

Brazilian firm joins race to sell AWACS plane to India

NEW DELHI, Dec 10: A Brazilian aircraft manufacturer has joined the race to sell an Airborne Warning and Control System (AWACS) plane to India, officials said today, reports AFP.

Officials from Brazil's Embraer company rejected speculation that the firm was negotiating with Islamabad for the sale of similar military hardware to the Pakistani armed forces.

"On the contrary, we are fully concentrated and focused on supporting Indian aviation and armed forces," Embraer Walter Norit told reporters.

Sources said the company was campaigning to sell its EMB-145 remote-sensing aircraft, which is capable of 360-degree detection and tracking of air and sea targets, to the Indian Air Force.

The Brazilian firm argues the EMB-145 compares favourably with Israel's Phalcon AWACS, which is also in the race in India.

Russia, India's closest political ally and which accounts for 70 percent of the military hardware in New Delhi's inventory, also hopes to fit India's airforce with an AWACS.

India began scouting around for AWACS for its air force, the world's fourth largest, after a locally-built prototype crashed in January 1999.

Israeli defence ministry's director general Amos Yaron visited India in September to try and promote several arms deals, including the sale of the Phalcon.

India needs at least two AWACS in the near future for its 1,200-aircraft air force.

64 immigrants detained in Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR, Dec 10: Malaysian authorities have detained 64 illegal immigrants from Myanmar who were being smuggled into the country to work as labourers, a report said today, reports AFP.

Officers from the anti-smuggling unit made the catch after following a car along the Malaysian border with Thailand in the northern state of Kedah, the New Sunday Times said.

A long queue of men was seen boarding a lorry as the car approached it, the report said. The officers stopped the lorry after following it for a short distance and found 63 men packed into the back and one other next to the driver, the newspaper added.

A senior anti-smuggling unit official Jamaluddin Hussin was quoted as saying that this was the largest group of illegal to be detained this year.

None of the 64 had valid travel documents, he said, adding that one of the men was believed to be an agent from Myanmar with links to local syndicates.

The immigrants, aged between 13 and 35, were believed to be smuggled into the country to work as construction labourers, the newspaper said.

Kashmir leaders ask India to decide on Pakistan visit

NEW DELHI, India, Dec 10: Kashmir's main alliance of separatist parties urged Indian leaders today to decide on their request to visit Pakistan to hold peace talks on the disputed Himalayan region, reports AFP.

Kashmir's All-Party Hurriyat Conference (APHC) also hinted it would try and dissuade Kashmiri separatist groups from attacking Indian forces and instead permit the APHC umbrella forum to negotiate with New Delhi.

APHC Chairman Abdul Gani Bhat said: "Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee has said that the government would consider sending us to Pakistan."

"Let him decide, we are not going to ask for favours," Bhat said here.

Indian PM Vajpayee said Thursday that India was willing to consider any request from Kashmir's main alliance of separatist parties to visit Pakistan.

Pakistan welcomed Vajpayee's statement Friday and said Islamabad was prepared to be flexible on the 'details' of its proposal for a three-way dialogue between Kashmiri leaders, India and Pakistan.

India has, however, rejected any possibility of "so-called tripartite talks," with Vajpayee's comments indicating an informal, indirect dialogue between the three parties might be considered.

The offer to the Hurriyat was the latest in several recent initiatives taken by India and Pakistan over Kashmir.

Vajpayee on November 27 ordered a ceasefire during the holy Islamic month of Ramadan in Kashmir. Pakistan then promised "maximum restraint" on the border and said it would talk to the Hurriyat to resolve the Kashmir dispute.

APHC chief Bhat said: "We understand the

times ahead may be harder and going forward may be tougher but then considering the situation, there is no alternative available to any of us other than a purposeful and substantive dialogue."

Bhat, who has been camping out in the Indian capital for the past seven days, said the Hurriyat's objectives were similar to those of the militants -- to secure self-rule for the Kashmiri people.

"To be very honest, the goal of Hurriyat and the militants is the same. While we fight with argument, they fight with gun," he told reporters.

