with other parties. To another question, Bhuiyan said BNP along with other parties would make fresh arrangements to have reserved seats for women in the next parliament if the existing

provision is lapsed. Chairman of the Parliamentary Standing Committee on the Ministry of Law Suraniit Sengupta criticised BNP for 'acting against the move for protection of the reserved

"If the bill lapses, half the voters (who are women) will vote against BNP in the next elections," he told The Daily Star Tuesday.

Commenting on BNP's suggestions for a direct election and an increase in the number of MPs from women's quota, he pointed out that there was still scope for the opposition party to suggest such amendments to the bill. "We're are open to any suggestions.

Sengupta, also the PM's adviser on parliamentary affairs, said BNP's position goes not only against the interests of the women, but also parliamentary democracy.

The standing committee brought the bill on women's reserved seats back to the House in the last session, after sitting on it for more than five months against the stipulated onemonth time apparently to bag the opposition's support.

The bill was placed in the House on June 17 and sent to the standing committee for scrutiny the same

provision of direct election to the reserved seats and an increase in the number of such seats. So long, women from the reserved seats were the choices of the ruling party because of the provision of their election by the directly elected MPs.

The constitutional explanation of Article 70(1) also says: "If a member of Parliament a) Being present in parliament abstains from voting, or b) Abstains himself from any sitting of Parliament ignoring the direction of the party which nominated him at the election as a candidate not to do so, he shall be deemed to have voted against that party.

"Having considered all the written and oral statements and in the light of relevant Constitutional provisions, it is ordered that the case is allowed on contest without costs. The seat of Major (retd) Akhteruzzaman MP elected from Kishoreganj-2 constituency in the parliament stands vacated with immediate effect under Article 67(1)(e) and Article 70(1) of the Constitution," the EC verdict said.

Terming the judgement "unjustified," Maj Akhter told a group of journalists immediately after the verdict that the chief election commissioner had nakedly tried to prove himself neutral to the BNP high-

"The judgement reflects the CEC's bias, and he will not be able to conduct the next general election in a neutral manner". The judgement

would make the party leadership more autocratic and hence, the democratic practice may be hampered once again, he added.

When asked whether he would challenge against the EC verdict. Akhter said, "No. Even the question to participate in the by-election following the vacation of the constituency does not arise.'

"I will contest the next general election if BNP nominates me for Kishoreganj-2 constituency," said

Barrister Mahbub Uddin Khokon, the petitioner's lawyer, said there was no option for the EC other than to pass such a judgement. "The judgement will be considered as a precedence to maintain party

The Election Commission Secretariat sources said that the copy of the verdict was sent to the Speaker soon after it was delivered. Earlier on October 11,1999, the

NATO to set up spl commission to probe uranium hazard

Population of Serbia not in danger

BRUSSELS, Jan 10 : NATO is to set up a special committee to study the possible health consequences for soldiers who served in parts of the Balkans where the alliance used depleted uranium munitions, NATO Secretary General George Robertson announced today, reports

"We are going to set up a dedicated committee on depleted uranium," Robertson told a press con-

"We will do everything to make sure that the relevant information is known," he added, asserting that the

alliance has "nothing to hide." Some of NATO's European members are irate about a spate of cancer cases, some fatal, among former Balkan peacekeepers and other personnel, which they say could be linked to depleted uranium (DU) munitions used in the alliance's tank-busting attacks.

Robertson described calls for a probe into the United States' use of DU in Bosnia in 1995 and Kosovo in 1999 as "legitimate demands", but added that he was "confident that there is little risk in NATO ammuni-

"I wouldn't have agreed to these amunitions when I was minister if we knew that they would involve any health hazard. It is a proven technology and valuable on the battlefield," said Robertson, whose was Britain's defence minister in the

Concerning UN complaints of NATO's failure to cooperate with investigations, Robertson said it was only due to "bureaucratic delay, which we all regret."

Robertson said that NATO's North Atlantic Council, the alliance's highest decision-making body made up of the permanent ambassadors in Brussels, had agreed to a request from Italy to provide maps of where DU ammunition had been used.

The council also decided to act as a hub for all national reports into the use of DU, and also offered assistance to the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) if investigators -- currently in Kosovo are also sent to Bosnia.

A definitive UNEP report on Kosovo is expected in March.

 $\overline{\text{US}}$ fighter jets fired some 31,000 DU rounds during the NATO air war against Yugoslavia, according to the Pentagon. Another 10,800 rounds were fired in 1994-95 in Bosnia where many of the afflicted peacekeepers were stationed.

Seven Italian soldiers and one aid worker, five Belgian peacekeepers, two Dutch nationals two Spaniards two Portuguese and a Czech have died after tours of duty in the Balkans, many from leukemia and other cancers.
