BNP iterates demand

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revised in March 1998 provided for withdrawal of 'political cases' against MPs and other opposition men, BTV's impartial coverage of the parliamentary proceedings, neutrality of the Speaker and proportionate representation of parties in the parliamentary standing committees.

In his latest letter, the Speaker sought BNP's cooperation for passing the 14th constitution amendment bill seeking retention of women's reserved seats in parliament and making arrangement for the Bangladeshi expatriates to get enrolled as voters.

The opposition leader felt that there was no need for the opposition to be in parliament for the two purposes. Because, she argued, the existing provision for the reserved seats can be retained if the government resigns immediately and the next parliament is elected before April (when the provision for reserved seats expires).

She also shared the women organisation's view that the existing provision did not ensure proper representation of the women folks in parliament. A change in the mode of election of the women MPs and an increase in their number are needed.

The four-hour meeting was marked by heated debate between an opposition lawmaker and a ministry official. Meeting sources said expelled BNP lawmaker Akhteruzzaman blasted the official as he did not provide information asked by him. The Chair finally settled the matter.

Among others, committee members Faruk Khan of ruling Awami League, Rezaul Karim of BNP and Golam Mohammad Qader of Jatiya Party attended yesterday's meeting. High military officials were also present.

They also staged a noisy sit-in demonstration in front of the NCTB building at Motijheel to protest widespread corruption in awarding the printing job of several crores of textbooks to three concerns of Beximco Group Free Press, Shuktara and Pustaka by ignoring 750 experienced printers.

Students, leaders and activists of Bangladesh Chhatra Federation (BCF) attended the sit-in demonstration. Later, they brought out a procession in the city chanting slogans against the NCTB and the Education Ministry.

Meanwhile, country's leading intellectuals yesterday expressed concern over the non-availability of the textbooks despite the fact that the new academic year is already on.

Many schools in the capital Dhaka as well as elsewhere in the country have started taking class with old books despite changes in contents.

Students and guardians are flocking to bookshops for old editions of the textbook to begin study.

"We have to buy two sets of book in a single academic year," one student complained. He said the government should take action against the persons responsible for the textbook trouble.

Megawati in Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR, Jan 7: Indonesian Vice President Megawati Sukarnoputri arrived in Malaysia today for her first official visit since being chosen as her country's No. 2 leaders, reports AP.

Megawati's three-day trip, meant to boost bilateral ties, is at the invitation of Malaysia's Deputy Prime Minister Abdullah Ahmad Badawi.

Foreign Minister Syed Hamid Albar greeted Megawati upon her arrival from Bangladesh at the Kuala Lumpur International Airport. This was Megawati's last stop on a three-nation tour that started in Saudi Arabia.

BSS adds: Megawati left Dhaka this morning for Kuala Lumpur at the end of her three-day official visit to Bangladesh.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina accorded a hearty send off to Megawati at the airport. Senior members of the cabinet including Foreign Minister Abdus Samad Azad, Local Government Minister Zillur Rahman and Agriculture Minister Begum Matia Chowdhury, high civil and military officials were present to see off the Indonesian Vice President.

A citizens' rally will be held on the Central Shahid Minar premises at 2:30 pm on Tuesday demanding arrest and punishment of Maulana Fazlul Haq Amini and his associates for threatening two Judges of the High Court, reports UNB.

National Professor Kabir Chowdhury will preside over the rally to be attended by intellectuals, lawyers, teachers, journalists, artists, NGO activists, women leaders and freedom fighters.

Maulana Amini and some other fundamentalist leaders threatened the judges branding them as "Murtad" for declaring all types of 'fatwa' illegal.

Schoolgirl abducted in Manikganj

MANIKGANJ, Jan 7: A group of youngsters abducted a 16-year-old schoolgirl from village Bundul of Sadar upazila yesterday, reports UNB.

On complain from her father, police today arrested Rawshan Ali of the same village, but the girl could not be rescued till this evening.

Police said father of the victim filed a case against six persons including women for the abduction. They were trying to rescue the girl and arrest the accused.

