207 political activists killed in 6 months

Some 207 political activists were killed and 1182 injured in 402 incidents across the country during the first six months of this year, reports UNB.

This was revealed in a report of Bangladesh Rehabilitation Centre for Trauma Victims (BRCT) released at a press conference

Reading out a written statement, General Secretary of BRCT Akram Hossain Chowdhury said the figures were based on reports published in the press during January-June.

The report said that some 484 people were tortured in 165 incidents by law enforcers of whom 44 died.

Of them 34 died in police custody, three by BDR personnel, one by Army, two by Ansar and four by others.

Law enforcing and security personnel and terrorists raped some 693 women in the last 11 months. Of them, 34 fell victims to law enforcing and security personnel and the rest by terrorists and musclemen.

Clash over khas land: 2 killed, 100 hurt in Sirajganj

SIRAJGANJ, Dec 9: Two persons were killed and over 100 injured in a clash over possession of a khas land at village Shahagipara in Kazipur Upazila of the district today.

Police and witnesses said, the clash erupted when a group of villagers from Shahagipara went to occupy the land at Dakkhinmath at about 9 am. They were resisted by the villagers of Bhanudanga. Both sides locked in fierce clash and used arms during the clash that lasted more than three hours.

The dead were identified as Khorshed Ali, 45, and Rezaul Karim, 47, of Bhanudanga village. They were hit by sharp weapons and died on the spot.



Sharif pardoned in exchange for exile

ISLAMABAD, Dec 9: Pakistan's jailed former Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif has made a deal with the military government granting him a pardon in exchange for at least 10 years' exile, senior sources in his party said today, reports Reuters.

A government spokesman said Sharif, now serving a life sentence in the Attock military fortress, had asked permission to seek medical attention abroad. The spokesman said he did not know if a pardon was under consideration.

Sharif's wife Kulsoom, who has taken over directing the Pakistan Muslim League in his absence, said Saudi officials had carried out extended negotiations on the jailed leader's future but she did not

know the outcome. "If the government offers anything like that I will jump at it," she said

of the reported terms before heading off to visit Sharif in prison. But she said they would want to go into exile only long enough for his health to recover and added it was not clear how long the current military regime would last.

Party sources said Sharif would leave for Saudi Arabia as early as Sunday after receiving a presidential pardon for the crimes for which See page 11 col 4

CHITTAGONG, Dec 9: Construction work of MA Hannan International Airport here has been completed at a cost of Tk 541 crore, reports UNB.


Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is expected to inaugurate the airport next month.
