Dhaka-**Yangon talks** proposed to ease border tension

Bangladesh on Tuesday proposed holding talks with Myanmar to ease frontier tension in the wake of a crossborder shootout, a foreign ministry official, reports AFP

The official, quoted by the BSS news agency, said Dhaka had requested Yangon to honour a 1966 border agreement and argued that controversial shrimp cultivation in Bangladesh, close to the frontier, did not violate the accord.

Last year Texaco expressed willingness to withdraw from the bid and transfer its share to fellow US company Chevron. Rejecting the idea, Tullow, the Irish company, called for equal distribution of Texaco shares between foreign companies.

As a compromise formula, the government suggested propor-tional distribution among the remaining three oil companies. According to its plan, Chevron and Tullow, each having 30 per cent share, get 12.5 per cent each from Texaco's share while the remaining five per cent goes to BAPEX, the 10 per cent car-

husband, reports UNB. Deposing as prosecution witness in the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court, she said she suspected that Tayebi was killed following a dispute over

love affairs. Pritli came here with her father-in-law TA Khan. She appeared before the court at 11.30 am.

She said that they got married on June 18, 1994 in court and came here on November 8, 1994.

Zibran Tayebi, country man-ager of Entrans Maritime Bangladesh Private Ltd, was shot dead on June 9, 1999 on his way home from office at Agrabad.