"This is to say that there has to be an interaction between the militants and the politicians and this is the rationale behind our proposal to talk to the boys in that part of Kashmir (administered by Pakistan)," Bhat said.

122 countries agree on treaty to ban 'dirty dozen'

JOHANNESBURG, Dec 10: Delegates from 122 countries reached agreement in Johannesburg today on a convention to ban or severely restrict 12 of the world's most toxic chemicals, reports AFP.

The "dirty dozen" persistent organic pollutants (POPs) range from industrial chemicals to insecticides.

They are linked to birth defects, cancer, and developmental problems in children, and spread throughout the world, entering the food chain.

"This new treaty will protect present and future generations from the cancers, birth defects and other tragedies caused by POPs," said conference chairman John Bucci of Canada in a statement announcing the agreement.

Klaus Toepfer, executive director of the UN Environment Programme (UNEP), commented: "This is a sound and effective treaty that can be updated and expanded over the coming decades to maintain the best possible protection against POPs."

The environmental organisation Greenpeace welcomed the agreement, commenting in a statement: "This agreement sends a clear message to industries that they must reform and stop using our Earth as a testing ground for their dangerous pollutants."

The agreement by the close to 600 delegates came around 7:30 a.m. (11:30 BST) after they had met through the night.

It marked the end of five rounds of negotiations over two-and-a-half years.

The convention will be signed in Stockholm on May 22-23 and become a legally binding treaty once it has been ratified by 50 countries, a process that Bucci said would take four or five years.

The convention makes provision for adding chemicals to the POPs list in future.

It makes an exemption for DDT in the meantime to allow its use in

controlling malaria, a disease that kills more than a million people a year.

It also provides exemptions -- with deadlines -- for specific countries to phase out various POPs.

Governments may maintain until 2025, in a way which prevents leaks, existing electrical transformers and other equipment in which polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) are used. They are no longer produced, but hundreds of thousands of tonnes of PCBs are still in use in such equipment.

Control mechanisms in the convention cover the production, import, export, disposal and use of POPs.

"Governments are to promote the best available technologies and practices for replacing existing POPs while preventing the development of new POPs," UNEP said.

"They will draw up national legislation and develop action plans for carrying out their commitments."

Funding to allow developing countries to give up their reliance on POPs will come from a new "mechanism" -- a victory for the Third World, which had argued against the use of the existing Global Environmental Facility because it has failed to disburse all the money allocated. The text calls for regulation of such chemicals with the aim of preventing their production or use.

The United States and a number of other industrialised countries had argued for the precautionary principle to be restricted to the introductory preamble, where it would have had less force.

The 12 POPs comprise eight pesticides (lindrin, chlordane, DDT, dieldrin, endrin, heptachlor, mirex and toxaphene), two industrial chemicals (PCBs and hexachlorobenzene, which is also a pesticide) and two unwanted by-products of combustion and industrial processes (dioxins and furans).

Assam admin asks people to fight militants with 'sticks and stones'

GUWAHATI, India, Dec 10: The beleaguered administration of the Indian state of Assam today urged people to use "sticks and stones" to fight militants who have killed over 100 people here since October, reports AFP.

Assam Governor S. K. Sinha said the Hindi-speaking business community, who bore the brunt of the ongoing massacres, have been told to form "resistance groups" to thwart such attacks.

"Protect yourself by organising 10 to 12 youths armed with sticks, javelins, and stones."

"These can be used as missiles to scare away militants," the governor, a former Indian army general, told journalists in the far-eastern state's capital of

Guwahati.

"This move can be a major deterrent against rebel attacks and prove to be very effective."

The violence has sparked panic within the Marwari business community from the northern Indian state of Rajasthan and people from the eastern state of Bihar, who have been the main targets of the recent murderous campaign.

Both communities control the bulk of trade and commerce in oil and timber-rich Assam, where their presence is long established.

The Assam governor said people's participation was necessary to end the bloodletting.

"What we need is the support of

the people to come forward and fight the terror unleashed by the militants," Sinha said.

"Already there has been a massive public outcry over the killings and with people taking to the streets to protest such massacres."

