

## Dhaka-Yangon talks proposed to ease border tension

Bangladesh on Tuesday proposed holding talks with Myanmar to ease frontier tension in the wake of a cross-border shootout, a foreign ministry official, reports AFP.

The official, quoted by the BSS news agency, said Dhaka had requested Yangon to honour a 1966 border agreement and argued that controversial shrimp cultivation in Bangladesh, close to the frontier, did not violate the accord.

"Shrimp cultivation is not contrary to the agreement," he said referring to Myanmar's reported objection to the cultivation.

Also Tuesday, Dhaka sent a proposal for a flag meeting between the border guards of the two neighbouring countries, Colonel Shawkat, speaking from the southeastern frontier town of Cox's Bazar, was quoted as saying by BSS.

## Talks on joint PSC for Block 9 hits another snag

Negotiations for a joint production sharing contract (PSC) for block 9 has once again been stalled, after US oil company Chevron, in a recent letter, said that Petrobangla should not interfere with equity sharing of the companies involved in the talks.

At the instruction of the Ministry of Energy, Petrobangla was mediating a joint PSC, involving Chevron, Texaco, Tullow and BAPEX, for the most coveted block. The government was also pushing for an equity sharing formula following a disagreement amongst Chevron, Texaco and Tullow on the issue.

Chevron apparently agreed to the Petrobangla proposal, which envisages 30 per cent equity each for the foreign companies and ten per cent carried over interest for BAPEX, the Bangladeshi company. However, it had reservation against a

government plan for the future of Texaco's share.

Last year Texaco expressed willingness to withdraw from the bid and transfer its share to fellow US company Chevron. Rejecting the idea, Tullow, the Irish company, called for equal distribution of Texaco shares between foreign companies.

As a compromise formula, the government suggested proportional distribution among the remaining three oil companies. According to its plan, Chevron and Tullow, each having 30 per cent share, get 12.5 per cent each from Texaco's share while the remaining five per cent goes to BAPEX, the 10 per cent carried interest holder.

The joint venture agreement (JVA) requires that BAPEX sacrifice its five per cent share in favour of Chevron, making the US

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## Hired gun of Titu killed Tayebi: Wife tells court

CHITTAGONG, Jan 17: Pritli Chatterjee, wife of Indian merchant Zibran Tayebi who was murdered in June, 1999 told the court today that gunmen hired by Yasin Rahman Titu killed her husband, reports UNB.

Deposing as prosecution witness in the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court, she said she suspected that Tayebi was killed following a dispute over love affairs.

Pritli came here with her father-in-law TA Khan. She appeared before the court at 11.30 am.

She said that they got married on June 18, 1994 in court and came here on November 8, 1994.

Zibran Tayebi, country manager of Entrans Maritime Bangladesh Private Ltd, was shot dead on June 9, 1999 on his way home from office at Agrabad.

His wife had left the country along with the body the following day.

After investigation police submitted charge sheet against eight persons including son of a leading industrialist on November 25, 1999.

Six of them are in jail and two others including Yasin Rahman Titu are absconding.

The deposition of Pritli Chatterjee will resume tomorrow.

The court earlier completed cross-examination of 32 prosecution witnesses.

## 45,000 Bangladeshis to perform Hajj this year

With the introduction of new Hajj system, a total of 4,534 people will be able to perform Hajj this year under government management, reports UNB.

However, the other Hajj pilgrims will have to go to Makkah under the management of private agents appointed by the Ministry of Religious Affairs.

As per an agreement signed with Saudi Arabia, some 45,000 Bangladeshi pilgrims, including ballotees and non-ballotees, will perform Hajj this year.

"The new Hajj system will ensure better facilities for non-ballotee pilgrims," State Minister for Religious Affairs Moulana M Nurul Islam told a press conference yesterday.

Members of the visiting five-member Hajj delegation from Saudi Arabia led by the Advisor of Saudi Hajj Ministry Dr Darbesh Siddique Jestaniya were present on the occasion.

Addressing the press conference, Saudi delegation chief Dr Darbesh Siddique said the government of Saudi Arabia hailed the new system of appointing Hajj agencies.

He assured all possible help in implementing the new system and expressed hope that the pilgrims would get better services under the new system.

