ADB-funded crop diversification project a boon for NW region

Some 160,000 farmers in northwest Bangladesh are expected to raise their income through a Crop Diversification Project for which the Asian Development Bank (ADB) Tuesday approved a loan of US \$46.3 million, reports UNB.

The project will help them cultivate higher-value cash crops such as fruits and vegetables to improve their income and nutrition.

Most farmers in this area are rice growers. Some are beginning to grow tubers and hybrid maize and we want to show them how to cultivate different crops, including fruits. vegetables and spices, all of which have a greater value of production per unit area, says

ADB economist Pratima Daval. The project will cover 16 districts in the northwest region and will support interested farmers with new technology. training and extension, credit, market and price information. Project support will also be provided for farmer mobilisation, improve market infrastructure, applied research and project management.

Dell to boost Business in Bangladesh

Dell, world's leading direct computer systems company. aims to boost its business in Bangladesh, a top official of the company said yesterday.

"We are focusing on Bangladesh's corporate bodies like banks. financial institutions and telecom service providers to sell our whole range of products," Kelvin Lee, Director of Sales, Developing Markets Group, told reporters at a press conference held in the city vesterday.

A premier supplier of technology for Internet infrastructure. Dell is growing rapidly all over the world with a leading position in the Asia-Pacific region, he claimed.

"Strong sales to large corporate customers upped Dell's quarterly revenue by 39 per cent in the Asia-Pacific markets including Japan," Lee said.

The company's revenue for the last four quarters ending October 27, 2000 totalled USS30 billion, he said.

Dell computer sales grew by about 300 per cent in Bangladesh in the last fiscal year, said Shahudul Haque. Managing Director of Syscom Information Systems Limited, the local authorised dealer of Dell.

He said Dell sold products worth US\$1.2 million in Bangladesh in 1998-1999, which was only US\$0.3 million in 1992.

DHL calls for collaboration with customs authorities

HONG KONG, Nov 22: DHL Worldwide Express calls for collaboration with the customs authorities to expedite customs clearance and to facilitate trade in the region and beyond, says a press release.

At the Regional Contact Points Meeting of the World Customs Organisation (WCO) held in the Hong Kong earlier, DHL urged the air express industry to work closely with the customs authorities to streamline control and combat smug-

"Our business is built upon speed, our customers rightfully expect the latest possible pickup cut-off times and the earliest possible deliveries. As the air express industry sets to skyrocket thanks to the renewed focus on just-in-time business practices and booming eCommerce. a close collaboration with the customs authorities to streamline the pipeline and at the same time suppress smuggling has become imperative. said Charles Longely, Chief Executive Officer for DHL Asia-Pacific/Middle East.

DHL has a long history of working hand in hand with customs authorities to expedite trade and combat smuggling. It was the first in the industry to establish EDI (electronic data interchange) linkage with customs authorities for fast and accurate clearance. It has recently pioneered an imaging system which is another industry first. Under the system. customs authorities are able to view digitised images of shipment documentation such as airway bills, proforma invoices and packing lists which are stored at DHL's computer system, the initiative dramatically speeds up clearance at destination gateways, well before the shipments physically leave the origin.
