3 more tribunals for disposal of cases under PSA

Three more tribunals were constituted in Dhaka on Sunday for quick disposal of cases under the Public Safety Act (PSA), court sources said.

The judges of the tribunals are Sunil Pal, Ashrafal Haq and AKM Salauddin.

Earlier on March 28 last year, a tribunal was set up in the capital for trial of cases under the Act. But the lone tribunal could not cope with the large number of cases, resulting in a huge back log.

A total of 476 cases were registered with the tribunal in nine months till November last year. Of these, 40 were disposed of and 436 are pending.

The PSA was enacted on February 15 last year to curb incidents of extortion, kidnapping, snatching, damaging public property, obstructing traffic movement and damaging vehicles, manipulating tender and such other crimes.

Experts see link between blasts

The bombs were made of same ingredients, likely from same source

Mashiur, one of the victims in Saturday's Bangabandhu Avenue bomb blast, has admitted to the police and the press that he 'unknowingly' carried the bomb to the spot in a bag given to him by a stranger at the CPB's Paltan rally.

Army bomb experts meanwhile collected and analysed evidences from the two explosion spots. Sources quoting experts said that both were powerful home-made explosives made from cast iron and contained same ingredients, suggesting that these had come from a single source.

Also, the way injured victims of Saturday's bomb explosions related the incidents to The Daily Star correspondent suggests a link between the Paltan Maidan and Bangabandhu Avenue blasts.

The torn black bag, recovered by the police from the spot at Paltan Maidan, belonged to Himangshu, one of the four people who died in the blast, a Daily Star investigation confirms. It is also clear that the bag did not contain the bomb as was suspected earlier.

Meanwhile, the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) continued its investigation but could not pinpoint the actual culprits till

yesterday.

The government investigation committee, formed by the Ministry of Home Affairs, formally started working yesterday. The home ministry sent a letter to the CPB asking it to co-operate with the committee, headed by Additional Secretary of Home Affairs Aftab Uddin.

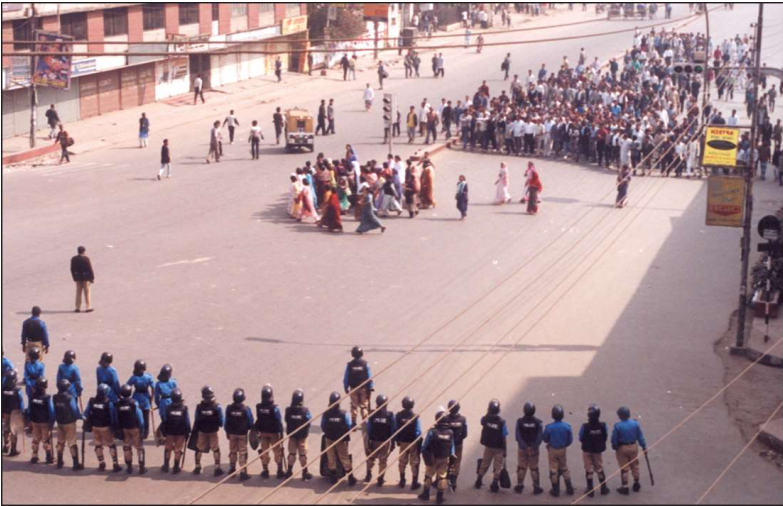
The committee has visited the spots and talked to witnesses, Aftab Uddin told The Daily Star yesterday. It would take statements from the injured victims at DMCH today.

At the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH), Mashiur told The Daily Star yesterday that he was attending the Communist Party of Bangladesh (CPB) rally when a man, who was sitting by his side, asked him to keep a shopping bag for him. The stranger told him that he would come back soon and left.

"I did not know what was in the bag and I thought he would be back soon," the 28-year-old Mashiur, who was injured in Saturday's second explosion, said.

He added that following the explosion at the CPB rally, he carried

Refrain from making comment until investigation is over

CPB urges ruling, opposition parties

Leaders of the Communist Party of Bangladesh (CPB) have held the government "primarily responsible" for the bomb explosion at its Paltan Maidan grand rally on Saturday, as police failed to ensure proper security at the meeting venue.

"The government failed to ensure security for those who attended the grand rally despite having the tough Public Safety Act," CPB President Manzurul Ahsan Khan told a press conference at the party's central office yesterday.

Saturday's blast killed four CPB activists and injured at least 50.

Khan termed the existing law and order situation very alarming.

"On an average eight people get killed everyday," he quoted press reports.

CPB General Secretary Mujahidul Islam Selim announced a week-long mourning programme, which begins

today (Tuesday), in protest at the killings and in demand for immediate arrest of the culprits.

