

Andy's ton fails to stop SL

SHARJAH, Oct. 22: Sanath Jayasuriya and Marvan Atapattu both hit half-centuries to guide Sri Lanka to a seven-wicket victory over Zimbabwe in the Champions Trophy on Saturday, reports Reuters.

The two put on a match-winning 157 for the second wicket. Jayasuriya making 78 off 84 balls, including eight fours and one six, while Atapattu made 90 off 138 deliveries.

Earlier Andy Flower had marked his 150th one-day international with a career-best 120 not out from 141 deliveries to help his side to 225 for four in their 50 overs.

Sri Lanka, however, went on the offensive from the start and rattled up 121 for one in 25 overs, compared to Zimbabwe's 75 for four at their half-way stage.

When Jayasuriya, who was dropped by Muleki Nkala on 40, eventually departed, Sri Lanka needed just 67 from 102 balls. Atapattu was run out by a throw from skipper Heath Streak.

Mahela Jayawardena and Kumar Sangakkara completed the formalities as Sri Lanka reached 229 for three with three overs to spare.

Zimbabwe's innings was built around an unbeaten fifth wicket stand of 153 in 155 balls between Flower and Dirk Viljoen.

Taking advantage of NSC's "contingent care-less" attitude, a multitude of commercial establishments have sprung up in every nook and corner.

The widespread expansion of large and small shops not only degraded the beauty of the BNS, but also created a suffocating atmosphere. Moreover, shop owners have captured the walkways. But what is disturbing is that spectators complain that the light can hardly pass through, let alone the flow of air.

Perhaps the BNS is the only internationally recognised venue, where business interest and sports live together, though not in perfect harmony.

Many feel that the renovation idea will only benefit a vested quarter rather than creating a healthy atmosphere. The NSC has already spent Taka 3.5 crore in the name of reconstruction for the last four years. But at the same time the sufferings of the spectators only mounted.

Now the question is whether the NSC will get their priorities straight - make it a proper stadium or continue to bow to the will of those profiteers?

Ganguly, who came in at number four, also fell for 18, caught down the leg-side by Andy Flower as he attempted to flick Friend.

The promising Yuvraj Singh hit 34 in a fourth-wicket stand of 54 with Dravid, including two massive sixes off left-arm spinner Grant Flower.

The threatening partnership ended when Yuvraj had his leg bail clipped by Friend, which had to be confirmed through television replays after New Zealand umpire Steve Dunne signalled a wide.

Robin Singh (22) was unlucky to be caught short of his ground at the non-striker's end as Dravid's straight drive was deflected on the wicket by bowler Viljoen.

Fan pours water on Sino spirit

SAIDA, Lebanon, Oct. 22: China star Fan Zhiyi has written off his team's chances of lifting the Asian Cup ahead of Monday's quarter-final clash with Qatar, reports AFP.

Crystal Palace defender Fan said although China should be good enough to reach the last four his team did not have the strength to earn the Asian crown.

"I think the semi-finals are as far as we will get... it is our glass ceiling," the 31-year-old said.

"Our preparation was not good enough. I turned up here and didn't even know some of the players and did not have enough time before the tournament started to get used to their style of play."

It is difficult to get a regular gameplan together because the coach is not good at communicating," he said, in a thinly veiled criticism of China coach Bora Milutinovic.

Although the hiring of Milutinovic has so far been greeted with enthusiasm by China's football authorities and media, several senior players have queried the affable Serb's management style.

Many of the China set-up were saddened by the departure of Englishman Bobby Houghton, sacked in January this year after failing to take the Chinese to the Olympics.

Despite Fan's criticism, Milutinovic is slowly starting to talk up his team's chances after earlier stating they would be

knocked out in the quarter-finals.

The Chinese have already sampled gulf football in a 0-0 draw with Kuwait last Thursday.

"Qatar are the reverse of Kuwait as they are very good in defence but lack a cutting thrust up front," Milutinovic told AFP.

"I think though that if my forwards play like they did against Indonesia then we will have no problems," he added.

Certainly he will be bolstered by the return of playmaker Li Tie and Fan both of whom were rested for the Kuwait match.

However, mystery surrounds the participation of Fan's central defensive partner Zhang Enlun - who is set to join him in the English First Division at the exotic climes of Stockport County.

Zhang started the campaign as captain but has played just 45 minutes since the opening 2-2 draw with South Korea.

Milutinovic, a regular feature at the last four World Cup finals where he has coached Costa Rica, Nigeria, USA and Mexico, said defending against Qatar playmaker Abdullhasser Obaidly's freekicks would be a priority.

The Qatari master blaster scored with a 35 yarder from way out on the left against Japan on Friday.

"We have to be prepared for this as he is their most likely source of goals," he said.

"I am consoled by the fact one of the Chinese side's strengths is their discipline and if we retain that then we won't give them any opportunities to

have a bash at our goal.

"However, I may start to become like Philippe Troussier (Japan's coach) as the game progresses and go weak at the knees if they are awarded one 60 yards out," he added.

The Qataris have suffered a lot up front with their star striker Mohammed Salem Al Enazi sitting it out on the bench because he was not match fit. Al Enazi has made just three appearances as a substitute for his Turkish side this year.

"I think we would have a much better chance if Mohammed was match fit because Mohammed Gholam is finding it tough labouring virtually alone up front," Qatar's Yugoslav coach Dzemal Hadzibegic said.

"However, I was pleased with the way we played against Japan as we managed to hide our greatest weakness which is pace at the back but that meant we couldn't mark him and we had to double up sometimes and that obviously leaves gaps," he added.

Hadzibegic, who in his first spell in Qatar revived their ailing 1998 World Cup campaign to such an extent they missed out on qualifying only in the last match, believes that a similar workmanlike performance will do the trick against the Chinese.

"China are a good side but they are not on the same level as Japan," he said.

Not encouraging news for the Chinese as if they prevail over the Qataris they will probably face Japan in the semi-finals - and bear out Fan's glass ceiling theory.

Glenn sets 500 goal

SYDNEY, Oct. 22 (Internet report): Australian pacer Glenn McGrath has revealed his career aim - 500 Test wickets, and he expects legendary West Indian batsman Brian Lara to contribute quite a few of them.

McGrath is currently standing on 288 wickets, 212 short of the 500 mark which is so far untouched, although West Indian Courtney Walsh is closing in on the figure.

Much of McGrath's excitement stems from his impending duel with Lara - world record-holder for the highest score in Test and first-class cricket - as the West Indies prepare for a daunting five-Test tour to Australia.

"I've seen the way Lara changes his game to face me, which is a bit of a buzz," McGrath said. "I've got him out in Tests 10 times, so I'm looking to add to that this series."

McGrath's next milestone is the 300-mark, although the 30-year-old is looking much further down the track. "My ultimate goal is 500 Test wickets,"

McGrath said. "The next goal for me is to hit the 300 mark, but if I can stay healthy for the next three to four years, I definitely think it is do-able."

McGrath's enthusiasm and confidence have risen measurably since last season, due exclusively to a highly successful county stint with Worcestershire.

That experience, McGrath says, has been useful in several ways. Firstly, he watched the touring West Indian side during their ill-fated tour of England last season. And the opportunity to bowl during the off-season has improved McGrath's fitness to unparalleled levels.

"I've never entered a season feeling in this kind of shape," he said. "The county experience was great. It gave me a chance to see a bit of the Windies. From what I was able to see their batsmen really didn't perform, and a lot will be resting on the shoulders of Lara and Adams. That suits me."

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
