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PM to visit 3 countries in next 3 weeks

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is scheduled to visit three foreign countries Kuwait, Qatar and Germany in the next three weeks.

Hasina's three-day official tour of Kuwait at the invitation of its Amir begins October 30.

In Kuwait, the prime minister's official talks with the Amir is likely to focus on taking an increased number of Bangladeshi workers to that country. Nearly two lakh Bangladeshis are working in the Gulf state. A MOU on manpower export is likely to be signed during the visit. Issues related to trade and investment, setting up of agro-based industry, frozen food and tourism will also be discussed.

The Prime Minister is likely to address the Bangladeshi soldiers engaged in the UN Peace Keeping Operations in Kuwait.

Sheikh Hasina will go to Qatar on November 11 and stay there for three days to attend the Summit of the Organisation of Islamic Conference (OIC). The OIC conference likely to be attended by a large number of heads of state or government of the 55-member organisation and is expected to deliberate on the plight of the Palestinians following the recent outbreak of violence there.

The OIC conference will also consider the resolutions passed by the ICFM foreign ministers in Kuala Lumpur recently.

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New voter list faulty: BNP

BNP Secretary General Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan has expressed surprise at the 'huge increase' in the number of voters and said the new voter list is faulty.

In a statement yesterday, he said increase of voters by 1,88,31,471 in the last five years, as shown in the new voter list, is 'completely unrealistic and undoubtedly faulty.'

Giving statistics, Bhuiyan said, in 1995, the number of voters in the country was 5,59,92,304, which was 47 per cent of the total population.

He said in June 1996, the number was 5,57,16,935. In the updated voter list announced on October 20, 1998, the number was 5,99,02,250. This showed that the number increased by 39,09,866 in three years with an average increase of about 13,000 per year.

In 1998 the country's population was estimated at 12,60 crore. See page 11 col 7

12 killed: Tidal surge in coasts

At least 12 people were killed, several thousand injured and thousands of thatched houses were blown away in the storm that swept the country yesterday, inundating low-lying areas along the coastal belt.

Two fishermen were believed to have been drowned after they fell from their fishing trawler in choppy waters of the Bay of Bengal off the Cox's Bazar coast.

Over 100 fishermen are reported missing along with 20 fishing trawlers as they failed to return to their shelters in Barisal coast, according to reports from our correspondents.

Brewing off a deep depression in the Bay of Bengal, the storm, packing winds up to 100 km per hour, dumped heavy rains across the country including the capital, Meteorological Department said.

Three persons were killed in the city. One of them died in a roof collapse, one under an uprooted tree and the other from electrocution.

Shumi, 14, died when the roof of a dilapidated house collapsed at Lalbagh, Abul Bashar, 12, was crushed under a fallen tree in central Dhaka and Hejal, 20, was electrocuted when he came in contact with a snapped electric wire in Mirpur.

Life was paralysed in the city which had been experiencing gusty winds accompanied by heavy rains since Friday night.

Khushi Ghose, 55, was killed in Shariatpur in southern Bangladesh. Five people were killed in Patuakhali district. Of them, Shafiq, 10, was killed when a tree fell on him and four others, identified as Sagar, 3, Jainal, 65, Hazera Begum, 55 and Sabuj, 10, were killed in roof collapse.

A mother Sipra Rani, 38, her son Sukanta, 10, and daughter Shukla, 4, were killed when a date tree fell on their straw hut at village Chandrahar in Gournadi in southern Barisal district.

The southwestern Sundarbans, world's biggest surviving mangrove forest, now World Heritage Site declared by UNESCO, bore the brunt of the storm packing winds up to 100 km per hour.

Our Satkhira correspondent reports: The flood hit southwestern Satkhira district where thousands are still living in makeshift camps and shelters suffered another blow as tidal surge up to 2-3 feet above the normal astronomical tide added to the water logging problem.

Chunks of embankments in southwestern Khulna also collapsed, flooding nine villages.

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Waterlogging, power failure paralyse life in city

Three killed, girl hurt during storm

Almost all the major thoroughfares of the capital city yesterday went under water due to clogged or poor drainage system and remained waterlogged for the better part of the day paralysing civic activities.

