# PM calls on President

# HC sitting at night evokes mixed reaction

The sitting of a Division Bench of the High Court late Tuesday night granting anticipatory bail to Editor of the Ingilab AMM Bahauddin on sedition charges has evoked mixed reaction from lawyers and others.

Eminent lawyer Barrister Syed Ishtiaque Ahmed said it was not desirable that the Judiciary and the Executive would confront each other.

'When a problem has arisen over an issue where a judge has been accused on a grave matter, the anticipatory bail issue has put us in an untenable situation.

The sensitivity of the criminal charges is such that it is being discussed everywhere", he told a function in the city on Thursday, welcoming new lawyers.

There had been instances of judges and the Chief Justice giving orders from their residences in cases in which the plaintiff could suffer heavily because of ill-motivated executive order. But I have no knowledge about an order by the High Court at late night for anticipatory bail. The matter was discussed in parliament. The Executive and the Judiciary are again nearing a confrontation course. Can't we avoid it? If so, let us all become active about our own responsibility", he added.

A gang shot dead a businessman near his house at East Monipur in Mirpur area of the city yesterday.



### dishonouring nat'l anthem in JS Wednesday By Staff Correspondent

The government is cautiously proceeding with the issue of dishonouring of the national anthem by the daily Inqilab and the House set a schedule for discussion on the issue tentatively on Wednesday.

An official at the Jatiya Sangsad Secretariat said parliament would move the motion for a detailed discussion in the House and is likely to adopt a resolution

on the issue on the same day. Following the hasty midnight sitting of a High Court Bench to grant bail to AMM Bahauddin. the editor and publisher of the daily Inqilab, which published a parody of the national anthem in its October 20 issue, the parliament blasted the judiciary and decided to hold a general discussion in this regard.

Bahauddin and three others of the daily were charged with sedition in connection with the publication of the parody of the national anthem.

The Leader of the House and other members, both from opposition and treasury benches, asked for the discussion and a statement from the law minister.

# 'Mohiuddin dragged Bangabandhu out & Noor, Huda fired on him'

Showing individual complicity in the killing of per evidence, was carrying a wireless set and he took Bangabandhu, the chief prosecution counsel yesterday made his comment on evidences against four of the convicted army officers saying they were directly involved in the August 15 carnage, reports

Advocate Serajul Huq, on the 56th day yesterday of death reference and appeal hearings in the Bangabandhu Murder Case, said Maj (retd) Mohiuddin (Lancer) was the first person to enter Bangabandhu's residence.

And as per plan, he dragged out Bangabandhu from his room. Maj Noor Chowdhury and Maj Bazlul Huda fired on him as Bangabandhu was brought to the staircase.

The third entry into Bangabandhu's house was made by Major Aziz Pasha and Risaldar Moslemuddin. "Taking the stengun from Moslemuddin, Major Pasha killed the inmates in a room, including Begum Mujib and two daughtersin-law Sultana Kamal and Rosy Jamal," the lawyer said.

At this stage, the court wanted to know why Pasha was disarmed while going for an operation. The government pleader submitted that Pasha, as

# AL factions clash in Barisal: 30 injured

BARISAL, Nov 19: At least 30 people were injured, eight of them by bullets in a gunfight between two factions of ruling Awami League at Muladi thana headquarters of the district in the early hours today.

Police and witnesses said that activists of a faction led by Yousuf Engineer and Malek Rari, members of the convening committee of AL Muladi thana unit attacked and ransacked eight houses of their rival faction led by Bhulu doctor, convenor of the committee at about 5:30 am.

They used firearms and lethal weapons during the attack. Later, the activists belonging to Bhulu launched a counter attack, resulting in fierce gunfight between the two factions.

Both factions exchanged 60 to 70 gunshots and exploded bombs during the clash that continued for about two hours.
