

CBI to report on Monday

NEW DELHI, Oct 28: The CBI will submit its interim report on match-fixing in cricket, which names five Indian players, and a cricket official, to the government on Monday, agency sources said here yesterday, reports PTI.

The final go-ahead to the submission to the report was given by CBI director RK Raghavan before he left for Athens (Greece) to attend the 69th Interpol conference, they said.

The 150-page report is to name five Indian players and one cricket official as beneficiaries of match-fixing.