Governor Sinha said unarmed villagers had "lynched" or caught 43 suspected militants in the past three years in separate incidents.

"That is in itself an indication that people are revolting against militancy," the governor said, adding that the state government was also setting up "Village Defence Parties" across Assam.

The governor's prescription came a day after India put federal troops on maximum alert in

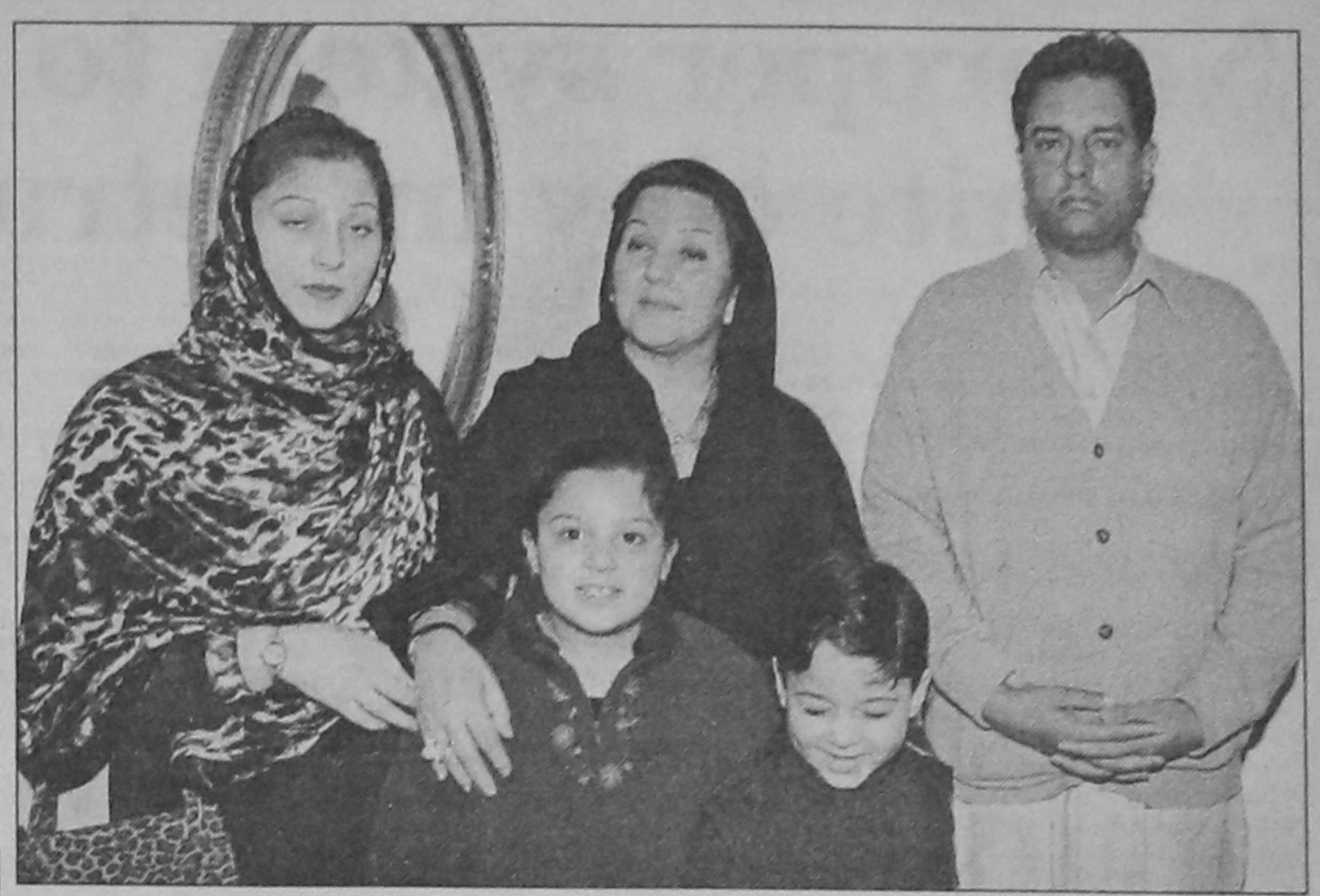
Assam and in the adjoining state of Arunachal Pradesh on Saturday to prevent more massacres.

