Cold wave to continue

Dry weather will prevail over the country during next 12 hours till 6 pm today, reports UNB.

Moderate to thick fog may occur over Northern to central part of the country, Met Office said adding that moderate cold wave may continue over Rajshahi, Khulna, Barisal and Sylhet divisions and at places over Dhaka and Chittagong divisions for another 12 hours.

Little change in night temperature is expected over the country, it said.

The country's highest temperature recorded yesterday was 26.0 degree Celsius at Teknaf and the lowest 0.9 degree at Chittagong.

The sun sets in the capital today at 5:27 pm and rises tomorrow at 6:43 am.

Trial of Bulgarians postponed again

SOFIA, Jan 6: The trial of six Bulgarians and a Palestinian who face the death penalty if found guilty of deliberately infecting nearly 400 Libyan children with AIDS has been postponed again, Bulgarian radio said today, reports AFP.

The trial will resume on February 10. It is the eighth postponement since the trial opened in February last year.


Defence lawyers had asked for the adjournment because of the absence of the lawyer for the chief accused, a Palestinian doctor, the paper said.

The six Bulgarians, five nurses and a doctor, and the Palestinian doctor, stand accused of "triggering an AIDS epidemic by injecting contaminated products" and premeditated murder at a children's hospital in Benghazi.

They have all denied the charges. Two of the nurses initially admitted guilt but then withdrew their confessions saying these had been obtained under duress during police questioning.

Eight Libyans have been accused of "negligence" in the same case.

Bulgaria has been lobbying Egypt to support endeavours to ensure a fair and objective trial.

Four Pak girl students die in roof collapses

LAHORE, Pakistan, Jan 6: Four Pakistani girl students were killed and 30 others injured when the newly-built roof of their rural primary school collapsed today, an official report said, says AFP.

About 70 girls were attending the minority Christian-run community school in Jalalpur Jattan in central Punjab province when the incident occurred, the state-run Associated Press of Pakistan said.

The injured students were hospitalised, it added.

usual. People did not venture out of their residence without urgent business.

The chilly wind also had its effect among the city's legions of poor who live in shanties or sleep under porches or the open sky.

Anwarul Kabir, director of the met office, said that the moderate cold wave spread all over the country since its advance elements took over the north-west on Wednesday.

From Thursday the wind became chilly and started moving towards central, southern and north-eastern Bangladesh.

The weather will start getting warmer from Sunday and fine weather would continue until January 12.

But it will start chilling down again from January 12-14, preceded by a light shower, he forecast.

But this will be the final bite of the winter, he said about the third wave since cool weather settled in from last month with a mild cold wave.

two Muslim countries which are also members of OIC, NAM and the D-8.

The two sides also discussed cooperation in service sector including banking to prepare a basis for economic cooperation.

Talking to newsmen after the talks, the two foreign ministers emphasised making the Joint Commission an "effective body" to increase bilateral trade.

Indonesia also assured that it would extend all possible support to Bangladesh to hold the next NAM Summit, due in Dhaka early next year.

Samad Azad said although the Summit will be held next year, it will be called NAM Summit, 2001. Delayed holding of the Summit because of election in Bangladesh has been accepted

by all the NAM members, he said.

Azad said that Dr Soekarno, the late leader and founder of Indonesia, was one of the greatest champions of the Third World and an accomplished leader of the Non-Aligned Movement.

Foreign Secretary Shafi Sami, who was also present at the briefing told a questioner that Bangladesh had sent peacekeeping troops to Indonesia only after the Indonesian Parliament passed a resolution that East Timor was not a part of Indonesia.

The two sides at the talks viewed that both Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and Indonesian Vice-president Megawati Soekarnoputri had fought long for restoration of

democracy in their respective countries.

Samad said, both leaders pledged to uphold the democratic tradition in their countries.

Bangladesh's trade gap with Indonesia is over a 100 million dollars now and its import-export ratio is 15:1.

In 1999-2000 financial year, Dhaka exported goods worth only 8.13 million US dollars against imports of goods worth 159.47 million dollars.

There is great scope to increase export of commodities like ceramics, silk, plastic goods, insulation materials, leather and leather goods, jute and jute products to Indonesia.

Traffic movement on the Dhaka - Mymensingh Highway was smooth as the plying of non-motorised vehicles was restricted from early hours yesterday.

Motorised vehicles will also be banned from Tongi Bridge to Joydevpur crossing from tonight until the end of Akheri Monajat (concluding prayers) to avoid traffic snarl-ups, police sources said.

President Shahabuddin Ahmed is due to be present at the main dais of the Ijtema while Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and Leader of the Opposition in the Parliament Khaleda Zia will take part in the monajat from separate places outside the Ijtema venue.

Hasina will offer her monajat staying on the roof of a nearby Bata Shoe factory building while Khaleda will be on the roof of a building of Ashraf Textile Mills.
