A Pakistani apple and date show will be held on October 30-31 at Hotel Sonargaon to display the varieties of the fruits grown in that country. reports UNB.


The Export Promotion Bureau of Pakistan is organising the exhibition, second of its kind here, in collaboration with the High Commission for Pakistan in Bangladesh.

To further strengthen the tax evasion system, NBR has also approved a proposal to have four new commissioners in the country in addition to the existing nine offices.

These bodies - Bond Commissioner, Customs Valuation Department Commissioner, Sylhet and Benapole Commissionerates - are expected to start functioning shortly, a high NBR official said, adding that the United Nations Conference for Trade

and Development (UNCTAD) is helping in the automation works.

An UNCTAD expert will be in Dhaka next week to conduct a survey and propose a system for the link-up.

Meanwhile, NBR sources said the necessary administrative order has been issued to create the posts of the four commissioners. Four additional commissioners will be promoted to the new posts.

The bond commissioner in Dhaka will control the bonds of all export-oriented industries.

The Customs Valuation Department will have a computerised database of international commodity prices, which will help customs officials assess the actual price of imported goods by comparing the bills of entry with database prices.

An NBR official working with a project to modernise and reconstitute the customs department said that necessary amendments would also be made to the rules and regulations of the Customs Act.

With a view to curbing tax evasion and corruption in the customs department, the National Board of Revenue (NBR) has taken up a project to link up customs houses through an online networking system.

Sources said that Chittagong and Dhaka Customs houses, Kamalapur Inland Container Depot (ICD) and Mongla and Benapole ports will initially be hooked onto the network within the next 15 months, a move which is expected to reduce paper works and unnecessary



## Palestinians show signs of economic frustration

JERUSALEM, Oct 29: Palestinians started to show signs of economic frustration in their new uprising against Israel, with more than 100,000 people unable to attend their jobs and

Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat saying he was not seeking economic division between his future state and Israel, reports AP.

Clashes persisted in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip on Saturday. Israeli troops fought Arab stone throwers with rubber-coated bullets and tear gas at chronic trouble spots, leaving more than 50 Palestinians injured.

Though the confrontations included at least a dozen shooting attacks on Israeli soldiers and a homemade bomb

thrown at a border police patrol, no one was killed by day's end, a rare occurrence since violence first erupted a month ago.

The Israeli military has predicted that the unrest could go on for months. Ibrahim Hamwidi, a young Palestinian watching the clashes in the restive West Bank town of Ramallah, agreed that Palestinian anger was still running high.

But, he said, the uprising was taking a heavy economic toll on the Palestinians, many of whom haven't been able to travel to jobs in Israel. "People want to go back to work, they're running out of money," Hamwidi added in reference to the more than 100,000 Palestinians

working in Israel.

Often, such workers provide the only source of income for large families and are more concerned about their future than the "shabab" or youths and younger men mainly involved in the clashes. However, any restraining role they may play is highly doubtful.

Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat appeared to echo these concerns as he called for a political separation from Israel and an independent state on all land Israel captured in the 1967 Middle East war. But Arafat insisted in an interview with the Egyptian paper Al-Ahram that he would reject any geographic or economic division.

## Euro woes drag down most Asian units

HONG KONG, Oct 29: Concerns over the fluctuating euro dragged down most regional currencies over the week, with domestic problems providing further jitters in Southeast Asia.

A lot of eyes were also on the plummeting peso as the political turmoil in the Philippines surrounding President Joseph Estrada catapults the currency to new lows.

Singapore Dollar: The US dollar was at 1.754 Singapore dollars in late trade here Friday from 1.751 Singapore dollars a week ago.

Hong Kong Dollar: The dollar traded slightly lower to 7.7999-7.7980 to the greenback compared with the previous week's 7.7966-7.7976.

Indonesia Rupiah: The Indonesian rupiah weakened over the week to close at 9.065 to the dollar on Friday as compared to last week's close of 8.888 to the greenback.

Traders said the currency was affected by the slide of the Philippine peso and the strain in relations between Jakarta and Washington.

Philippine Peso: The Philip-

pine currency closed 51.08 pesos to the dollar on Friday from 48.74 pesos to the dollar on October 20.

The currency fell to a record low of 51.40 to the dollar on October 27 before recovering slightly before closing.

The local currency has been hit hard by a raging scandal over allegations that Philippine President Joseph Estrada received huge payoffs from operators of illegal gambling racketeers.

South Korean Won: The won weakened from 1,129.10 won per dollar a week earlier to 1,135.9 won to the greenback Friday as Asian currencies weakened and concerns over the Hyundai Group's construction unit increased.
