a tie with 1999 French champions Bordeaux, who hammered Gorica of Poland 5-0 on Tuesday to win 6-0 on aggregate.

Bordeaux are running into form after an uneasy start to their campaign, notably on account of new signing Pauleta, the Portuguese striker who has scored two hat-tricks in three

weeks since arriving from Spanish champions Deportivo La Coruna.

Once-mighty Liverpool had a quiet night at Anfield, scene of European glory in years past, drawing 0-0 with Rapid Bucharest to go through to meet Czech minnows Slovan Liberec by virtue of Nicky Barmby's goal in Hungary a fortnight ago.

The English club, who won four European Cups and 18 English league titles, have been steadily rebuilding since former French coach Gerard Houllier took over two years ago and believe they are on their way back to European glory.

Protected by a weighted draw, Inter Milan, who won the competition three times during the 1990s, face a delicate tie against Dutch club Vitesse Arnhem.

Balbo and Italians Vincenzo Montella, Marco Delvecchio and Francesco Totti at their disposal take on Porto's poor neighbours Boavista.

The Lisbon-based side will hope to concede less than the eleven goals Slovenians Gorika did in their nightmare first round slaughter.

In the German camp Kaiserslautern face Greek club Iraklis, who squeezed past tiny Gueugnon, who are currently wallowing near the bottom of the French Second Division.

Hertha Berlin will pay close attention to Polish outfit Amica Wronki, who overcame a first leg 4-1 deficit to upset Spain's Real Zaragoza - winners of the now defunct Cup Winners Cup in 1995.

Tyrol Innsbruck, who shocked Tottenham's former club Fiorentina face an equally tough tie in the next round in the form of VfB Stuttgart of Germany.

Dutch giants Ajax, who bagged nine goals in the last round against Belgian side Genk, face Swiss side Lausanne, who sank Torpedo Moscow 5-2 on aggregate.

The first leg ties will be played on October 26 with the return on November 9.

**DI MATTEO OPERATED UPON**

LONDON: Chelsea midfielder Roberto di Matteo suffered a double fracture of his left leg in Thursday night's UEFA Cup clash against Swiss champions St Gallen. X-rays have confirmed.

The Swiss-born Italian international has already undergone an operation and will stay in Switzerland for three or four days, according to assistant manager Gwyn Williams.

Williams said: "Given what's happened he's as well as can be expected."

Chelsea lost the first round, second leg match 2-0 and crashed out of the competition 2-1 on aggregate.

**KAISER HEADS WC 2006 ORGANISING COMMITTEE**

MAINZ, Germany: Franz

Beckenbauer was officially named president of Germany's 2006 World Cup organising committee, the German Football Federation (DFB) said Friday.

Beckenbauer, 55, the current Bayern Munich president and vice-president of the DFB, headed the committee behind Germany's successful bid which saw them pip hot favourites South Africa in Zurich on July 6.

"I'm delighted with the job. It's an honour," said Beckenbauer, known as "the Kaiser" as a mark of respect for his status in German football, having won the World Cup as both a player in 1974 and coach in 1990.

The committee head office will be in Frankfurt, in the actual DFB offices, and opens on January 1 2001, with a second office in Munich.

Three vice-presidents were also named: Horst Schmidt (finance, security, stadiums), Wolfgang Niersbach (communication) and Fedor Radmann (coordination).

**SA MAY BID FOR 2010 WORLD CUP**

JOHANNESBURG: A key figure in the failed bid to bring the 2006 World Cup to South Africa says his country may launch another challenge for the event.

Danny Jordaan, chief executive of the bid committee, said government and business backing was crucial if the dream of the 2010 finals in South Africa were to be realised.

Another challenge for the 32-nation quadrennial tournament would hinge on internal support as South Africa could not rely on external goodwill, Jordaan warned.

"We cannot be a nation of wheelbarrows that moves only when pushed. We must depend on our creative energies to push forward. That is the lesson we learnt from the 2006 bid."

Germany pipped South Africa 12-11 for the 2006 World Cup after Oceania delegate Charles Dempsey abstained from the final round of voting, citing "intolerable pressure".

## Luxemburgo puts up a brave face

SAO PAULO, Brazil, Sept 30: Brazil coach Wanderley Luxemburgo insisted on Friday he had no intention of resigning despite the disappointment of an early Olympic exit, reports AFP.

Luxemburgo goes into a crisis meeting with Brazilian Football Confederation (CBF) president Ricardo Teixeira on Sunday, and is widely tipped to lose his job after Brazil's poor run in their World Cup campaign.

"I guarantee you one thing, I won't quit. I want to lead the side into the 2002 World Cup," Luxemburgo told the Brazilian state press agency Friday. "But I will only continue with the backing of Teixeira."

Teixeira summoned Luxemburgo for the Sunday meeting and has scheduled a press conference for Monday, where the national press is predicting his departure from the post of national coach.

Luxemburgo said he had spoken to Teixeira, who assured him he would continue in his post, before he left Sydney.

In his first interview since his return to Brazil, Luxemburgo stressed that he was not in the job for the money and that if he were relieved of the post there would be no question of compensation.

"I'm not dead and buried yet as some would have it," he stressed.

