Hasina, Clinton hold official talks today

WASHINGTON, Oct 18: Official talks between Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and US President Bill Clinton will be held tomorrow (Thursday), reports BSS.

The Dhaka-Washington formal talks, scheduled for an hour from 12.25 pm local time (10.25 pm BST), will focus on issues of mutual interest of both the nations.

The issues include extradition of the killers of Bangabandhu, increasing US investment in Bangladesh, particularly in oil, gas and energy sectors and duty-free and quota-free access of Bangladeshi goods to US market.

The two leaders will also discuss regional and global issues on which they have been maintaining identical views.

WB aid sought for post-flood rehabilitation

WASHINGTON, Oct 18: Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina today urged the World Bank to provide needed assistance to help her government to cope with post-flood situation and repair flood-damaged infrastructure, report agencies.

Hasina's call came during a meeting with World Bank President James D Wolfenson at the Blair House on Tuesday. Wolfenson was accompanied by Vice-President Miesko Nishimizu and other high officials of the Bank.

They discussed the World Bank programmes, being implemented in Bangladesh. The World Bank President enquired about the on-going reforms in Bangladesh.

Hasina referred to the damage caused by the unusual floods in the south-western districts which did not witness flood in more than half a century.

She said Bangladesh needed assistance from the development partners to cope with the post-flood situation, particularly for the draining the stagnant water, and repairing the damaged infrastructure.

The prime minister said her government has initiated reforms in a big way in the social sector programmes, particularly for alleviation of poverty. Speaking about the reforms in power sector, she said, "We have allowed

Fostering democratic values a must for development

Clinton hopes Bangladesh would put aside 'destructive partisan politics'

WASHINGTON, Oct 18: US President Bill Clinton has expressed strong optimism that Bangladeshis can put aside destructive partisan politics to work together towards development in a democratic order, reports UNB.

"Fostering democratic values is never easy, but it is essential to the progress of any nation," he said in an interview with UNB chief editor Enayeturrahman Khan.

During the interview, the US President made frank and candid observations about Bangladesh's politics and economics, its role in international affairs, North-South co-operation, problems facing the LDCs, impact of globalisation and global peace and security.

"Bangladesh has overcome a violent political history, and my great hope is to see Bangladeshis enter a period of productive cooperation for the benefit of all," Clinton said.

Asked if Bangladesh has chosen the right path for its development through fostering democratic values and pursuing economic reforms, he said Bangla-

desh made some truly impressive progress on development.

He said economic reforms are never easy, and the returns are not immediate, but future generations would benefit from today's wise economic decision.

The US President praised Bangladesh's efforts to eliminate child labour from its textile and

apparel industry, and steps to protect environment.

"Those are advances that are not included in the bottom-line analyses of accountants, but are essential to long-term prosperity for the whole nation."

USAID for Bangladesh

President Clinton observed that the United States in Bangladesh's number one export market and the US investors had "discovered Bangladesh's attractions."

About development cooperation, he said USAID is currently providing \$50 million to Bangladesh and other nations in South Asia to harness clean energy resources.

He said Bangladesh just became the first country to receive debt relief under US Tropical Forest Conservation Act.

"We cooperate on the environment, we cooperate on child labour providing an example to the rest of the region and the world by removing children from garment industry jobs and placing them in school."

Moreover, the President said, the two countries are working

Tk 6.5cr contrabands in 'diplomatic' consignment

A Customs surveillance team seized two containers of cigarettes, wristwatches and razor blades worth about Tk 6.52 crore from the Inland Container Depot at Kamalapur in the city yesterday.

The consignment was destined for the 'Attache' of the Iraqi Embassy in Dhaka with a document describing it as foodstuff. Customs officials said.

The containers were loaded with 869 master cartons of Benson and Hedges cigarette, 14 lakh pieces of Super Max shaving blades and 61,640 pieces of wristwatch for men and women.

The consignment was shipped from Dubai for the 'Attache' and it reached the container depot on October 6.

Tk 35cr ADB aided project Massive 'fraud' in supply of hospital equipment

A survey has detected massive irregularities in a Tk 35 crore ADB financed hospital equipment supply project.

The survey conducted recently detected that about 80 per cent of the equipment were not supplied as specified in the contract. There were discrepancies in model, country of origin and manufacturers. Even there was shortage of accessories and some equipment were missing.

Anaesthesia ventilator instead

of ICU ventilator and ordinary microscope instead of motorised zoom microscope were supplied. Operating microscope, EEG and EMG machines were supplied without accessories.

A top health ministry official termed this the 'biggest monetary fraud in a single project in the health sector so far'.

In June 1997, the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare floated an international tender for the ADB Assisted 2nd Health and

Family Welfare Project for supply of various medical equipment and accessories in four separate packages. These were for four medical college hospitals, eight district hospitals, five nursing training centres, two health technology institutes and a hospital for tribal people.

Contracts for Package -1 and Package -3 were awarded to an Italian Company, ESAOTE SPA, and its local agent was Natasa

Ministry postpones decision to replace DMCH director

The Health Ministry postponed yesterday its decision to replace the incumbent director of Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

Earlier on Tuesday, it issued an order, asking Director Brigadier Badrul Munir to hand over charge to Deputy Director Dr Syed Babar Hossain, a controversial figure.

The ministry had also issued a letter on October 2 stating that Dr Babar has been made director (current charge) of the hospital and would take over when Brig Munir, on deputation, goes back to army.

Dengue may linger till end of Nov

Experts fear that the renewed onslaught of dengue fever would continue till at least the end of November.