Illegal immigrants Malaysia detains 58 on first day of crackdown

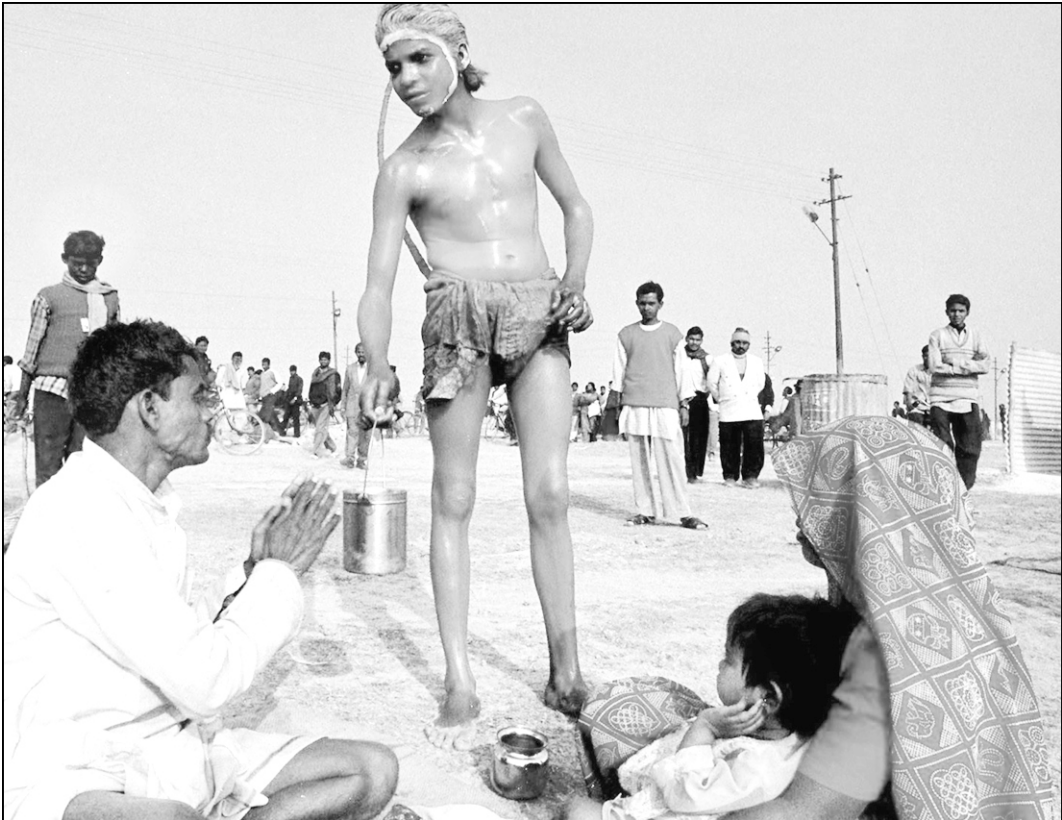
KUALA LUMPUR, Jan 7: Malaysian authorities have embarked on a blitz against illegal foreign workers, arresting 58 people on the first day of the operation, reports said today.

The detainees included 13 Malaysian employers and foreigners including 40 Indian nationals, three Bangladeshis and two Indonesians all in their 20s, the AFP quoting Sunday Star newspaper said.

Immigration enforcement director Nasir Ahmad was quoted as saying an estimated 5,000 Malaysians were hiring foreign labour without permit.

He said the department would step up surveillance and conduct raids targeted at the construction and services sectors. The detainees would be housed in eight deportation camps in the country which can hold some 15,000 people, he said.

"Last year, the immigration department repatriated 97,281 people, mostly Indonesians, and this year we are targeting 100,000 for deportation," he added.

Zhao opposed crackdown on Tiananmen protesters

BEIJING, Jan 7 : The former Secretary General of the Communist Party of China (CPC), Zhao Ziyang, pleaded in vain against using force to crackdown on demonstrators in Tiananmen Square on June 4, 1989, according to a document published today by a Hong Kong-based human rights organisation, reports AFP.

The Information Centre on Human Rights and Democracy published a "self criticism" speech made by Zhao to the Central Committee of the CPC on June 22, 1989, in which he defended his policy of appeasing the students.

"During this whole period my guiding idea was to try to dampen the crisis by solving the contradictions and persuade the great majority of the demonstrators to calm down," Zhao said.

"I was extremely worried that forceful measures, especially the use of weapons to solve the problem, would only lead to bleeding and a worsening of the situation among the vast majority of the population."

Zhao recalled in his speech that he had wanted to solve the crisis "along the lines of democracy and legality through reason, a cool head, restraint and order."

However Zhao's stance resulted in his removal from power when martial law was proclaimed on May 20 by party hardliners led by patriarch Deng Xiaoping and Prime Minister Li Peng.

Two weeks later the crackdown by the army resulted in what human rights group say were the deaths of about 1,300 people who had been demonstrating since mid April in Tiananmen Square.

In his "self criticism" speech Zhao explained his objections had been rejected by Deng Xiaoping: "A storm is unavoidable, the sooner it comes the better," Zhao quoted Deng as saying.

After that Central Committee meeting Zhao was officially removed from the helm of the CPC and replaced by Jiang Zemin, the current Chinese president. Now aged 80, Zhao has been living under house arrest since then, denied all contact with the outside world.

The Information Centre said the text of Zhao's speech had been secretly smuggled out of China and its contents corroborated other documents that first came to light on Friday in the United States, due to be published in the next issue of the journal "Foreign Affairs."

Those documents show that Zhao had been accused by Deng of having encouraged the demonstrators, and reveal the fierce power struggle fought out among the top echelons of the country's communist hierarchy.

In his defence to "the comrades who are going to decide on my fate" Zhao said that he had never supported "illegal" demonstrations and had always called on the students to look for other means to make themselves understood.

