Petrobangla has asked Unocal to submit insurance documents related to the Magurchhara blowout as a follow-up to the US company's claim that it has paid some 332 crore taka to different aggrieved parties as compensation.

Unocal has not yet responded to the Petrobangla directive to submit the compensation documents, sources said.

Following the Magurchhara blowout in June 14, 1997, Occidental and later Unocal claimed insurance money to the insurer who reportedly paid an undisclosed amount of money. Unocal used the money to bear the expenses for the remedial measures to stop the blowout as well as to pay to parties affected as compensation.

Nevertheless, Unocal remains firm on its claim. It has somewhat redefined its version on how the compensation package totalled 332 crore taka, though.

Out of Tk 332.32 crore, the US company explained later, nearly Tk 40 crore was paid to railway authorities, tea estates and local people; Tk 158 crore was spent on remedial measures for the blowout; and Tk 134 crore was projected as 'sacrifice' of profit in case of future gas production from Moulavibazar-2 gas field. The rest was paid to various third party contractors.

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Car bomb explosion kills 5 outside Srinagar Army HQ

SRINAGAR, Dec 25: A suicide bomber set off a car explosion outside the Indian army headquarters in Kashmir's capital today, killing four civilians and a soldier and wounding 23 other people, officials said, reports AP.

Seven soldiers were among those injured in the explosion in Srinagar that occurred nearly 50 metres (yards) from the heavily guarded entrance of the army headquarters, police and home ministry officials said. Some shops across the street burned down following the blast.

The bomber was among those killed, army officials said.

The car was moving when the bomb went off. It seems the person in the car was trying to get inside the headquarters and set off the explosion when he realized he could not, Major Bharat A. Shahane, the army spokesman in Srinagar, told The Associated

Press. The soldiers wounded in the attack were standing outside the headquarters gate.

A Pakistan-based rebel group called the Jamaat-ul Mujahideen claimed responsibility for the explosion in telephone calls to the media.

Also Monday, a series of bomb explosions also rocked cities across the border in Pakistan, injuring 45 people. The first bomb ripped through a crowded market in the eastern border city of Lahore, injuring 36 people, while the second bomb exploded at a railway station in Faisalabad, also in eastern Punjab province, wounding three people, officials said.

The third explosion occurred in a passenger bus in Hyderabad

in the southern Sindh province, injuring six people. The fourth explosion in Kharian, 165 kilometres (100 miles) north of Lahore,

did not cause any injuries.

Police blamed arch-rival India of seeking retaliation for Friday night's attack on India's historic Red Fort in the heart of its capital of New Delhi, in which two soldiers and a civilian guard were killed. Two gunmen entered the Red Fort and escaped after attacking an army supply depot there.

Indian authorities did not immediately respond to the accusation, but New Delhi has in the past denied similar charges from Islamabad. India in turn alleges that Pakistan arms and funds the insurgency in Indian Kashmir, while Pakistan says it offers only moral and diplomatic support to the militants.

The Lashkar-e-Tayyaba, a

Pakistan-based Islamic group

fighting to separate the Himalayan province of Kashmir from Hindu-majority India, claimed responsibility for the Red Fort attack. Kashmiri militants regularly attack Indian soldiers in the disputed Himalayan valley of Kashmir.

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Passengers suffer as dense fog at ZIA disrupts flights

Dense fog enveloped Zia International Airport (ZIA) early yesterday, forcing landing of 15 flights only in three hours and causing a jam at the arrival lounge.

Departure of a number of flights was also delayed due to fog.

The incoming passengers were in trouble getting their baggage and finding vehicles to return to their destinations. Touts and riffraffs at the parking lot took advantage of the situation.

Flights from Europe, Far East and Middle-East which usually land at ZIA in the early hours landed after 8 am when the thick blanket of fog started evaporating.

Between 8 am and 11am, 15 flights landed with about 2000 to 2400 passengers, straining the handling capacity of ZIA.

There are only four conveyor belts to deliver baggage at the arrival lounge. Inadequate number of trolleys paved the way for a section of airport staff to make a quick buck by 'lending' trolleys, many passengers complained.

When they finally came out of the airport, riffraffs in the name of getting them vehicles charged money. Operators of microbuses then charged fares at whims, passengers alleged.

However, Chairman of Civil Aviation Authority (CAAB) Air Commodore Iqbal Hossain said they were well prepared to handle the situation yesterday as fog delayed landing of flights also on Friday.

Police helped ensure smooth departure of passengers. Extra CAAB personnel were also engaged to handle the situation, he said.

100 vehicles damaged in city

Auto-rickshaw drivers go on rampage, lay siege to police station

Unruly auto-rickshaw and auto-tempo drivers went on the rampage in different parts of the city yesterday and damaged at least 100 vehicles protesting police action and arrest of their colleagues in Sepoybagh area on Sunday.

They also laid a siege to Khilgaon police station for about one hour from about 9 am, triggering clashes with police, which spread to nearby areas.

Police said they charged batons and fired tear gas shells and blank shots to bring the situation under control in Khilgaon area. Several people and at least six policemen were injured in the clashes, they said.

The drivers put up barricades and clashed with police also at Jatrabari, Sayedabad, Rampura, Paltan, Motijheel and Gulistan areas.

Hundreds of people were stranded at Jatrabari-Sayedabad area as transports went off the
