NEW DELHI. Jan 16: India's leading spinner Anil Kumble will miss the upcoming home series against Australia to undergo surgery on a painful right shoulder, it was announced on Tuesday, reports AFP.

Kumble, who has been out of international cricket since November, will be operated upon by noted South African orthopaedic surgeon Mark Fergusson in Johannesburg on Wednesday. Jayawant Lele, secretary of

the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI), said Kumble would be out of action for four months "We will not be available for

the Australian series and the Sharjah tournament after that, Lele said. The absence of Kumble, In-

dia's most successful spinner with 276 wickets, would be a major blow for the hosts against the world's top Testplaying nation.