The students' slogans were to support the constitution, develop democracy and fight against corruption. This is similar to the basic concepts of the party and we had no reason to reject those demands," Zhao told the Central Committee members.

He went on to say that on May 17 he had offered to resign at a meeting at Deng's home after being "violently" accused by Li Peng of responsibility for the deterioration of the situation because he refused to support the use of force to suppress the demonstrators.

Zhao however said he was convinced by President Yang Shangkun not to resign.

Two days later, with tears in his eyes and in what turned out to be his last public appearance, Zhao visited the hunger-striking protesting students in Tiananmen Square.

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liament and was attending meetings of Parliamentary Standing Committees. She said BNP was only refraining from attending sessions as the Chair did not allow its MPs to have a say.

The BNP chairperson expressed her confidence that her party along with its allies would win the next election.

To a question about the JCD's new central committee with non-students at the helm, she said, "It is not necessary to form a committee only with students. There may be persons in the committee who have completed their studies. Moreover, the new committee is not permanent and it can be changed any time."

She asked for exclusion of 'fake' voters from the new electoral roll for ensuring a free and fair election.

BNP Secretary-General Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan alleged that the AL was conspiring to rig the upcoming polls by resorting to repression, using fake voters, illegal arms and black money. "We will definitely press the caretaker government to resolve the problems," he added.

BNP leaders M Saifur Rahman, M Morshed Khan, Nazmul Huda, MK Anwar and others were also present on the occasion. Sixth FYP to be commissioned in 2002-03

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday asked the Planning Commission to start preparatory work on the Sixth Five-year Plan incorporating her government's policy for socioeconomic development in the present perspectives of globalisation, reports UNB.

The sixth five-year plan will be commissioned in 2002-2003 on expiry of the current Fifth Five-Year Plan the performance of which was reviewed in a meeting yesterday.

Presiding over the Planning Commission meeting at her office, the Prime Minister asked the ministries concerned to take practical steps for quicker implementation of development projects aimed at improving socioeconomic status of common people.

Hasina, who is chairperson of the Planning Commission, took stock of the performance of five economic sectors and asked for prioritising implementation of projects relating to poverty alleviation.

Rally for communal harmony in Nepal

KATHMANDU, Jan 7 : Hundreds of students, civil servants, politicians and professionals rallied in the Nepalese capital of Kathmandu today calling for unity, development, communal harmony and peace, reports AFP.

The rally was led by the Federation of the Nepalese Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FNCCI).

The participants, wearing blue sashes saying "Peace, Development and Solidarity", paraded through the streets to urge an easing of tensions following recent riots in which five people were killed and hundreds of others injured in the capital and elsewhere.

The Nepal Communist Party-United Marxist-Leninist (NCP) last week held a similar rally in the capital calling for a restoration of peace between the country's ethnic communities.

Communal violence erupted in Nepal against ethnic Indians late last month after Indian film actor Hrithik Roshan allegedly made inflammatory remarks against Nepal and the Nepalese people in a television interview. Roshan denied making the comments. However, angry left-wing Nepalese students went on the rampage attacking Indian nationals and their property.

BAF jet crash

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ter. He hailed from Targaon village in Kapasia in Gazipur district. He was commissioned in the Bangladesh Air Force in the GD(P) Branch in 1988.

Hundreds of people who saw the aircraft burst into flames in the air tried to rush to the crash site. But they were barred from getting anywhere near the site.

They then gathered near a mosque at Baunia on the north-western side of the airport, trying to have a look at the crash site.

When asked, ISPR officials did not say how many lives and aircraft were lost so far in training missions.

Aviation sources said there have so far been 13 major accidents involving both military and civil aircraft since 1975, in which 55 people were killed.

Another Chinese built FT-7, which can be used a multi-role fighter, crashed in October 6, 1998 over Madhupur forest in Tangail, killing Flt. Lt. Hsan. It was on a training mission.

F-7 jets are the mainstay of air defence of the BAF. It also inducted in its fleet eight Mig-29 fighter-bombers from Russia last year. Two of those are training aircraft.

The BAF has a plan to acquire more Mig-29 aircraft, the sources said.

It was decided unanimously at an emergency meeting of the bar association held with its president Adv Syed Nurul Islam in the chair.

First class magistrate Ahsanul Haq rejected a bail petition of Adv Shamsul Haq Bhola Master, an Assistant Public Prosecutor and district AL leader and chairman of Charnadhabdia UP in the Sadar upazila. One Mamtaj Begum filed a case against Bhola Master.

Quake shakes southern India

NEW DELHI, Jan 7 : A child was reported killed and two people injured today when an earthquake shook the southern Indian states of Tamil Nadu and Kerala, the Press Trust of India reported, says AFP.

The child was crushed to death when a wall collapsed on him in Tamil Nadu's Kadayam town when the tremor measuring 4.8 on the Richter Scale shook the coastal region early Sunday morning, it said.