During the storm frequent and lengthy power disruption added to the miseries of the people.

Three people died in separate incidents while a six-year-old girl was left critically wounded. Hospital and police sources identified the dead as Sumi, 14, daughter of Mohammad Habib, Hejal, 20, son of Bachchu Mia and Abul Bashar, son of Abbas Ali.

Abul Bashar received critical

injuries in his head when a branch of a tree fell on him at Meghdubi in Fulbaria area. He was rushed to DMCH where he succumbed to his injuries at about 3 pm.

Meanwhile, the rainstorm kept most of the city residents indoors. Number of people and vehicles on the road was far less than normal, even in weekend.

Strong wind uprooted a large number of trees while leaving broken branches scattered all over. The maximum speed of wind was 56-kilometre metre per hour in the city at 9 am.

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Sumi's six-year-old sister was admitted to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) with critical injuries in her head.

According to sources the tragic incident occurred when Habib along with his family members was sleeping inside a room of his makeshift brick-house at about 5 am yesterday. During heavy shower and strong wind one of the brick walls of Habib's house collapsed on his two girls. Sumi died on the spot.

Hejal was electrocuted when he came in contact with a snapped electric wire at his Lalukuthi residence in the city's Mirpur area at about 10:15 am.

The army said there was heavy cross-border firing in some forward posts in the Jammu region following the incident.

Major Sanjay Kapoor said between ten and 12 Pakistani soldiers died in the frontier outpost of Nowshera, in Rumbidhara village, some 150 kilometres north-west of Jammu, in the early Saturday morning.

Pakistani troops opened indiscriminate fire in the morning," he said. "We fired back and repulsed them but we think between 10 to 12 of their men have died."

"There are no casualties on our side but one soldier is seriously injured," he said.

Major General P P S Bindra told AFP the Pakistani army had collected the bodies of the dead soldiers.

"We have seen Pakistani troops collecting the dead bodies of their men. We have collected the machine guns and semi-automatic weapons used by the Pakistani soldiers during the early morning raid," said Bindra.

"More security troops have been deployed in the Nowshera area to make sure there are no further infiltration bids," he added.

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Major Shamsul Alam alias Shamsu has named former police superintendent of Khulna Ataul Gani Badsha as one his beneficiaries.

Meanwhile, an AP report filed from Muzaffarabad, said: Indian soldiers fired artillery shells from across the disputed border into Pakistani Kashmir, killing at least five villagers and wounding four others, police said today.

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Piracy & ship movement threaten Shell's operation, gas pipeline

Careless anchoring and movement of ships as well as rising armed piracy are threatening the off-shore Sangu gas pipeline and operation of Shell Oil in the area, sources said.

The 45 km Sangu pipeline that supplies over 130 million cubic feet of gas per day (mmfd) to the Chittagong gas station for processing has been threatened five times so far by carelessness and anchoring of ships.

"We asked the port authorities to hoist red flags in the path, maintaining a distance of half a kilometre from the pipeline. But so far there has been no action," said a high official of Shell.

Few weeks ago, Shell's drilling crew at Sandwip gas well came across a drifting ship carrying 9 mutilated bodies. "It appeared that pirates killed them and took away everything including the engine of the ship," said the official. "The incident demoralised our staff."

Shell lodged complaints to different government authorities several times regarding lack of security and also requested the Chittagong

Port Authority to mark the Sangu pipeline with red flags, but to no effect, the sources said.

The company recently deployed armed Ansars in two of its tugboats to boost the morale of its staffs.


Sources in Shell said that the Sangu pipeline was recently hit by the anchor of a ship that was being towed as its engine was malfunctioning. Gas supply through the pipeline was stopped immediately to avoid risks.

"We asked the port authorities to hoist red flags in the path, maintaining a distance of half a kilometre from the pipeline. But so far there has been no action," said a high official of Shell.

Increasing number of foreign ships are now coming under attack by pirates, the sources said. The Daily Star.

The Chittagong Port has been identified by the International Maritime Bureau (IMB) as the second most dangerous port due to piracy.

According to IMB, the most dangerous port in the world is the Philippines. Shell had faced serious security problems in Bangladesh in late 80s when two of its executives were kidnapped from Chittagong Hill Tracts.



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