However, analysts are tipping Cruzeiro coach Luiz Felipe Scolari to take over the World Cup campaign.

## Diego's song on English tragedy!

BUENOS AIRES, Sept 30: Controversial former Argentine star Diego Maradona is to record a song entitled "La mano de Dios" (the hand of God) to celebrate his infamous World Cup goal against England in the 1986 World Cup, reports AFP.

The song, which local singer Rodrigo dedicated to him before his death in a car accident three months ago, is tongue in cheek as it refers to the slam dunk goal which Maradona scored with his hand in the 1986 World Cup quarter-final.

He later went on to score a second in the same match after a brilliant, dizzy run leaving a trail of England defenders in his wake.

Maradona, 39, returned home Wednesday from Cuba, where he spent some eight months undergoing treatment for heart problems brought on by cocaine abuse.

On Thursday he revealed his latest transformation from soccer megastar via drug addict and author with a recent biography, entitled "I am Diego," to budding songster - at England's expense.

Maradona said in an interview with Argentine television that he would add his voice to the track Rodrigo had laid down before his death.

The pair got the idea for the song when the singer visited Maradona in Havana.

SYDNEY, Sept 30 (Reuters): The overall attendance for the Olympic soccer tournament topped one million when 98,212 attended the final between Cameroon and Spain on Saturday taking the total attendance to 1,069,250 for the whole competition.

The crowd for the final was the largest at any of the 32 matches in the men's competition, or for the games in the women's event not played as curtain raisers before the men's games.

The previous highest attendance was the 93,252 who saw Italy beat Australia 1-0 on the opening day of the competition at the Melbourne Cricket Ground on September 13.

The lowest crowd was 12,753 who saw South Korea defeat Morocco 1-0 at the Hindmarsh Stadium in Adelaide on September 17.

Every match produced a goal. In all 103 were scored in the tournament - not including the goals scored in penalty shoot outs between the United States and Japan and the final shootout between Cameroon and Spain.

Chile were top scorers with 14, with their Inter Milan striker Ivan Zamorano finishing as the top individual scorer with six goals.

# Swedes just can't do it

## HANDBALL

SYDNEY, Sept 30: Russia beat Sweden 28-26 in the final of the Olympic men's handball competition to claim the gold medal here Saturday, reports AFP.

A run of seven unanswered goals at the start of the second-half propelled the Russians to victory and confirmed the Swedes' tag as perennial Olympic bridesmaids.

The Scandinavians - who came into the final as the only country not to have lost a game - were desperate to finally win the one major title that had always eluded them.

Four years ago at Atlanta they were upset by Croatia in the final and in 1992 at Barcelona they succumbed to the Unified Team at the final hurdle.

With less than thirty seconds on the clock Swedish captain Stefan Loevgren put his

side ahead.

The Swedes gained an early psychological advantage when all-star goalkeeper Tomas Svensson saved a penalty shot from Edouard Kokcharov.

But the Russians - ranked number two in the world - were in no mood to roll over and Lev Voronin levelled things up at four apiece with a delightful lob.



Russia built up a 21-16 lead though Sweden showed some character to close the gap to 22-20 before Russia's Viatcheslav Gorpichine received a two-minute suspension as the tension rose.

Matthias Franzen's strike from the resulting penalty made it 24-23 in Russia's favour with less than nine minutes remaining.

But Kokcharov scored again to stretch his side's lead before Vassili made it 27-23 with only five minutes to go.

After a magnificent penalty save from Russian goalkeeper Andrei Lavrov, the Swedes sensed it was not to be their night and another powerful goal from Alexander Tsuchkin 40 seconds from time sealed the gold.

Earlier Spain beat Yugoslavia 26-22 to clinch the bronze medal.

## Thy shall not steal

SYDNEY, Sept 30: Olympics organisers appealed Saturday to Sydney residents not to steal thousands of flags hanging in the city ahead of the Paralympics, reports AP.

More than 10,000 of the colorful banners have been hung along Sydney streets during the Olympics and are due to stay until after the Oct. 18-29 Paralympics.

Wheelchair athlete Louise Sauvage said it would be a great disappointment if the banners had all been stolen before the Paralympics began.

"I remember arriving in Atlanta four years ago after the Olympics ended and things had been pulled down and ripped down," she said.

"So please, leave the banners around so Paralympic athletes like me will feel like they're part of a big exciting event."

## That's the spirit!

SYDNEY, Sept 30: Swimming star Ian Thorpe was awarded 10,000 dollars (\$5,500 USD) Saturday for living up to the Olympic spirit - and immediately gave it all to charity, reports AP.

The triple gold medalist was one of three Australian Olympic athletes named as the winners of a sports drink's "Never Give Up Awards."

Aboriginal 400-metre gold medalist Cathy Freeman and 15-year-old swimmer Leisel Jones, the youngest member of the Australian swim team, were the other winners.

Thorpe gave his prize to Olympic Aid, an athlete-driven charity set up to raise funds for children in need.

Thorpe already has donated his autographed fast-track swimming suit to Olympic Aid's online athlete memorabilia auction and a bid of 100,000 dollars (\$5,000 USD) has been entered for it.
