# **Police say 'missing', Star** reporter finds her in 3 hrs

While police claimed in court on Monday that "The lawyer and the brother came to me and witnesses in Jalal murder case, notably Jalal's four asked me to change my story slightly in the court in exchange for money." She said brother of Ziaul family members, could not be traced, the victim's wife, Halima Khatun told The Daily Star yesterday Hasan would come back with the money on January that she and her children were told by the Public Prosecutor to 'keep away' until he called her.

"But how can I betray my deceased husband and my six children who want to see the killers of their father punished!" said a tearful Halima at her tinshed abode in a run-down area of Mohammadpur.

It may be recalled that Jalal's decomposed body was recovered from the rooftop water reservoir of the Detective Branch (DB) office at Minto Road in the city.

The Criminal Investigation Department (CID) in its investigation found DB Inspector Ziaul Hasan DB Havildar Bilal Hossain, Constable Abdur Rab, DB Driver Constable Abdul Malek and DB Office Canteen Manager Anwar Hossain guilty of killing Jalal and submitted a charge sheet accordingly.

Among the five. Constable Abdul Malek is now absconding while others are awaiting trial at the Dhaka Central Jail. But, mysteriously none of the 15 witnesses to Jalal murder case was produced before the court for the last one year.

# **Promotion of two HC judges** takes lawyers by surprise

regard was issued on January 9. The judges received the appointment letters yesterday. But their oath-taking did not

take place yesterday as Chief Justice Latifur Rahman was sick. It will take place today, the sources said.

The appointments were made by President Shahabuddin Ahmed on the advice of the Prime Minister.

Justice Rabbani supercedes Justice KM Hasan and Justice Ruhul Amin supercedes Justice JR Mudassir. Justice Ruhul

Amin was a member of the Death Reference Bench of the High Court Division, which gave the split verdict in the Bangabandhu murder case.

Their appointments superceding other judges was criticised by senior lawyers of the Supreme Court.

# **Directive to Bangladesh mission in Malaysia** Make list of fraud recruiters, arrange release of detainees

Bangladesh's mission in Kuala Lumpur has been alerted in view of the renewed crackdown on undocumented foreign workers in Malaysia that began last week, official sources in Dhaka told The Daily Star yesterday.

According to reports reaching Dhaka yesterday, some 10 Bangladeshis were detained so far for not having proper documents. They are awaiting deportation, the sources said.

Officials concerned at the mission have been asked to visit the detained workers in detention

camps, arrange their immediate release and return home and to collect the names of fraud recruiters in Bangladesh so that action can be taken against them, the sources said.

It could not be known how many Bangladeshi workers would be affected by the crackdown, an official at the Labour and Employment Ministry told this correspondent.

There is an unspecified number of undocumented Bangladeshi workers in Malaysia and it is difficult to say how many of them

will have to return home this time, he said after a telephonic conversation with Mosharraf Hossain, Labour Councillor at Bangladesh mission in Kuala Lumpur.

But a high official said, "I think their number will not be high this time as the Malaysian government legalised some 150,000 undocumented Bangladeshis at the request of the government few See page 11 col 7