The programme includes a mourning procession following a rally at the Central Shaheed Minar today, a black day on January 26 and countrywide demonstration on January 29.

Selim also urged all to make the dawn-to-dusk hartal on February 1, called by the 11-party alliance, a success.

The CPB leader also requested political leaders of both ruling and opposition parties to refrain from finger-pointing or making any comment on the Paltan explosion, until the investigation is over.

"We do not officially blame anybody for the explosion. No sooner had the incident taken place than some people started blaming the fundamentalists and some others the government

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Peaceful hartal paralyses normal life

The opposition-sponsored countrywide dawn-to-dusk hartal called to press for resignation of the Awami League government and repeal of the Public Safety Act passed off peacefully yesterday, but paralysed civic life and economic activities. No major incident was reported from anywhere in the country.

The BNP-led opposition alliance called the hartal also demanding dissolution of seventh Jatiya Sangsad and early elections.

Most of the business establishments, markets, shops, offices and educational institutions in the city were closed during the 12-hour shutdown, starting from six in the morning.

Movement of rickshaws was almost normal while a few motor vehicles, including the state-run BRTC buses, minibuses, taxis and tempos also plied on some specific routes and the VIP roads. Inter-district buses were off the road.

All international and domestic flights were on schedule.

AAPP chairmanship handed over to Cambodia

PHNOM PENH, Jan 22: Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina today said practice of democracy is the only means of ending violence and conflict to ensure peace and development in any country, reports UNB.

As the meet began at Chatumukh Conference Hall, the Bangladesh Prime Minister handed over the chairmanship of AAPP to Cambodia.

In her address to the inaugural function, Sheikh Hasina suggested that peace could be achieved by alleviating poverty and improving quality of life of each and every citizen.

The Prime Minister said acts of violence cannot stop the victory of the people as she said "violence is bound to fail, everywhere and every time."

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US-Bangla study on gas resources at final stage

Low-key blocks may prove high on potential

The US-Bangladesh gas resource study, which has finally reached its final stage, might reveal astonishing gas potentials in some of the blocks earlier considered not viable, sources involved in the study said.

Both the United States and Bangladesh have attached great importance to the study for the reason that it would help the latter make decisions on gas

sector development in general and gas export in particular.

However, following delay in completion of the study last year, the study is now proceeding very slowly, as the government has now decided not to take any new decision till the next elections, said a well-placed source in Petrobangla. The gas study will become very important afterwards, he added.

The United States Geological Survey (USGS) and Petrobangla is jointly conducting the survey under the US-Bangladesh energy co-operation arrangement to assess of Bangladesh's gas resources.

A government team of experts comprising mostly Petrobangla officials has recently left for USA to participate in the final assessment of the report. The team returns home on February 8. The report was originally scheduled

for completion in October last year. It was delayed for different reasons.

According to data gathered by the USGS team over the last one year, there is a high prospect of finding huge gas reserves in two most unlikely blocks -- 8 and 11, said a participant in the study. He however did not elaborate.

The USGS obtained geological and seismic data from independent oil companies (IOCs) including US company Unocal and European company Shell Oil. However, the USGS accepted the IOC data only after Petrobangla had vetted it, sources pointed out.

Both Unocal and Shell had been publicising that Bangladesh had a gas reserve of 30 tcf to 50 tcf. But when Petrobangla, which

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Delay in wage payment Garment owners have to pay penalty, decides JS body

Garments factory owners will have to pay penalty to workers for each day if they fail to pay wages after the 15th of the following month.

This was decided at a meeting of the Parliamentary Sub-committee on Garments Industry and representatives of BGMEA and garments workers, held at the Sangsad Bhaban last night.

The penalty will be paid at the rate of one per cent of the basic wage.

Factory owners will have to give appointment letter to each worker, and the probationary period will not exceed six months.

The meeting also decided that provident fund, gratuity and festival bonus for workers would be mandatory, meeting sources told The Daily Star.

The three-member Parliamentary Sub-committee was formed recently with ruling party law-

maker Shahjahan Khan as its convener.

The Parliamentary Standing Committee on Labour and Employment Ministry formed the sub-committee in view of "deprivation" of workers and deaths from recurring fire incidents in factories due to poor safety measures.

At the meeting, the sub-committee expressed its utter disappointment at the inadequate safety measures in garments factories.

Of the five factories visited by members of the sub-committee in the last one month, only two had adequate safety-exit system, the meeting was told.

The meeting agreed that there should be at least 350 square feet space for each worker in every factory. The five factories they visited had space as low as 114

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