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## Notebooks flood market despite govt ban

Notebooks have flooded book-stalls in the city as an alternative to textbooks, still unavailable in the market, thanks to the failure of three Beximco concerns to print and distribute these in the market as per the National Curriculum and Textbook Board (NCTB) schedule.

In violation of a government ban on printing and publication of notebooks up to class six, imposed with a view to maintaining standard of education, some publishing houses are cashing in on the prevailing textbook crisis, said sources.

Pustaka, Shuktara and Free Press, the three Beximco concerns which were awarded the right to print and distribute textbooks for the academic year 2001, are yet to print and distribute around eight crore textbooks despite two extensions on the original deadline.

## Arguments in cassette case continue

## Opposition politicising courts: Hasina

CHITTAGONG, Jan 17: Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday accused the opposition of politicising the courts to deprive the people of justice, reports UNB.

"They will not be allowed to do so, you must remain alert against those who are letting loose terrorism on the court premises," she told a huge public meeting at Sitakunda High School ground.

The Prime Minister, who came here to open an eco-park, said the people should be cautious

about those who dared to unleash terrorism at the highest court and kicked the door of the Chief Justice's office.

She said the BNP-led opposition parties are creating problems in the court with an evil design to get their selected persons appointed as judges of the Supreme Court. They have obstructed the activities of the Supreme Court through terrorism, she added.

Hasina said, "They should be put into trial. They want to return to power through terror-

ism."

She said people are aware of their character, people also know how they came to power in the past by using arms and unleashing terrorism. She said General Zia ran the country by imposing curfew every night and General Ershad, following in his footsteps, introduced autocratic rule.

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## DR Congo president 'gunned down'

KINSHASA, Jan 17: President Laurent Kabila was fatally shot overnight, government sources said today, and his son, the army chief, was put in charge of the war-torn Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), reports AFP.

A junior DRC defence minister said in Libya that Kabila was shot by the head of his presidential guard and died later. He accused Rwanda, Uganda and Congo-Brazzaville of assassinating him.

Uganda, which along with Rwanda backs anti-Kabila rebels, immediately denied the charge. Kinshasa was calm as cabinet ministers went in for an emer-

gency meeting in the wake of gunfire at Kabila's Marble Palace late Tuesday, and put General Joseph Kabila in charge of both the armed forces and government action.

Government spokesman Dominique Sakombi said the decision was made while "awaiting the recovery" of Kabila, who had been "wounded in an attack", but it later appeared that the head of state was dead.

## CID seeks police protection for Jalal's family

The Criminal Investigation Department (CID), which investigated the Jalal murder case, has asked the police to ensure security of Jalal's family members who have been facing threats from different quarters, sources said.

"It is our prime duty to serve any people in trouble, and for this very reason we have sought protection of the family," CID Special Superintendent Lutfor Rahman told The Daily Star yesterday.

It may be recalled here that Shafi Ahmed Jalal, a Detective

Branch (DB) source was brutally killed by fellow DB men. His decomposed body was recovered from the rooftop water reservoir of the DB building in the city.

The accused DB Inspector Ziaul Ahsan, Habilder Billal Hossain, Constable Abdur Rab, driver Abdul Malek and DB office canteen manager Anwar Hossain were awarded a charge sheet.

"We have asked the police to take necessary steps as the family members demanded help from us," Lutfor said.

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## Inclusion of rebels in JCD body may defuse tension

The present crisis in the Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) would be over if and when the representatives of the rebels are accommodated in the full-fledged central committee of the BNP-backed student front, party insiders said.

A large number of JCD activists began to agitate against the Pintu-Laltu-led new central committee when BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia announced the five-member body on December 23.

Pressured by Khaleda Zia,

they however withdrew their movement and agreed to accept the new leadership with Nasiruddin Ahmed Pintu and Shahabuddin Laltu as president and general secretary. Khaleda at a January 8 meeting with the dissidents also warned them of dire consequences for insubordination.

The crisis seemed to have ended with Khaleda's threat, but problems again surfaced as the rebels drove Pintu-Laltu men out of Dhaka University campus after a gunfight on Thursday

and refused to let them back until the central committee is full-fledged with representation from the rebel group.

Talking to The Daily Star, a number of JCD leaders and activists said that Pintu and Laltu would have to accommodate them in the central body if they wanted to resolve the present crisis.

"There is no way for them but to include the dedicated student activists of JCD or else we'll resume our agitation," said a top

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