Army, police and paramilitary soldiers in the two states have already launched a crackdown.

More than 10,000 people have died in separatist-linked violence in Assam during the last decade.

Besides being rich in resources, Assam is India's tea-producing heartland and accounts for 55 percent of the country's annual production of 806 million kilograms.

Separate homeland drives spearheaded by several militant outfits here have forced many traditional tea-growers to abandon businesses and shift to other states.

Grenade attack on governor's home in Aceh

BANDA ACEH, Indonesia, Dec 10: Suspected separatist rebels in the Indonesian province of Aceh have launched a grenade attack on the governor's home, as elsewhere sporadic violence claimed two lives, reports AFP.

A grenade exploded outside the governor's official residence as visiting Forestry Minister Nurmahmudi Ismail and other guests were inside, Aceh police chief Superintendent Sayed Husaini said Sunday.

No one was injured in the attack Saturday evening. But security guards firing at a van that carried the attackers injured two other men in a passing car, Husaini said.

"Everyone, including the minister, who were in the residence's main hall dropped to the floor when the blast occurred," a witness in the room said.

The attack occurred at the residence of the governor, who was in the room at the time of the blast.

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Estrada to lift all death sentences

BACOLOD, Philippines, Dec 10: Philippine President Joseph Estrada today announced he would commute to life imprisonment all death sentences in this predominantly Roman Catholic country, reports AFP.

"I will order tomorrow all those sentenced to death commuted to life imprisonment on the occasion of the (Roman Catholic church's) Jubilee year," Estrada said after attending mass in this central Philippine city.

The church has been a vocal critic of the death penalty in the Philippines.

The surprise announcement, which came in the middle of Estrada's corruption trial in the Senate, came after a homily by Bacolod Bishop emeritus Antonio Fortich calling for the government to improve the lives of prisoners.

Officials travelling with the president were apparently caught off guard and could not give more details on Estrada's announcement, which came as the world celebrated Human Rights Day.

The Philippines in 1999 broke a 23-year moratorium on executions when it put to death rapist Leo Echegaray by lethal injection.

Six others subsequently followed, but Estrada ordered a moratorium in March after intense lobbying from the influential Catholic church.

Human rights lawyer Theodore Te, whose legal battle to save Echegaray failed, said Estrada's announcement could "give some degree of momentum to the lobby against capital punishment."

"It remains to be seen whether he will push through with that and if he confirms it in writing tomorrow," Te told AFP. "If that announcement is carried tomorrow then that is a very fitting human rights gift."

There are currently more than 1,300 convicts on death row in the Philippines, many of whose cases still have to be affirmed by the Supreme Court, which under the law automatically reviews each case.

HONG KONG, Dec 10: A retired Indian photographer who has grown his fingernails for almost half a century is finally calling it quits and will auction them off to the highest bidder, reports Reuters.

Shridhar Chhillal from Pune, near Bombay, has been a permanent fixture in the Guinness Book of World Records for the last 20 years as the man with the world's longest nails.

Each one measuring over one metre, they sprout like snakes from a misshapen left hand, which is permanently disfigured from the extra weight that Chhillal, now 64, has been carrying around.

Unsheathing them recently for Reuters from what looks like an oversized protective golf club case, Chhillal's five precious appendages hardly resemble fingernails upon close examination.

Tiger cub undergoes heart surgery

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Dec 10: A 5-month-old tiger cub is recovering in intensive care after undergoing heart bypass surgery to correct a congenital heart defect, the first time the operation has been performed on a tiger, reports AP.

Karma, the Bengal tiger cub, was on a ventilator at Texas A&M University's Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital after a veterinary surgeon and a heart surgeon conducted the five-hour operation on Saturday.

"This is the first time such a procedure has been performed on a tiger and the next 48 hours are crucial," said Dr Terry Fossum, chief of surgery at the College of Veterinary Medicine, who performed the surgery along with Dr Charles D Fraser Jr, chief of cardiovascular surgery at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.