The disease, caused by mosquito bite, has re-emerged and may wreak havoc if not controlled right-away, warned entomologists.

But, Director of Communicable Disease Control Dr Kanak Ranjan Talukdar, begged to differ.

"It was predicted that the dengue prevalence would continue during the post-monsoon season," he said. "If you look at it from an epidemiological point of view, there is no need to worry."

At least six people have died of dengue haemorrhagic fever over the last 12 days in the capital city alone. So far, 78 people have died from the disease across the country while the number of afflicted stands over 4,000 now.

The government has been largely inactive, said an international consultant working in the country yesterday.

"The authorities have not given proper attention to the problem. Spraying of adulticide and insecticide is not enough."

SIBL Chairman 'removed' for 'harmful acts'

The Bangladesh Bank yesterday ordered Chairman of Social Investment Bank Limited (SIBL) M A Mannan to abstain from holding the post for his alleged involvement in 'activities harmful to the bank'.

This is the first time a bank chairman has been 'technically removed'. Former ICB Managing Director Glasuddin Ahmed has been made SIBL chairman.

In barring Mannan from holding the chairman's post, the central bank invoked a clause of the Bank Company Act which says that if the BB feels that any director or chairman of a bank is harmful for the institution, depositors or public interest, then he can be abstained from the post before serving him with a removal notice.

Mannan has been given seven days to defend himself as to why he should not be removed under clause 46 of the BCA.

In punishing the SIBL chairman, the BB brought five specific allegations against Mannan.

He was accused of obstructing BB's inspection of SIBL, challenging BB's authority, interfering into bank's administrative activities, involving

Armed men led by BCL leaders occupy house

A group of armed men led by local BCL leaders and activists occupied a one-storey house on Sir Salimullah Road in city's Mohammadpur area yesterday.

Witnesses said a gang of about 40 hoodlums led by one Shahabuddin and equipped with iron rods and sticks ransacked the house and looted valuables at about 11 a.m., adding that the inmates of the house were driven out.

One Amanullah and his sons Asad and Azmal are now in possession of the house, the sources said.

When a Daily Star correspondent went to the house at around 10 last night, he found a large number of youths in and around the house, which was partially demolished.

The street lights on adjacent roads were put out and a bearded man stood on the road beside a car in front of the house where about half a dozen youths were hanging around in candle light.

One of the youths identifying himself as Zakir Hossain said he is a relative of former Awami League Presidium member Mahiuddin Ahmed. Zakir said the house belonged to Shahabuddin. He also said that they did not beat up the evicted inmates.

When asked where the evicted family members had gone, he said that he did not know but heard that they had rented a house elsewhere.

The youths identified themselves as local BCL activists and leaders.

Unconfirmed sources said Tuhin, general secretary of BCL Mohammadpur thana unit, Jasim, another leader of the unit and their armed associates accompanied Shahabuddin during the attack.

Information memo finalised 40pc shares for partner, 9pc for Biman men

The consultants for Bangladesh Biman have finalised the Information Memorandum (IM) of the airline for its planned restructuring and commercialisation by off-loading 49 per cent shares.

Forty per cent of these shares would be offered to a Strategic Partner (SP) and nine per cent would be retained by Biman employees.

Biman's flight to Calcutta delayed by 5 hours

A Bangladesh Biman flight to Calcutta was delayed by more than five hours yesterday afternoon without any proper explanation, leaving passengers, many of them going for treatment, stranded at the departure lounge at ZIA.

A Customer Services official told this correspondent he had informed the passengers that the flight scheduled for 5.10 pm was rescheduled thrice due to aircraft consequential.

The last schedule for departure

between Biman officials and consultants from the Citibank of New York at Biman headquarters in the city, the IM was finalised yesterday, sources concerned said.

It is going to be placed before the Management Board of Biman on Sunday for approval.

The IM contains an overview of the national airline, its current status and assets. Biman has 14 aircraft, traffic rights in 24 destinations across the world and staff strength of 5500.

The plan for restructuring and commercialisation of Biman has been prepared by the Citibank consultants under a two million dollar World Bank aided project.

It envisaged completion of the process including bidding by potential SPs by January 31 next year.

But Biman sources said the process may take one month more. They expect to complete the process by February 28.

Tender is likely to be invited by the end of November and relevant documents are going to be put on the internet on Biman web site soon.

The sources attributed the delay to a number of factors. First

CAAB authorities wake up: 22 held from around ZIA

Police and several other agencies have launched a 'cleansing' operation in and around the Zia International Airport (ZIA) after a BBC reporter was mugged in the early hours of Tuesday with a police patrol van stationed hardly 20 yards away.

ZIA police Sub-inspector Mahfuzur Rahman said they have arrested 22 people on charges of loitering with intent in the last two days.

He said three people were arrested on charges of mugging and manhandling BBC Bangla Service reporter Moazzem Hossain. But all of them denied any involvement in the mugging.

One ZIA official said, "The thugs just keep a low profile when such police drives are underway."

Sources in the ZIA told the Daily Star that at least 15 different security agencies of the government are active to keep ZIA a crime-free zone. There is no way that these organised gangs could operate within the

security enclosure of the airport area without being detected by one or the other organisation.

A source said four well-organised gangs with 'solid communication network' are operating inside the ZIA just to extort, mug or steal from the passengers. These gangs have strong links with the people managing the parking lot and regulating various taxi services. Hundreds of migrant workers coming home from different Middle Eastern countries are the silent victims of these gangs.

Passengers who land at ZIA and travel to other districts are the most vulnerable ones. In most cases, these passengers do not report any untoward incidents to the authorities fearing further harassment, ZIA sources said.
